#### **Interregnum Update**

It may only be a month since the last Parish Magazine 'Interregnum update', but what a busy month it has been!

Early in August, the Diocese officially 'declared the vacancy' at Christ Church Ainsworth; this declaration is the first stage of what will become the recruitment process and triggers various tasks which must be completed in line with Diocesan guidelines. Within 28 days of the vacancy being declared, the Parish must submit their Parish Profile – a detailed description of the Parish and local community, plus a role description for any potential applicants. Thanks to the hard work of our PCC members, our Parish Profile has now been completed and submitted to all relevant parties. We don't yet have any ideas on possible timescale for the recruitment process, but at least 'the ball is now rolling' – watch this space ...

Also in August, we finally received the incredible news that our faculty application for replacement of the church boiler has been approved – hoorah!! A big concern was that the Diocese are reluctant to grant a faculty when a Parish is in interregnum, so again, a massive achievement. Let's hope the contractor can give us an early date for getting this job done.

And finally, our efforts to improve our 'EcoCredentials' has paid dividends, with the fantastic news that we have achieved our EcoChurch Bronze Award – hoorah again!! Huge thanks are due to everyone who has worked so hard to achieve this award in such a short space of time.

Keep up the good work everyone – it is very much appreciated.

#### **EcoChurch**

In the few months that have passed since our Church signed up to the EcoChurch scheme, a huge amount of Eco-Activity has taken place.

The first step was to work through the five areas of the EcoChurch questionnaire; worship, land, buildings, engagement with local & global initiatives, and lifestyle, all come under the spotlight. Having identified the things that we already do well, things that we could easily improve on, and areas that need a bit more work. Our team have worked hard to implement the necessary changes and try new things.

The questionnaire has now been submitted, and we're just awaiting the official confirmation that we've achieved the EcoChurch Bronze Award – a fantastic achievement in such a short space of time!!

A huge thank you to everyone who has been a part of our EcoChurch journey thus far, and particularly to Peter Holden, for co-ordinating our efforts and pulling all the sections together. Look out for our 'Bronze Award' certificate being displayed in Church in the coming weeks.

#### **Eco Church Top Tip for September:**

Green your home this Autumn - tackle climate change and reduce your heating bill by testing how draughty or leaky your home is. Find the gaps that let the cold air in and warm air out (think keyholes, letterboxes, gaps around the edges or bottoms of windows and doors, loft hatches, floorboards etc.) and fix these gaps using the correct materials: (there are lots of handy tutorials on how to do this online). Now is also a very good time to prepare for winter by sticking tinfoil or radiator panels between the wall and radiator, as these will help reflect heat back into your room during the colder months.

#### Wild Worship!

This fab new venture has run on Wednesday evenings throughout the Summer holidays; despite the variable weather, we've been out and about in the churchyard each week, making the most of the lovely surroundings and learning about the 'The Creation Story'. So, to begin at the beginning, we spent our first session thinking about light; why we need it and how it might feel without it. Church was eerily quiet as everyone concentrated on making 'stained glass windows' (some very creative ideas!), then noise levels resumed as we moved onto making (and eating) rainbow kebabs and 'praying a



rainbow'.

On the second day, God created the oceans and the heavens - and our wild worshippers got busy thinking about what the wind feels like and what it can do, then made prayer funnels, followed by 'cloud cookies'. We finished this session by blowing 'bubble

prayers' which looked amazing as they drifted across the churchyard on the breeze.

On a glorious, sunny evening, day three saw us thinking about the plants and trees and fruits and seeds; creating 'eco-pictures' and enjoying fondant dipped fruit, before playing a memory prayer game.





On day four, our theme was the sun, the moon and the stars, and our wild worshippers enjoyed making 'night sky night lights', and star cookies. Day five saw us thinking about the birds that fly through the heavens, and the creatures that live in the oceans. Sadly, the birds were resolutely silent as we tried to identify different birdsongs, but maybe they will be a bit chirpier when they discover the various feeders that were made and dotted about the Churchvard for them. Intense



concentration followed as we created 'fish cakes' – definitely some future cake decorators in this group – and drew the session to a close with 'ripple prayers'.



