Interregnum Update

After all the excitement last month of having completed and submitted our Parish Profile and also received permission to replace our boiler, it would seem reasonable to expect things to be 'moving a pace' ...

Sadly, we are now playing the waiting game once again.

Under normal circumstances there would be many factors for the Diocese to take into account when a vacancy arises within a Parish; however, current circumstances are far from 'normal'. Our Mission Community is in what could be described as 'a state of flux', with numerous Parishes already in interregnum (Christ Church Ainsworth, Christ Church Walshaw, St. Thomas & St. John, Radcliffe and St. Mary, Radcliffe) and St. Andrew's, Radcliffe preparing to move into interregnum later this month ...

Gone are the days of '1 Parish : 1 Priest' and so the powers that be have the unenviable task of trying to work out how best to allocate clergy between the various vacancies, to try to ensure Parishes and congregations are supported appropriately.

Watch this space for any updates, but it may be best not to hold your breath!!

The outlook for our new boiler is hopefully a little better; delayed somewhat by the fact that our permission finally came through during peak holiday time; all contractors are now back in the country, and we're hoping the work will be carried out towards the end of this month.

It would be great to be able to report in the next magazine that Church is now warm and cosy once more, but let's not get too excited; watch this space ...

Eco Church Top Tip for October:

Provide food and shelter for wildlife, now and in preparation for next year. Clean all your bird feeders to avoid the spread of disease to winter migrants and put up a nest box well in advance of the breeding season. A nest box could also prove a cosy spot for small birds to spend the night on particularly cold winter evenings ahead.

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Service For The Departed

This year, in line with many other local Churches, our annual 'Service For The Departed' will be held in Church on All Souls Day, **Thursday** 2nd November, at 6.30pm.

At this Service we take time to reflect and remember members of our families, friends, members of our local community and our worshipping community who are no longer with us.

The names of those for whom a funeral has been held in Church during the past year, will automatically be included in the list of names to be read out at this service, but if you would like the name of a friend or loved one to be added to the list, please put the names of those you wish to be read out, in the red box at the back of church, or, leave a message on 01204 595378. To allow time for printing, the last date for receiving names is Thursday 26th October.

Candlelit Vigil

Alternatively, if you can't make it to the Service For The Departed, we will be holding a candlelit vigil to remember the departed, in Church on Sunday 12th November at 6.30pm.

This will be a time for quiet reflection and remembrance, with the opportunity to light a candle to remember a loved one, and to listen to some of the words and music that have been chosen for funerals in Church over the past year.

Bible Sunday – 29th October 2023

The word 'Bible' is derived from the Greek word 'Biblios', meaning a collection of books; the books of the Bible were all written at different times, by different people and in different places, but the common denominator is that all those who wrote these books were inspired and moved by God – in effect, the Bible is the written Word of God.

For centuries, the Bible has been having a profound impact on people, and in many cases quite literally changing lives. The Bible has been translated into over 690 different languages and sells over 100 million copies every year.

Bible Sunday is a day on which churches celebrate the continuing impact that the bible has on individuals and communities all over the world.

Raising Awareness – World Homeless Week; 8th – 15th October 2023

This year World Homeless Week will run from

8-15th October; it is the sixth annual World Homeless Week. World Homeless Week is an opportunity to share vital information about homelessness, raise awareness, debunk common myths, celebrate success stories, and also an opportunity to raise awareness of the work of the various charities and organisations that work to support those who are homeless and help individuals to rebuild their lives.

The Church Homeless Charity believes that every homeless individual deserves the help and support they need to rebuild their lives. They are committed to providing the tailored support that individuals need to help them along their journey.





A Bit Of History ... In 1882, Revd Wilson Carlile began to work with homeless people in London. He would often spend nights on the Thames Embankment in winter in order to care for those sleeping rough. Revd Carlile founded Church Army Housing in 1924, setting up drink-free hostels and work opportunities for people trying to stay off the streets and improve their lot in life. Over the years, many other hostels were set up all over England.

