EcoChurch

We have lots of fun activities going on at Church this Summer, but EcoChurch isn't just about what we do in Church, it's also about considering our own actions and lifestyles, and how they might impact on nature and the world's resources.

Top Tip for August:

Help birds in hot weather. Keeping your bird bath topped up with fresh water in warmer weather can be a life saver for our feathered friends. Get your garden birds through a heatwave when natural supplies, like worms, become scarce, by putting out supplementary food - black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal, soaked sultanas, raisins and currants, mealworms, waxworms and good seed mixture.

Raising Awareness – Earth Overshoot Day; 1st August 2024

What Is It? Imagine the planet as a huge piggy bank where, instead of money, we deposit all the natural resources we need to live: water, air, trees, etc.

Now, think of Earth Overshoot Day as the moment each year when we've taken out everything the Earth can afford to give us within that year, and we start overdrawing.

This date moves around each year due to the many variables affecting energy consumption etc, but it has been creeping earlier since the 1970s due to the ever increasing demands we place on the earth's resources.

Why do we mark this day? Earth Overshoot Day is a wake-up call, a reminder that we're using resources faster than the Earth can replenish them. The main culprits are how much we consume, how we make things, how many of us there are, and how much nature can produce.

Think of it as nature's way of saying, "Hey, you're spending too fast!"

But it's not all about doom and gloom; Earth Overshoot Day is a chance to change how we live, consume, and think about our planet. It's about finding a balance that ensures our Earth's piggy bank stays healthy and full, not just for us but for all future generations.

What Can We Do To Help?

Calculate Your Footprint: use an online calculator to find out your personal Earth Overshoot Day, then, challenge yourself to change your lifestyle to push that date back. Share your results and encourage others to do the same.

Green Your Commute: try to reduce your carbon footprint by walking, biking, carpooling, or using public transport, even if it's just for 1 week each month. Share your experience on social media to inspire others to consider more sustainable ways to get around.

Support Sustainable Brands: commit to buying products from companies that prioritize sustainability. Choosing eco-friendly brands can make a big difference in clothing, food, or everyday items.

Join a Local Cleanup: participate in or organise a local cleanup event in your community. Cleaning up local parks and communal areas helps the environment and strengthens community bonds.

Educate and Advocate: share information on your social media channels about Earth Overshoot Day and why it matters. Encourage discussions on how we can all contribute to a more sustainable planet..

Mission Community News - Litter Picking Event

The first ever Radcliffe & Whitefield Mission Community Litter Picking Event was hailed as a great success.

Across the 8 Churches of our Mission Community, there were 77 Litter Pickers out on Weds 17th July, and another 38 out on Saturday 20th July, collecting a grand total of 52 bags of rubbish.



As well as being a great outreach opportunity, this event will feed into our EcoChurch journey as individual Churches and also as a Mission Community.

A number of Churches reported 'meaningful encounters' with members of their wider community whilst out and about litter licking, plus support from people who don't usually attend Church – a great result all round!



From the Archives - August 1999

The sketch on the inside front cover of the Parish Magazine in August 1999 depicted people wearing sunglasses and looking up to the sky ... all becomes clear on reading the article later in the magazine; a solar eclipse lasting around 2 hours was expected to occur at 11am on the 11th of August that year!

In August 1999, 'News From The Parish' brought a number of reminders and requests with regards to the forthcoming Flower Festival – donations of supplies for refreshments, plus volunteers to help out on the day would be greatly appreciated. There were also a number of messages of sympathy and condolence with regards to the death of Geoff Wood, who had been an active member of the church and Church Choir for many years.

Elsewhere, the Uniformed Organisations may have been on their Summer break, but the ladies of the Parish were as busy as ever: Mothers' Union members were invited to a Service at All Saints, Stand, to commemorate the life and work of Mary Sumner, they were also planning their annual trip to Mossley for a shared Church Service followed by Afternoon Tea. The ladies of the Church Women's Fellowship had enjoyed an 'interesting and informative talk' given by Bolton Mountain Rescue Team; and members of Cockey Moor Women's Institute had held a musical entertainment evening to celebrate their 6th birthday.

