From Wednesday 12th of April, our Church will once again be open for private prayer on Wednesday afternoons between 2.30 and 4pm. Please feel free to call in for a few moments of calm and tranquillity. Many thanks to our volunteer 'Church Sitters', who have made it possible for us to offer this opportunity once more.

EcoChurch

Christ Church Ainsworth is now registered with A Rocha UK's award winning Eco Church Scheme. Eco Church is a scheme for churches in England and Wales who want to demonstrate that the gospel is good news for God's earth.

The fifth Mark of Mission is "to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth", and many church communities across the UK are already imaginatively living out the fifth Mark of Mission through care for God's creation.

The first step of the Eco Church journey is for us to complete an online questionnaire which highlights the ways in which we are already caring for God's world in our worship; in how we look after our

buildings and land; in how we engage with our local community and in global campaigns, and in how our congregation already integrate 'green' initiatives within their daily lives.

Completing the questionnaire creates a baseline and helps us to identify things that we are already doing well as a Church, and also areas that we need to improve on. The actions that we take will then help us to work towards an Eco Church Award at Bronze, Silver or Gold level.

We're really excited to be a part of this scheme, and to begin to look at the ways in which we can improve our 'green credentials'. Watch out for more information coming soon, but in the meantime, here's the

Eco Church Top Tip for April:

"Fit more active travel into your day and daily routine. As the weather warms up, it's worth considering what journeys can be made by walking or cycling. Could you get off the bus a stop early to walk the rest of your journey, take a relaxing stroll home, or hop on a bike and enjoy a cycle friendly route? If you prefer exploring outdoors on foot, find out if there's a local Ramblers group in your area."

Online Giving

Thanks to the wonders of modern technology, we are now able to accept online donations to support the work of our church.

Online giving is done via a website called 'Give A Little'; you can access our page by clicking on the following link: https://givealittle.co/campaigns/4e852de9-3667-426f-ae72-1747784eda0c

Or by scanning the following QR code with your mobile phone:



Once you've done that, choose the amount you wish to donate – the suggested options are £5, £10, £20 or £50, but there is also an option to click and choose your own amount. Next, simply follow the on screen instructions fill in your personal details, (if you are a tax payer you can choose to add Gift Aid to increase your donation), then enter your card

details. When you're finished, you'll get a 'Thank You' message on screen and you can request a receipt via email for your own records – simple!

Church Electoral Roll Review 2023

In accordance with Church of England regulations, the Church Electoral Roll must be reviewed prior to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

ALL members of the Parochial Church Council, Sidesmen, and anyone wishing to speak at the APCM or hold any office in Church, must be on the Church Electoral Roll.

The last date for accepting names will be 23rd April 2023. After this date, no names can be entered or removed from the Roll until after the APCM on 21st May 2023.

If you are currently on the Roll, you DO NOT need to complete a form. The name of anyone on the Roll but no longer attending church will be removed.

Electoral Roll

The criteria for admission to the Electoral Roll is:

- 1. Individuals have been baptised.
- 2. Individuals are a member of the Church of England or of any church in Communion with the Church of England.
- 3. Individuals are age sixteen or over.
- 4. Individuals are resident in the parish, or not being in the parish, have attended public worship in the parish during the last six months before the date of application for enrolment, and
- 5. Have signed a form of application for enrolment.

Forms are available in church and should be returned by Sunday 23rd April 2023.

Can You Help??

We are incredibly grateful to Mr. David Holden for taking on the role of Church Treasurer, this is a hugely important role within our Church, and an essential part of 'the way forwards' for us.

As David was previously our Independent Financial Auditor, it does mean that we now urgently need to find someone who is willing to audit the 2022 Church accounts – this must be done and signed off before our APCM in May. 
Brain Tumour Charity – Sponsored Walk Update

Holy Week And Easter

Easter is arguably the most important time in the Christian year; our preparations begin on Palm Sunday, as we recall Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey; the crowds welcomed Him, shouting 'Hosannah! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!', but already there were those who were looking for a reason to condemn Jesus and were plotting His downfall.

Maundy Thursday - The Last Supper

The following Thursday was the first day of the feast of Passover; the disciples met with Jesus to share the Passover meal. Before they all

sat down to eat, Jesus took water and a towel and insisted on washing the disciples' feet - a job that the lowest of the servants would usually have been expected to do. Before Jesus and His friends ate, Jesus thanked God for the bread and shared it with the disciples and said, "Take this and eat it. This is my body which is given for you". Then He took a full cup of wine, He thanked God for it and said, "This is my blood, which will be shed for many people so their sins may be forgiven."

Jesus told the disciples that they should always do that in future "in remembrance of me".