In 1977, this accommodation was transferred to the Church Housing Association, as the Church Army did not have access to public funding to maintain the properties.

Over the next 30 years, a number of mergers and transfers occurred, until in 2006, English Churches Housing Group merged with the Riverside Group. The project's purposes remained the same: to provide supported living for individuals who have experienced homelessness.

Although many of the hostels which are managed by this group receive state funding, this does not provide the support that individuals need to rebuild their lives and establish a home.

Church Homeless Trust remains an independent charity raising funds for homeless people and providing funds for non-statutory services and support that individuals would not otherwise get. The Trust helps people to become confident and healthy through training, activities, and personal support; funds can be provided for clothes and travel so that people can start volunteering or working; the trust can also provide basic household goods when individuals are ready to move into a home of their own.

Parish Finances

Finance is always a tricky subject to approach; we are aware that many of our regular attenders give generously on a regular basis, and we are incredibly grateful for your continued support. We are also aware that, for many, the cost-of-living crisis means that they have to think more carefully than ever about where limited funds can be spent. The fact remains, however, that since the Covid-19 pandemic and resulting lock downs, the numbers attending Church regularly have fallen, and this coupled with increasing costs, plus some fairly large essential expenses, mean that our Parish finances are at an all-time low.

Did You Know ...

- It costs around £1,300 per week to run and maintain our Church that includes the cost of heating, electricity, repairs, insurance and maintenance, plus the cost of ministry within our Parish, and our Parish Share payment to the Diocese.
- That's a total of around £68,000 per year! If it wasn't for the hard work and commitment of our volunteers, and the general cost savings we manage to achieve each year, it would be far more.
- Our Church does not receive any financial support from the Government or local Authority. The only small reserves we have come from legacies or gifts; these funds have been given to maintain the church fabric or the Churchyard and cannot be used for our week by week running costs.
- Attendance at some of our Services can be in excess of 40 people, yet the total collection money received can be as little as £5. Just to break even, we need to increase our average income by around £268 per week.
- There are many ways in which you could help to support your Church.

From the Archives – October 1998

The inside front cover of the October 1998 Parish Magazine includes a wonderful sketch entitled 'Shaping Our Landscapes', with a footer identifying this as being part of '1 World Week – 18-25/10/1998'; whilst there isn't any more detail within the magazine, the suggestion from the sketch is that this was part of an educational campaign around 'land-fill and waste disposal.

Moving on to the Parish Diary, there were details of the forthcoming Harvest celebrations; Harvest Supper on the Saturday evening, followed by 'Harvest Communion', Harvest Family & Parade Service, and finally a Harvest Evensong.

In 'News From The Parish', there was a reminder that anyone wishing to attend the Confirmation classes should speak to the Vicar; a thankyou to the 'White family and Hood family' for organising and hosting what seems to have been a very popular American style brunch; a request for 'knitters' to take part in a scheme which aimed to produce hats and scarves for homeless people; and a mention that the newly commissioned hymn books were now being used by those attending the main Sunday Services.

In other news, Father Alan reported on the Parish Weekend that had recently been held at Whalley Abbey; this must have been a success as the venue had been booked in advance for the following year; the PCC reported that following much discussion about Parish Finances, it had been decided that the proposal to build a new toilet in Church would have to be put on hold; the Social Committee had produced a list of the stalls planned for the Church Christmas Fair; and a number of the groups and uniformed organisations were planning ahead, with requests for goods to be donated for their stalls.

In October 1998, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mr. David Barlow, 'whose practical help for the Church is always appreciated'. In

October 1998 there were 3 Weddings and 2 Funerals recorded from the previous month, but no Baptisms. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 396, with the Collections listed as $\pounds1531$.

The Hymn That's In My Head

Hymns and music play a large part in Christian worship; you can't beat listening to (or singing along with) a joyful, rousing hymn - whether it's



in church, on the radio or listening to a CD. There are literally hundreds of fabulous hymns and worship songs out there.