The Committee of Ainsworth Church & Community Hall thanked everyone who had contributed to the 'decorating fund'; the New Room was due to be painted before the end of the Summer break; whilst a report from Christ Church Ainsworth PTA thanked everyone for supporting the various fundraising initiatives that school had run throughout the course of the year.

In August 1999, the 'Face To Face' interview was with 'A good friend and colleague, Mr. Belli, the Minister at Ainsworth Methodist Church'. In August 1999 there were 4 Baptism, 1 Wedding and 2 Funerals recorded from the previous month. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 352, collections were listed as £1863.

Space To Share A Prayer

For All The Saints – August; St. Clare of Assisi

Name: St. Clare of Assisi Feast Day: 11th August Born: 16th July 1194 Died: 11th August 1253

Place of burial: Basilica di Santa Chiara, Assisi, Italy.

Patron Saint Of: Eye disease, goldsmiths, laundry, television, bicycle

messengers, good weather, and needle workers!!

Clare was born in Assisi, the eldest daughter of a wealthy Roman family. From an early age Clare and her younger siblings received a thorough religious education from their mother; Clare was particularly influenced by the works and teachings of Francis of Assisi.

At the age of 12, Clare was to be given in marriage to a wealthy young noble of her father's choosing, however Clare fled before this could happen.

Clare approached Francis and asked him to help her to live after the manner of the Gospel. On the evening of Palm Sunday, 20 March 1212, with the consent of the Bishop of Assisi, Clare left her father's house accompanied by her Aunt Bianca and another companion, and proceeded to the chapel of the Porziuncula to meet Francis. There, her hair was cut, and she exchanged her rich gown for a plain robe and veil. Fully cutting a woman's hair was a symbolic act showing that she was no longer bound by the laws of man or society but rather that she followed the will of God.

Francis placed Clare in the convent of the Benedictine nuns of San Paulo, near Bastia. Her father, along with other members of her family, attempted to convince her to return home. At first, they tried to persuade her by enticing her with wealth, and the privileges of nobility, but she resisted each attempt, professing that she would have no other husband but Jesus Christ.

Finally, when they tried to use force, she clung to the altar of the church and threw aside her veil to show her cropped hair. It was only after seeing her cropped hair that her family relented and left her in peace. In order to provide the greater solitude Clare desired, Francis later sent her to another monastery of the Benedictine nuns on one of the flanks of Subasio.

During her lifetime, Clare founded the 'Order of Poor Ladies', a monastic religious order for women in the Franciscan tradition. The Order of Poor Ladies was different from any other order or convent because it followed a rule of strict poverty. Clare herself, wrote their Rule of Life, the first set of monastic guidelines known to have been written by a woman.

Clare is credited with performing a number of miracles during her lifetime, most famously, during the Crusades era, when a pair of Saracen armies attacked the monastery of San Damiano and the town of Assisi, both targets were successfully defended as Clare prayed to Christ, present in the Blessed Sacrament. Following her death, the order she founded was renamed in her honour as the 'Order of Saint Clare', commonly referred to today as the 'Poor Clares'. Her feast day is on 11th August.

People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose – some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

Job

Soon after, a servant came to Job and told him that whilst his oxen and donkeys were in the fields, robbers had come and taken them and killed all the servants except for him!

Job was still trying to understand all of these things, when another servant came rushing up to him and told Job that his children and all the rest of his family were eating a meal, when a great wind came and killed everyone, except for the servant who was talking.

Job stood up and tore off his robe and shaved his head, but he didn't get angry with God; instead, he knelt down on the ground in prayer. Job said, "The Lord gives, and He takes away, blessed be the name of the Lord."

Satan was not impressed with this; he had hoped to upset Job and make him doubt God. But Satan had another idea to try to upset Job. Satan told God that Job had stayed faithful to God, only because he didn't really care about his children, or his animals, or his family; losing those things didn't hurt him physically. After his friends had gone, Job prayed to God, he prayed for his friends, and he also asked God what he could do to try to make things better.

God heard Job's prayers and saw that he had never doubted or been unfaithful, even after all of the disasters and bad luck that had befallen him, and so God blessed Job; He rewarded him by giving Job back all of the things

that he had lost, and even giving him some more!

We may not know why things happen, but God does, and even when we don't completely understand things, we can always trust Him.
