

#### In Memory of Wyn Steel, Verger 1991-2009

When I took the first Sunday service at the start of the New Year, it was a privilege to be asked to bless a new altar cloth in memory of Wyn Steel's ministry as verger at Ainsworth. I was last at Ainsworth for the burial of her ashes in August following her funeral at the end of July.

Wyn Steel was a significant part of Christ Church when I was vicar here until 2009. In planning her funeral, she said 'The years from August 1982 as assistant Verger to my husband Harry, then from October 1991 when I became Verger in my own right to my retirement after 27 years, were some of my happiest.' She was then 83. She said 'It has been a privilege to have served and been 'Batman' using the army designation, to vicars over the years. I hope I have served them well.' She did - very well indeed! Wyn made such a difference and was a tremendous help to me during my time at Ainsworth. She was a woman of deep Christian faith, hope, and love expressed in many, many ways. Wyn asked that any donations in her memory should go to this Church. Janet and Pauline, her daughters, asked that some of the money raised in her memory be used to buy a new altar cloth which your wardens Alison and Chris asked me to bless.

"Lord, we ask you to bless this altar cloth in memory of Wyn Steel, a woman of faith, hope, and love, who served as an example to all as Verger here for 27 years in the name of the Father, the Son Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Amen."

It was then used for the first service of 2024.



#### **Christingle Service 2023**

Thank you to all those members of the community who came to Church on Wednesday 6th December at the 6.30pm Midweek Praise service, for our annual Christingle Service.

It was lovely to welcome everyone to the Service held to raise funds for The Children's Society and their vital work to help children and young people in desperate need.

A couple of weeks before the Service, 'Smartie' tubes had been distributed to all the children, and they were asked to enjoy the Smarties but put coins into the empty tube and return it to the Service. This they did, and in return they were given a candle for the centre of their home made Christingle. A huge thank you to all the children, as the money raised from the Smartie tubes totalled £105.39. Fantastic!

At the Christingle service, the Midweek Praise Choir sang their song "Just One Candle," whilst holding their glowing Christingles as the main lights for the Church were turned out and the whole congregation joined in the singing. It was magical. It really was a wonderful atmospheric Service that warmed the hearts of everyone present. Thank you all for remembering vulnerable young people and being so generous with your efforts and donations.

Prior to the Christingle Service, I distributed Christingle Challenge sheets to members of the uniformed organisations, asking them to count how many windows they had at home. This was to reflect the light and hope that the work of The Children's Society project workers brings into the lives of children they help. Thank you to everyone who took part. A total of  $\pounds$ 64.95 was raised and special thanks must go to the 16th Brownies who donated  $\pounds$ 33.30. Well done for all your efforts.

This means that the grand total raised for The Children's Society Christingle appeal 2023 is £386.76!

On behalf of The Children's Society, thank you so much to everyone who took part in the Christingle challenge, made a Christingle and joined us at the Christingle Service, sang in the Midweek Choir, donated money at the Service or in one of the envelopes, or helped in any way with the success of this year's event. Every pound really helps to provide practical support to children in vulnerable situations.

#### **Church Electoral Roll Review 2024**

In accordance with Church of England regulations, the Church Electoral Roll must be reviewed prior to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

ALL members of the Parochial Church Council, Sidesmen, and anyone wishing to speak at the APCM or hold any office in Church, must be on the Church Electoral Roll.

The last date for accepting names will be 24<sup>th</sup> March 2024. After this date, no names can be entered or removed from the Roll until after the APCM on 21<sup>st</sup> April 2024.

If you are currently on the Roll, you DO NOT need to complete a form.

The name of anyone on the Roll but no longer attending church will be removed.

#### Electoral Roll

The criteria for admission to the Electoral Roll is:

- 1. Individuals have been baptised.
- 2. Individuals are a member of the Church of England or of any church in Communion with the Church of England.
- 3. Individuals are age sixteen or over.

- 4. Individuals are resident in the parish, or not being in the parish, have attended public worship in the parish during the last six months before the date of application for enrolment, and
- 5. Have signed a form of application for enrolment.

Forms are available in church and should be returned by Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> March 2024.