Guide Me, O Thou Great Redeemer (William Williams 1717 – 1791)

Guide me, O thou great redeemer, Pilgrim through this barren land; I am weak, but thou art mighty; Hold me with thy powerful hand: Bread of heaven, bread of heaven, Feed me now and evermore, Feed me now and evermore.

Open now the crystal fountain Whence the healing stream doth flow; Let the fiery cloudy pillar Lead me all my journey through: Strong deliverer, strong deliverer, Be thou still my strength and shield, Be thou still my strength and shield.

When I tread the verge of Jordan Bid my anxious fears subside; Death of death, and hell's destruction, Land me safe on Canaan's side: Songs and praises, songs and praises, I will ever give to thee, I will ever give to thee.

"Guide me, O thou Great Redeemer" has been used for worship in congregations around the globe and across denominational lines. It was also incorporated in two of the most televised services of the last two decades, the funeral of Princess Diana of Wales (1997) and the royal wedding of Prince William and Catherine Middleton (2011). The author of this widely popular hymn is William Williams (1717-1791), born in Carmarthenshire, Wales, to John and Dorothy Williams. Williams grew up as an Independent and later a Calvinist. It was near Talgarth that he first encountered the preaching of Howell Harris, which lead to his conversion experience. Shortly after, he abandoned his Independent upbringing to pursue ordination in the Established Church.

In 1744, after being accused of several misdemeanours against the Church of England, Williams devoted himself to Methodism; the Welsh text for this hymn was written soon after this in 1745.

Williams interweaves imagery from the Old Testament book of Exodus to evoke a sense of God's guidance through strife. One of the reasons this hymn has influenced such a broad array of congregants is the universal subject of struggle. Every Christian, and indeed every person, encounters difficulties. "Guide Me, O Thou Great Redeemer" affirms the reality that God provides for us and redeems all wrong in the world. The God who provided for the Hebrew people wandering amidst "barren lands" with "Bread of Heaven" is still and ever will be a God of provisional grace.

Praying Through The Seasons ... Harvest



"While the earth remaineth, seedtime and harvest, and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease." Genesis 8; v22

Traditionally, Harvest would have been a celebration of God's bounty; to small rural communities that relied on agriculture for their very existence, a good Harvest was quite literally a life saver, and definitely a cause for praise and thanksgiving.

In today's world, most communities are less dependent on the land for their existence, but Harvest is still a wonderful opportunity for us to recognise God's goodness and provision in all creation, as well as the relative abundance of food that is available to us. It is a time to give special thanks and praise to God for the way He reveals himself to us in the wonders of his creation, a time to reflect on all that we have, and to pray for those who are less fortunate than ourselves and lacking in many of the resources that we can so easily take for granted.

God of the heavens and earth we thank you for the richness of harvest time and for food. May the fruitfulness of this time make us

thankful for your constant love and care for us. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.



People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose - some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

David & King Saul

King Saul was the very first King, chosen by God, to lead the people of Israel. To start with, King Saul listened to God and did



his best to lead his people well; but after a while, Saul began to forget that he had once been a simple, ordinary person, he forgot that all his wealth and riches were a gift from God; he began

to turn into a mean and ungrateful person who said and did exactly what he wanted to.

The people of Israel noticed this and became worried; God noticed it too, and he had already decided that at some time in the future, David, the young shepherd boy who had killed the giant, Goliath, would become the next King of the Israelites.

After David killed Goliath, the King was very pleased with him, and asked him to go to live in the palace with King Saul and the King's family. King Saul had a son named Jonathan, and David and Jonathan became best friends.



David also joined the army and won many more battles for Israel. All of the Israelites loved David, and they made songs to sing about him. When King Saul heard the songs, though, he became jealous. He thought that people were starting to like David more than they liked him.