Our final session focused on animals and people; a bug hunt followed by construction of 'rocking rabbits' was a huge hit, followed by snacking on crunchy caterpillars – a 'bush tucker challenge', Ainsworth style! Silence reigned once more as we drew to a close with 'handprint prayers'.

It's been great to see our wild worshippers working together, learning together, praying together, and producing some really creative ideas – I hope they all enjoyed the sessions as much as we did!



#### **ABC Parent / Carer and Toddler Group**

In July, we said 'goodbye' to 8 children as they left the group to go to nursery. Several have been with us since they were very young babies, and we will miss them and their parents and grandparents very much. We wish them all well for their futures.

ABC will recommence on Friday, 8<sup>th</sup> September, from 10.00am to 11.30am in the Church and Community Hall. We look forward to seeing former families and welcoming new ones.

For anyone who is unfamiliar with ABC, we are a welcoming, friendly 'crew' of Christ Church Ainsworth volunteers, who provide a place for children and babies up to school / nursery age, accompanied by their parents or carers, to take part in free play with a variety of toys, craft

work, structured activity songs and musical instruments. Age appropriate refreshments are included in the cost of £1.50 per one child family (additional children charged at 50pence each).

#### Parish Finances

Finance is always a tricky subject to approach; we are aware that many of our regular attenders give generously on a regular basis, and we are incredibly grateful for your continued support. We are also aware that, for many, the cost-of-living crisis means that they have to think more carefully than ever about where limited funds can be spent. The fact remains, however, that since the Covid-19 pandemic and resulting lock downs, the numbers attending Church regularly have fallen, and this coupled with increasing costs, plus some fairly large essential expenses, mean that our Parish finances are at an all-time low.

#### Did You Know ...

- It costs around £1,300 per week to run and maintain our Churchthat includes the cost of heating, electricity, repairs, insurance and maintenance, plus the cost of ministry within our Parish, and our Parish Share payment to the Diocese.
- That's a total of around £68,000 per year! If it wasn't for the hard work and commitment of our volunteers, and the general cost savings we manage to achieve each year, it would be far more.
- Our Church does not receive any financial support from the Government or local Authority. The only small reserves we have come from legacies or gifts; these funds have been given to maintain the church fabric or the Churchyard and cannot be used for our week by week running costs.
- Attendance at some of our Services can be in excess of 40 people, yet the total collection money received can be as little as £5. Just to break even, we need to increase our average income by around £268 per week.
- There are many ways in which you could help to support your Church.

#### From the Archives – September 1998

In September 1998, the Parish Diary included news of the Parish Weekend to be held at Whalley Abbey; details of transport arrangements to follow nearer the time. The Diary also mentioned a joint Service to be held with members of Ainsworth Methodist Church, and a Baptism Service to be held at 2pm; glancing forward to next month's magazine, it seems that 2pm was the scheduled time for Baptisms to be held.

A separate note reported that Confirmation Classes for year 6 children and above, would be held each week from 4-5pm in the church and Community Hall; any adults wishing to be Confirmed should speak with the vicar to make arrangements to attend the evening classes.

News from the Parish in September 1998 included a 'Thankyou' from the Church Hall Committee to all those who had helped with the big tidy up of the Hall over the Summer months, and also a reminder from the Parish Magazine Secretary, that the annual subscription was due to be paid by those who wished to continue to receive the Parish Magazine in the coming year.

In news from the various organisations, Mothers' Union members were planning a Jumble Sale, and also had a 'save the date' for a Whist & Domino Drive; Young Families reported on an enjoyable trip to Blackpool Zoo and were asking for suggestions for their next outing; 16<sup>th</sup> Brownies had enjoyed a pottery evening, and had also featured in the Bury Times, as the group had collected enough milk bottle tops to support the purchase of a 2<sup>nd</sup> Guide Dog Puppy.