#### **Bury Homeless Project – Winter Clothing Appeal**

Bury Homeless Project is a not-for-profit, local community project assisting vulnerable people in our local area. They are currently appealing for winter clothing for adults and children –

coats, jumpers, hats, scarves and gloves. We'll be supporting this appeal until the end of February, so if you have any unwanted winter clothing, please place it in the box at the back of Church - garments should be clean and serviceable.

A huge thankyou to everyone who has already supported this initiative - we have already collected and dropped off 20 bin bags full of warm clothing!

#### EcoChurch – Green Lent

As Christians, we all have a responsibility to take caring for God's world seriously. The EcoChurch pathway isn't just about how we can improve the 'green credentials' of our Church, it's also about encouraging people to consider their own impact on the earth.

Throughout the 6 weeks of Lent, we'll be suggesting one small thing each week for you to try doing (or not doing) in a bid to improve your 'green credentials'.

#### Week 1; 19-25<sup>th</sup> February – Be Water Wise

Water is the most precious of our natural resources and it is essential to our daily lives.

Did you know that the average person in the UK uses 145 litres of water per day, this figure has increased by over 70% since 1984.

The way we use water has changed due to an increase in ownership of water using appliances, social norms around health and hygiene, increased greenhouse agriculture requiring all-year watering, industrial production and increased car ownership.





Did you know that flushing the loo and personal washing account for over 60% of water usage in the home? **Green Tip** - Upgrading to a dual-flush toilet could save 12,500 litres per person, per year, equivalent to 150 average-sized baths, as dual flush toilets typically use 4-6 litres of water, as opposed to the old-style flush systems which use a massive 13 litres per flush!

A running tap wastes approximately 6 litres of water a minute; **Green Tip** - turning the tap off when brushing your teeth and when washing your hands makes a massive difference.

Did you know that 12% of a typical gas-heated household's energy bill is generated by heating water for showers, baths, and general washing? This means that by using less hot water you can save money on your energy bill too. **Green Tip** - Getting out of the shower a minute earlier can save 2,500 litres of water per year and up to £128.

Green Lent Challenge – choose 1 way in which you could use less water – maybe taking a shorter shower, only using the dishwasher / washing machine when it's full; try to keep this up for a whole week.

# Week 2; 26<sup>th</sup> February- 3<sup>rd</sup> March – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle – these three 'R' words are an important part of sustainable living, as they help to cut down on the amount of waste we have to throw away, and also help to minimise the amount of space needed for landfill sites, where waste materials are disposed of.

Reduce - this 'R' is all about creating less waste.

Green Tip - Only buy what you need

Choose products with less packaging Buy in bulk Look for items that you can re-use

Reuse - This 'R' is about how you can use certain items again (ideally multiple times) before replacing them.

**Green Tip** - Refill a water bottle with water from home instead of buying a new bottle of water each time.

Update your computer rather than throwing it out and getting a replacement.

Ditch plastic bags and choose reusable, environmentally friendly bags instead.

Reusing doesn't just help the environment; it can also save you money!

Recycle – This 'R' is about making sure that you separate waste, to ensure things that can be recycled can be used for another purpose. Everyday items that can be recycled include glass, paper, cardboard, plastic, aluminium cans, food and garden waste; but there are lots of other things that could be partially or fully recycled.

**Green Tip** – Batteries can be recycled – most supermarkets have a bin for these; printer cartridges can also be recycled. Small electrical items can often be broken down and the components recycled. A number of charities will accept old tools, these will be cleaned, safety checked and then distributed to communities in deprived countries – your unwanted spanner set may provide someone somewhere with a means to support themselves and their family.

Green Lent Challenge - Before you throw something away, ask yourself – can any part of this be recycled? At the end of the week, see how many items there are that you would usually have simply discarded.

#### **Raising Awareness – The Bury Project**



We're making a difference!

The Bury Project began in February 2019. Churches Together in Bury wanted to do something to make a difference in our Borough. They became aware that debt was growing fast and making life for many unbearable. Like most things in life, the causes of debt are complex – divorce, unemployment and illness are big factors. Sometimes children just don't get the help from parents to know how to budget and as they grow up, they make a string of bad choices. Debt starts to spiral, and people give up.