Saul was in such a bad mood about it that he asked David to play some music on his harp to cheer him up. But while David was

> playing his harp, King Saul flew into a rage! He picked up a spear and threw it at David. He tried to kill David because people liked David more than him, but David was guided by God; he quickly moved out of the way, and the spear missed him.

Saul said he was sorry and blamed it on his bad mood, but in fact, King Saul was just really, really jealous of David, and wanted to get rid of him.

King Saul came up with a cunning plan; he sent David to fight in another war against the Philistines, and secretly King Saul hoped that David would die in the battle against the Philistines! But he didn't.

When David came back from the wars, King Saul pretended to be really pleased to see him. He told him, "David, I want you to marry my daughter, Princess Michal. All you have to do is kill one hundred Philistines."

King Saul secretly thought, "David will never be able to kill a hundred Philistines. They'll kill him for sure!!"

And so, David went off to war.

David did not kill a hundred Philistine soldiers. David didn't kill 150 Philistine soldiers. David killed more than 200 Philistine soldiers, and so, King Saul had to let David marry Princess Michal.

By now, King Saul was even more jealous of David. Finally, he told his son, Jonathan, and the rest of his soldiers to kill David. But Jonathan was David's best friend, and he warned David to run away.





David went home, but some of Saul's soldiers followed him, intending to kill him. Thankfully, Princess Michal, David's wife, spotted the soldiers sneaking up to the house that she and David were staying in; she warned David and helped him to escape out of the window.

Some of the soldiers actually liked David more than King Saul, and so they went with him, and they made their own army in the desert. David and his little rebel army would attack Israel's enemies, but they would never attack King Saul or his army.

King Saul was even more angry with David now; not only had he escaped; he had taken some of King Saul's soldiers off with him!! Again and again, King Saul and his army went after David so that King Saul could kill him.

One time, David and his army were hiding in a really deep cave.

King Saul didn't know they were in there, so he went into the cave to rest. The King's guards waited outside the cave. David sneaked up behind King Saul and carefully cut off a piece of Saul's



robe. When Saul had rested and walked back out of the cave, David followed him and said, "Look!" He showed him the piece of Saul's robe he had cut off. David said, "I could have killed you today, but I didn't. Why are you trying to kill me?"

Saul was astonished that David hadn't killed him; he knew that if he had found David asleep, he would not have hesitated to kill him. King Saul promised that he would leave David alone from then on.

But guess what ... not long afterwards, Saul got jealous of David



again, and once again he took his army to chase David and try to kill him. This time, when it was dark, and everyone was sleeping, David sneaked into King Saul's camp and took Saul's spear and water jug.

When David had sneaked back out of King Saul's camp, he stood up tall and shouted loudly, saying, "King Saul, look! I have your spear

and water jug. I could have killed you tonight, but I didn't. Why are you trying to kill me?"

And once again, King Saul said he was sorry and went home.

King Saul never stopped being jealous of David; he knew deep down that David was a much better and kinder person than he was, and he also knew that the people of Israel loved and respected David more than they would ever love and respect him.



Eventually King Saul was killed during a battle with the Philistine people, and at last David was able to become the next King of the Israelite people.

So, What Can We Learn From David & King Saul?

There are lots of things that we can learn from this story: the first thing for Christians to learn, is that the story shows us how God can protect us and is on our side when we truly believe and trust in Him, as David did. To start with, King Saul had been thankful and had truly believed and trusted in God; it was only when he stopped trusting God and obeying God's commands that things started to go wrong for him.

Another really important lesson to learn from this story, is that jealousy is a bad thing; it's never okay to be mean and horrible to someone, even if they are being mean and horrible to you. Even though King Saul was chasing David and trying to kill him, David knew that it would be wrong to hurt King Saul back.

If someone is behaving badly to you, you should always talk to a grown up about it - someone at home or a teacher at school - ask them to help you to sort things out rather than being mean and horrible back.

Prayer Time ...

Heavenly Father, help us to have a loving heart that even loves our enemies. When someone does something wrong to us, help us to be the better person and to do the right thing. Amen.

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