In September 1998, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mrs. Jean Eddleston, Church Secretary, "One of the most difficult and demanding jobs in the Church".

In September 1998 there were 3 Baptisms and 2 Weddings recorded from the previous month, but no Funerals. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 246, with the Collections listed as £1208.

#### The Hymn That's In My Head

Hymns and music play a large part in Christian worship; you can't beat listening to (or singing along with) a joyful, rousing hymn - whether it's in church, on the radio or listening to a CD. There are literally hundreds of fabulous hymns and worship songs out there.



#### How Great Thou Art (Carl Gustaf Boberg 1859-1940)

O Lord my God, When I in awesome wonder, Consider all the worlds Thy hands have made, I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder, Thy power throughout the universe displayed.

Refrain: Then sings my soul, My Saviour God to Thee, How great Thou art, How great Thou art, Then sings my soul, My Saviour God to Thee, How great Thou art, How great Thou art!

When through the woods and forest glades I wander, And hear the birds sing sweetly in the trees, When I look down, from lofty mountain grandeur And see the brook, and feel the gentle breeze.

These beautiful words were written by Mr. Carl Gustaf Boberg (1859-1940), a Swedish pastor, editor and a member of the Swedish Parliament. Mr. Boberg was walking home from a prayer meeting one

evening with a small group of friends, when a thunderstorm suddenly blew up and a strong wind began to blow. The friends took shelter, then after the storm had abated, as Mr. Boberg looked out over a miraculously clear, calm bay, a church bell began to ring in the distance. As he surveyed this scene of such calm beauty, the words of 'How Great Thou Art' began to form in his heart.

'How Great Thou Art' was first published in 1891, as a poem 'O Store Gud' (O Great God). It was later translated into German and Russian, before Stuart K. Hine, an English missionary to Ukraine, translated it into English sometime during the first World War.

We are so fortunate to live in such a beautiful, unspoiled part of the world, and privileged to have the freedom to enjoy the countryside around us. Whilst this hymn is a favourite when sung in Church, there are so many 'My God, how great Thou art' moments all around us, that it often springs to mind.

#### Praying Through The Seasons ... Autumn

"Thou crownest the year with thy goodness; and thy paths drop fatness. They drop upon the pastures of the wilderness: and the little hills rejoice on every side. The pastures are clothed with flocks; the valleys also are covered over with corn; they shout for joy, they also sing."

Psalm 65: 11-13

Autumn is a time of beauty and bounty, but it is also a time of transition and loss. The crops are harvested, leaving the land bare and empty; the leaves on the trees begin to change colour and then to fall; the transition from summer to winter has begun.

And yet, in the midst of these changes lies the Autumn Equinox, a time of perfect balance between the darkness and the light.

So often our own lives are out of balance; work v rest, apathy v activity, duty v pleasure ... Perhaps as the light of the day and the darkness of the night become perfectly balanced, Autumn could be an opportunity for us to focus on our own sense of balance.

Heavenly Father, in a world that is always wanting more, guide me that I might find and settle into a healthy rhythm of life; help me to see rest and stillness as a necessity for wellbeing, rather than as time wasted. Help me to pause and look properly at the beauty and bounty of the season of Autumn, to appreciate the endless circle of life, and to be content - Amen



A Boy Called David



### People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose – some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

#### David's Story

The people of Israel had asked God to give them a King; they wanted a powerful King, who would lead their army to great

victories. God chose Saul to be the first King of Israel. To start with things seemed to be going well; Saul led the armies, and many victories were won, but soon Saul forgot that he had once been an



ordinary person, doing an ordinary job; he forgot that it was God who had chosen him to be King, and that he had promised to obey God. King Saul began to ignore God, and he also ignored the warnings that God sent to him.

And so, God spoke with Samuel, one of the prophets, and told him he must seek a new King to replace King Saul. God told Samuel to go to a small town called Bethlehem, there he would find a man called Jesse who had eight sons; God told Samuel that one of these sons would be the next King of Israel.