The Project appointed Gordon Clark to be our debt counsellor. We pay him to work three days a week, and he sees about 25 clients a year, some 100 all together in the last four years. About 25 have become debt-free, another 25 are on the way, and about 50% have drawn back from engagement. It's just too tough.

Here are two quotes from clients, one at the end of the process, the other at the beginning:

'I would like to say a massive thank you to all at CAP (Christians Against Poverty – the Bury Project is a local branch of it) for all the support and help given to me over the last 12 months. I became debtfree on 4th January 2022 and feel a huge weight off my shoulders. I would like to say a special thank you to Gordon Clark who has been absolutely amazing and an absolute credit to your team...nothing was ever too much trouble - he was always there. Thank you. I feel like I can start to live again.'

'Hi Gordon, it was a pleasure to finally meet up with you. When I got home, I started to do some housework and for the first time I felt less anxious. I feel, although this is just the start, I can finally see light at the end of the tunnel.' November 2023

The service is free, and available to anyone in debt.

#### We're Recruiting!

The trustees of the Bury Project are looking to recruit an assistant for Gordon Clark. He has some really great skills and qualities as our debt counsellor, and we want to find someone who can work with him, learn from him and gradually take over from him so that we can take on more clients. At the moment there is a waiting list, and we're having to turn folk away. An assistant would help avoid such a situation in future. It also means that we have a trained assistant who will be able to take over from him when he begins to prepare for retirement.

We are envisaging an assistant working a two day week, paid according to the Government's Living Wage. Someone may well be looking for a part-time post. No previous experience is required, but below are the key qualities we are looking for.

- A strong Christian faith, expressing itself in integrity, trustworthiness and kindness.
- Excellent communication, both verbal and written.
- Able to quickly analyse complex situations to find the best solution.
- Confident computer user, able to quickly gather and accurately record information.
- A confident, quick learner with a capacity for large workloads.
- High emotional resilience. Able to maintain well-being whilst dealing with sensitive and highly emotive client circumstances.
- Strong numerical skills.

That might sound a bit daunting, but we are looking for potential, and some of these skills can be learned or honed.

Finding the right person for this work would be a tremendous step forward for the Bury Project and lay the foundations for the long term future of this service to our community.

#### From the Archives – February 1999

The Parish Diary for February 1999 included a number of seasonal additions to the regular Services; Ash Wednesday Communion and Lent Devotionals, plus a Songs of Praise Service to be shared with friends from the Methodist Church. There was also a note advising of a Deanery Confirmation Service to be held at St. Mary's, Radcliffe – no evening Service at Ainsworth on that date.

'News From The Parish', contained a number of thank yous and acknowledgements – for good wishes during illness, support following bereavement; and also Golden Wedding Congratulations!

The various groups and organisations were back up and running after the Christmas break; Guides were about to start a First Aid Course; Brownies were planning their next Pack Holiday; Cubs were busy with badge work, and Scouts were organising a night hike. A note from the Group Scout Leader advised that the Scout Unit was in desperate need of leaders, due to 2 existing leaders stepping down. The day school reported that a number of members of staff and parents were taking part in a sponsored slim to raise funds for school; also that their Christmas activities had raised £560, which was to be used to purchase PE equipment.

In February 1999, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Geoff Hampson, who has 'a long connection with our Church through Sunday School, but also as a Sidesman and Lay Assistant'. In February 1999 there were no Weddings recorded from the previous month, but 1 Baptism and 1 Funeral. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 385, with 121 of these being on Christmas Day!! Collections were listed as £1867.

#### For All The Saints – February; St. Brigid

Name: Brigid of Kildare Feast Day: 1<sup>st</sup> February Born: Faughart, 451 Died: 1<sup>st</sup> Feb 525, at Kildare Place of burial: Down Cathedral, Down Patrick Patron Saint Of: Poets. According to legend, Brigid's mother was given to a Druid when she became pregnant, thus Brigid was born into slavery and spent her early years working on the land. The Druid realised from an early age that Brigid was special, he was concerned for her spiritual welfare in her enslaved situation, and eventually granted both Brigid and her mother their freedom

Brigid was known for her desire to help those who were in dire need; often giving away the possessions of others to help those in need. As she grew older, she is said to have worked a number of miracles, including giving away the entire household's store of butter; the supply subsequently being replenished in answer to Brigid's prayers.