Good Friday - The Betrayal

Judas Iscariot was one of Jesus' disciples, but he had secretly decided to betray Jesus – early the next morning, Judas went with the Guards to the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus was praying with His disciples, he walked up to Jesus and kissed Him. Thus, identifying Him to the Guards, who arrested him.

Jesus was taken before the Governor, Pontious Pilate, for questioning; Pilate didn't find any reason to punish Jesus, but the people had turned against Jesus and demanded his death. Pilate tried to reason with the crowd, but without success.

And so Jesus was lead through the streets to a hill known as 'Golgotha', where He was crucified along with two other convicted criminals. The crowds gathered round mocking Him and calling out that He should save Himself.

Jesus died later that afternoon, and at the same moment a great darkness came over the whole land, whilst in the temple a huge curtain suddenly tore in half. Too late, some of the people realised that they had been wrong about Jesus, they realised that He truly was the Son of God.

Easter Sunday - The Resurrection

After Jesus died, His friends took His body away and placed it in a stone tomb; they wrapped Him in white cloths and, before they went away, they rolled a huge boulder in front of the tomb so that nothing and no one could get in.

On the third day, which was Sunday, Mary Magdalene and some of the other women went back to the tomb early in the morning, taking special oils with them. When they reached the tomb, they saw that the boulder had been moved and the tomb was open, and Jesus's body had gone. An angel appeared by the tomb and said to the women, "Do not be afraid. I know you are looking for Jesus who has died, but He isn't here; He has risen just as He said He would."

The angel spoke again, "If you want to find Jesus, He is on his way to Galilee."

As the women were returning to their homes, suddenly there was Jesus! The women knelt down and worshipped Him, Jesus told them not to be afraid, but to tell the disciples to go to Jerusalem, and He would see them there.



By the time you read this, we will have had two informal 'get togethers' at the Rose and Crown. The staff look after us so well and we thank them for their hospitality. We'll be back in the summer!

We will start back in the Church Hall on **Tuesday 18th April at 1.30pm for 2.00pm** for our delayed Christmas meal.

Several members contributed towards the Make a Mother's Day appeal and we were able to forward £55. I received a 'Thank You' letter which I will pin up on our notice board. In it, we heard about how the theme of Perseverance was making a difference in one woman's life.

Our work would not be possible without you. I wanted to share with

you one more example of the difference your support makes.



Machozi is a 26-year-old single mother from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Unlike her brothers, she was not allowed to attend school and was told that girls are only supposed to get married. Thanks to Mothers' Union's literacy program, Machozi is now literate and

excited to be able to help her daughter with her homework. She is also a passionate gender champion and has been trained to discuss issues in her community, such as gender-based violence and domestic violence.

"You can have a second chance in this world. I'm now able to get a salary and can even pay for my children's school fees when before I was literate, it was a real challenge".

Thank you for making a difference in the lives of women and girls. May God's promise of a hope-filled future comfort and bless you this Mothering Sunday.

So, what about activity in Manchester? The TOTAL of those impacted by our work in 2022 was 3424 people and in Jan-Feb 2023 it was 269. Just a couple of examples:

"Our members have just delivered a further substantial volume of toiletries to Thameside hospital and with the help our church Craft Class we have supplied 30 more blankets and hats for the Neo Natal unit at the hospital. We are still knitting Teddies for the chaplaincy at Manchester Airport." - St. Mary's Mothers' Union, Droylsden.

"We donated a shed to Women's Aid Salford Refuge". "I just wanted to say thank you so much for the fantastic shed! It is now up and running and looks fab. It is a really good size and will be so useful for us and any families we support if they need to store any larger items." - Jo - DAPA/ Domestic Abuse Prevention Advocate

Spring Council is in our new home of St John's House in Bury Town Centre on Saturday 22nd April. It is from 11.00am to 3.00pm. Everyone welcome. Bring your own lunch. Drinks provided.

From the Archives - April 1998

The inside cover of the April 1998 Parish Magazine included a fabulous sketch depicting the Last Supper, with Jesus and His disciples seated round a table, whilst in the background a shady looking character (presumably Judas) slipped out of the room. How incredible to be able to convey so much detail in a black and white line drawing!

As expected, the plans for Easter were clearly well underway, with details of the final Lent Devotionals, plus Holy Week Services, a Silent Procession of Witness, an Easter Eve Vigil and Service of Light, culminating in Holy Communion and Even Song on Easter Sunday – and breathe! Details of the Easter Vestry and APCM appeared in the Parish Diary, and also a reminder that the Church Spring Fair was imminent.