When Samuel went to meet Jesse, he expected the oldest of the eight sons to be the one that God would choose to be the new King, but he was wrong. Samuel spoke to each son in turn, but he



knew that none of them were the one that God had chosen. He asked Jesse, "Have I met all of your sons?" Jesse replied, "My youngest son is called David, he is only a boy and is out in the fields watching the sheep."

Samuel asked Jesse to bring David to him.

As soon as Samuel saw David, he heard God say, "He is the one."



And so, Samuel anointed David with oil to show that he was the chosen one. David was only a young boy, and so he stayed in Bethlehem looking 's sheep, but from that day on, God was with him

after his father's sheep, but from that day on, God was with him and guided him.

Meanwhile, things weren't going too well for King Saul. His army of Israelites were at war with the neighbouring Philistine people, but the Philistines were definitely winning, because the

Philistines had a huge, great big giant in their army! Goliath was over 9 feet tall - almost as tall as a tree

 he wore a huge coat of armour and carried a massive spear. He challenged King Saul's army saying,

"Come and fight me if you dare! If you can beat me your army are the winners, but if I beat you, the whole of the Israelite army must become our slaves."

King Saul and his army heard Goliath shouting this, and they were all afraid. No one wanted to fight Goliath. Some of David's older brothers were in King Saul's army, and when they wrote to their father, they told him about the Philistine army and their giant. Their father was worried about his sons and sent young David to check on his brothers and take them food and fresh clothing. As David approached the camp, he could hear Goliath shouting and challenging the Israelite army. David said, "Is no one going to stand up to this man? Are you all going to just stand there and let him keep shouting his threats? If none of you will fight him, then

I will!"

A messenger was quickly sent to King Saul to tell him that David was willing to fight the giant; the King came along expecting to see a mighty warrior,

but when he saw young David he said, "What can you do against the giant? You are only a boy after all." David said, "When I look after my father's sheep, sometimes I have to fight with bears and wolves to protect them; I believe and trust in God to keep me safe then, and I believe and trust that God will keep me safe now."

King Saul saw that David was serious about fighting the giant, and so he gave him a suit of the finest armour and a strong spear to take with him into battle, but David preferred to wear his own clothes,

and he found the spear too heavy and too long. Instead, he picked 5 small stones from a stream that ran nearby and tucked them into his pouch where he also had a sling (which is a bit like a catapult). Then he walked out onto the field to meet Goliath.



Goliath saw him coming and was amazed that the Israelites would send a small boy out to fight him, he thought he was going to beat David easily and then the whole of the Israelite army

would have to become their slaves, but David said, "You may fight with a sword, but I have God on my side, and today everyone in this land will know that there is only one true God."

Then David reached into his pouch and took out one of the stones, he tucked it into the sling, and he

thwacked Goliath right between his eyes, and suddenly Goliath was toppling to the ground - David had done it! With God on his side, he had beaten Goliath.



The philistine army saw Goliath go crashing to the ground, and all ran away as fast as they could, but meanwhile the Israelites were celebrating and treated young David like a hero.

#### So, What Can We Learn From David's Story?

swung it round and round and round, and then ... he threw the stone as hard as he could The stone

There are lots of things that we can learn from this story: the first thing for Christians to learn, is that the story shows us how

God can protect us and is on our side when we truly believe and trust in Him, as David did.

The story of David and Goliath also shows us that if we have courage and stay true to what we believe in, we can achieve great things, even sometimes when other people might think something is impossible. Maybe the story of David confronting and beating the giant, will help you to believe in yourself the next time you have to do something that you find difficult.

The story of David and Goliath also reminds us that being the biggest and the strongest doesn't always mean that person is best. David is a small shepherd boy, who refuses to wear armour; Goliath is an enormous giant, with bronze armour and a spear. But David still manages to beat Goliath, because he is able to think clearly, carefully and differently. Never underestimate the power of good ideas!