Brigid was later 'veiled' or became a 'consecrated virgin' and received the powers of an abbess. Around 480, Brigid founded a monastery at Kildare, on the site of a pagan shrine to the Celtic goddess Brigid. The site was under an ancient oak tree and was served by a small group of women who tended an eternal flame. Brigid, along with this group of women, is credited with organising communal consecrated religious life for women in Ireland; for centuries, Kildare was ruled by a double line of abbot-bishops and abbesses, the Abbess of Kildare being regarded as superior general of the monasteries in Ireland. Her successors have always been accorded episcopal honour. Brigid's oratory at Kildare became a centre of religion and learning and ultimately developed into a cathedral city.

Tradition says that Brigid died at Kildare on 1<sup>st</sup> Feb 525.



## People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose - some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

#### Simeon And Anna

In bible times, there was a rule that the firstborn son must be brought to the temple to be presented to God. This presentation at the Temple usually happened 40 days after the baby was born;

the baby's mother would show her baby to the priest so that the priest could bless him; when she did this, she knew that God's eyes also looked down on the baby in love. Then the parents would offer a sacrifice, depending on what they could afford - rich people might offer a lamb, whilst poorer people would offer a pair of pigeons or turtle doves.

Because Jesus was their firstborn son, Mary and Joseph took him

to Jerusalem to present him to the priests in the Temple. Mary and Joseph new that their baby was special, but to the people they passed on the road to Jerusalem, they were just another family



taking their baby to the Temple; no one knew them or recognised them as they made their way along.

This was the first time that Jesus had been to Jerusalem, the city of the Great King. When Mary and Joseph entered the



Temple, they offered the usual sacrifice for poor people. The priest approached them and laid his hands on the child. He blessed Jesus, but he didn't recognise that this baby was special - to the priest, he seemed just like any of the other babies that he blessed each day.

But suddenly an old man entered the Temple with great haste. He hurried straight to Mary. He knew who the child was! Simeon knew because God had told him.



Simeon was a very old man, he was frail and could barely see, and he knew that he didn't have long to live, but many years previously, God had spoken to Simeon, and told him that he would not die until he had seen the Messiah – the one who would save the people of Israel and all mankind. And now the great day had finally come—the most wonderful day in Simeon's entire life. Mary offered the baby to Simeon. Reverently the old man took the child in his arms, and full of joy, he praised God. "Now I can die in peace," he cried out, "for my eyes have seen Your salvation, O Lord."



It didn't matter that Simeon lived in dark times; he knew that through Jesus, the Light of the world was finally beginning to shine. Simeon sang of that light, the great and beautiful light that descended from heaven

to shine down not only upon the people of Israel, but upon all the nations.

Simeon blessed Jesus and said many things about him; Simeon said that many would come to love this child and would receive happiness through Him. But he said there would be many others who would hate him.

When Simeon finally fell silent, someone else began to speak;

someone else who recognised that the baby was indeed the Messiah. An old woman, 84 years old, stooped and grey – this was Anna.



Anna was a prophetess, which means she was

someone who delivered God's messages to His people. Anna spent all of her time in the Temple, and never stopped praying and praising God. Like Simeon, she saw much more than just another baby boy being presented at the Temple; they both saw and recognised Jesus as the son of God.

Anna came to stand by the baby Jesus and sang about this great wonder. From then on, she told everyone she met that the Messiah had come.

#### So, What Can We Learn From Simeon & Anna's Story?

There are lots of things to learn from Simeon and Anna's story. Simeon and Anna were both very ordinary people who had an incredibly strong faith. They worshipped God and prayed and trusted that what God promised really would happen. Simeon and Anna had both been waiting for many, many years - but they never doubted God's word, and they never gave up hoping that one day soon, the Messiah would come, just as God had promised them.

When we are impatient about having to wait, or we feel as if things aren't happening quickly enough, Simon and Anna teach us to have faith in God's timing and to trust God's promises, even if things are taking longer than we would like.

Simeon and Anna's story also reminds us how important it is to keep praying, and that when something we have been praying about and waiting for actually happens, we should remember to be thankful.

Simeon and Anna's story is also a huge reminder to us that no matter whether you are 5 years old or 105 years old - God has something for each and every one of us to do.