The Parish News page advised that the Parish Lottery had raised a grand total of £1052 in its first year, and reported that 15 candidates from Christ Church Ainsworth had recently been Confirmed by the Bishop of Manchester, the Right Revd Christopher Mayfield, at St. Thomas and St. John, Radcliffe. This page also contained a report from the PCC advising that in the light of the 'Resourcing Ministry Initiative' launched within the diocese, the PCC needed to look at ways of reducing expenditure and increasing income to try to ensure that the Parish Share payments could be met – any suggestions welcomed!

In other news, the Mothers' Union report took the form of a joint letter from Jennifer White, the new Presiding Member for Radcliffe & Prestwich Deanery, and June Hayes, the new Enrolling Member at Ainsworth, thanking everyone for their support and good wishes as they took on these new roles.

Rainbows and Brownies had enjoyed celebrating Thinking Day and were in the midst of making Mothering Sunday gifts; Cubs were gearing up for 'Job Week'; 3 Ventures had achieved their Venture Scout Award, and hooray! A couple of new leaders had been recruited to help out with the lads' organisations. Sunday School were less fortunate though, and reported having had to close for a week due to insufficient helpers being available – assistants urgently required! In March 1998, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mrs. Barbara Leigh - 'our hard working Magazine Advertisements Secretary', whilst the Holiday Church article, provided by Miss Bessie German, featured

When Jesus hung upon the cross, a robin was nearby, He watched all that was happening, then down to help did fly.


And as the robin tried to pluck the thorns from Jesus' head, A drop of blood splashed on his breast, and stained his feathers red.

The Hymn That's In My Head

Hymns and music play a large part in Christian worship; you can't beat listening to (or singing along with) a joyful, rousing hymn - whether it's in church, on the radio or listening to a CD. There are literally hundreds of fabulous hymns and worship songs out there.

"Be Still, My Soul" was written by Katharina Amalia Dorothea Von Schlegel, it was originally a German hymn which reads in German, Stille meine Wille, dein Jesus hilft siegen. The English version that we are familiar with today is a translation dating back to 1855, the work of Jane Laurie Borthwick.

The words of this hymn are sung to the hauntingly beautiful tune 'Finlandia', which was written by Jean Sibelius in 1899, originally as a series of 7 patriotic pieces, each reflecting portions of Finnish history. From a tumultuous opening which symbolises the struggles of the Finnish people, emerges the serenity of 'Finlandia', symbolising hope and resolution.

Currently sitting at number 23 in the 'Songs Of Praise Top 100 Hymns Chart, the words of this hymn are in fact a prayer for us to patiently put our trust in the Lord, even in the day of adversity. It tells us that no matter what we go through, God is on our side. He always has been, and He always will be; ultimately there is a joyful end to our sufferings. Whilst the words of this hymn are incredibly reassuring, 'Finlandia' seems to have been a popular choice on Classic FM recently, and once I hear those opening notes, I just can't help but join in!

1 Be still, my soul; the Lord is on your side; bear patiently the cross of grief or pain; leave to your God to order and provide; in ev'ry change he faithful will remain. Be still, my soul; your best, your heav'nly friend through thorny ways leads to a joyful end.

2 Be still, my soul; your God will undertake to guide the future as he has the past; your hope, your confidence, let nothing shake; all now mysterious shall be bright at last. Be still, my soul; the waves and winds still know his voice who ruled them while he lived below.

3 Be still, my soul; when dearest friends depart and all is darkened in the vale of tears, then you will better know his love, his heart, who comes to soothe your sorrows and your fears. Be still, my soul; your Jesus can repay from his own fullness all he takes away.

4 Be still, my soul; the hour is hast'ning on when we shall be forever with the Lord, when disappointment, grief, and fear are gone, sorrow forgot, love's purest joys restored.



People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose – some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

For the last few months, Little Fishes has been about Moses and Joshua, the people that God chose to lead the Israelites out of Egypt and towards the promised land. When Joshua eventually died, there wasn't really anyone suitable to take over as the leader - and so at that time, the people of Israel were ruled by 'Judges'. A Judge was kind of like a special leader that could help people. One of those Judges was called Gideon; you can read the full story in the book of Judges, chapter 6 - 7.

Gideon

It seemed that no matter how much God helped the people of Israel, and no matter how many miracles He performed for them, there would always be some of the people who were behaving badly, forgetting about the 10 Commandments that God had given them, and forgetting how much God had done for them. Every now and again, the people would go through a bad patch where they seemed to forget all of these things completely; when this happened, God would lose patience with the people and leave them to sort themselves out, and guess what - when this happened, everything started going wrong for the people of Israel!



Their enemies, the Midianites, sneaked into the Israelite's land and stole their animals and ruined the crops; the people of Israel ran away

and hid in the desert or in caves to try to escape from the enemy, until eventually they pleaded with God to help them again.

Even though God must have been very disappointed by this behaviour, God always listens when we are sorry and ask Him to forgive us and help us, and it was the same with the people of Israel

Gideon was an ordinary person, just going about his daily tasks and minding his own business; he wasn't super brave, or super strong, or super clever. One day, as he went about his work, an angel of the Lord came to him and said, "The Lord is with you, mighty warrior. You must save the people of Israel from their enemies, the Midianites.'

Gideon couldn't believe he was hearing this! He was just an ordinary person - how could he possibly do what the angel told him to do? But the angel knew exactly what Gideon was thinking, and he said, "Do not fear; God will be with you and will help you to do this."

Gideon was still very uncertain, so he asked God for a sign, something to prove that God really was with him. Gideon left a

sheep's fleece outside his door over night; he said to himself, "If this really is what God wants me to do, in the morning the grass will be wet with dew, but God will make the fleece stay dry."

Sure enough, next morning the grass was wet through, but the fleece was dry!

Gideon was still not sure, so he left the fleece outside once again and said, "If this really is what God wants me to do, in the morning the fleece will be wet with dew, but God will make the grass all around the fleece stay dry."

And guess what ... next morning, there was the fleece, all wet and soggy, but the ground was completely dry!

So now Gideon had to believe that God had chosen him and would help him to defeat the Midianites.



Late that night, Gideon sneaked down to the place where the Midianites were camping, and he hid outside their tents and listened to what they were saying; he heard someone talking about how

the Midianites were so powerful that the Israelites would never be able to get rid of them, not even if every single person came out to fight them all together! But then Gideon heard one of the men telling his friends about a strange dream he'd had about a huge loaf of bread rolling into their camp and knocking the tents over. Then he heard someone else say that the dream was to do with the sword of Gideon, and that God would help the Israelites to defeat the Midianites!

Gideon crept away, and began to gather the biggest army that you



could possibly imagine, there were literally thousands of people in the army; Gideon probably felt quite pleased (and also relieved) that so many people had come to help to defeat the

Midianites, but God had other ideas ... He knew that He had to do something special, otherwise the Israelite's would think that they had beaten the enemy all by themselves, and would go right back to behaving badly and forget all about God until the next time they needed something.

So, God said to Gideon, "This army is too big. Tell anyone here that is afraid of fighting the Midianites to go home."

Gideon did as God told him, and absolutely loads of the Israelite army turned out to be frightened about fighting the Midianites, so absolutely **loads** of people quickly went back home.

Gideon felt a bit nervous about this, but God hadn't finished yet, he told Gideon, "This army is still too big! Take all the people down

to the river to drink; anyone who drinks the water in a certain way must be sent home."

So, Gideon took his army down to the river to drink, and only 300 out of all the thousands of people there, drank the water in the exact way that God had told to Gideon, so everyone else was sent away!



Now there were only 300 people left, including Gideon, but by now Gideon understood that God was on His side, and he made a cunning plan. He told the 300 Israelites to split up into 3 equal groups, and that each person should take with them a

trumpet, and a small jar with a flaming torch in it. By this time the people trusted Gideon and did as he told them.

Once it was dark, Gideon went to the Midianite's camp with his teeny little army. There were thousands of tents, but Gideon did his best to keep trusting God. He told the people that they must surround the tents and to have their trumpets and their torches at the ready, and when

he gave the signal, everyone should blow their trumpets really loudly and hold their torch up in their hand.

This didn't seem like a great strategy for beating the huge Midianite army ...

But remember, God was on Gideon's side and had promised to help him. When Gideon gave the signal, the 300 Israelites blew their



trumpets as loudly as they could, and the flames from their torches suddenly shone all around the camp ... and guess what ... The Midianites were filled with terror! They ran out of their tents and simply ran away; the Israelite army didn't even have to fight,

they simply blew their trumpets and held their torches high and watched as the Midianites fled into the darkness.

And so, with God's help, Gideon saved the Israelite people and defeated the Midianite army.

So, What Can We Learn From Gideon's Story?

Gideon was just an ordinary person; he was probably really scared about what he was being asked to do, but he knew He could trust God. And so can we! We might not think we are special or strong, but we don't have to be. We just need to be willing to listen and to let God work through us, and if we can do that, we know He will always give us whatever it is that He has promised us - how amazing is that!

Prayer Time ...

Loving God, help us to remember that the Bible is there to teach us about You. Even though Gideon was just an ordinary person, he was part of your plan and You helped him to be brave and keep trusting You. Help us to remember that You are there for everyone. If we feel scared or worried about something, help us to remember that we can always talk to You and trust You - Amen.
