Interregnum Update

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43; v19.

Whilst we may still be experiencing cold, wet weather and dark nights and mornings; all around us there are the first signs of Spring. Snowdrops are appearing, tiny leaf buds can be seen on the hedgerows, the birds are singing earlier and settling later. The seasons change as they always have and always will; hope and new beginnings are all around us — behold, I am doing a new thing ... And this is true not just of the weather and the seasons. God is at work in all aspects of our lives - in our families, our relationships, our communities, and in the life of our Church.

As our Church approaches the 2nd anniversary of our interregnum, perhaps it would be helpful to view this period of time in the same way; not as a dark time which must be endured, but as a changing of the seasons, a time which has allowed us to review what we do and how we work; an opportunity to try new things and make new connections; an opportunity for people to explore their own gifts and to consider what they might bring to the life of our Church. Whilst interregnum is hard work and unsettling, it can also be a time of great hope and opportunities – behold, I am doing a new thing!

The vacancy at Christ Church Ainsworth has been advertised again in recent weeks, and soon we will hear whether there have been any applicants this time. Let us all hope and pray that the coming months bring the appointment of a new Incumbent to work alongside us and continue to build on all that has been achieved; to begin the next season of the life of our Church and worshipping community.

Caring for our environment isn't limited to our churchbased activities; we can all make small changes to our lifestyles which, collectively, would undoubtedly make a difference.

Make A Difference - February:

Communication – At Church we now send many of our comunications out via e-mail; this is quicker, more cost efective – AND has a much lower carbon footprint than traditional hand written / printed communications. It has the added bonus that we're saving paper as many thinbgs can be viewed and actioned without the need to print..

It's lovelty to receive a letter / card through the post, and there are many things that still need to be sent by mail, but did you know that the carbon footprint of a letter written / typed on non-recycled paper and sent via mail, ultimately ending up in landfill, is over 350 x greater than that same document sent via email and viewed online? Could you consider receiving invoices, bank staements and similar documents via email?

Christingle 2024 Update

Thank you to everyone who came to the Christingle Service at Church on Wednesday 4th December. It was a very enjoyable Service and a lovely way to start the festive season.

Firstly, I would like to thank Debra and Alison for their help organising and conducting the Service, and the fabulous Midweek Praise Children for singing so beautifully. All of the adults were a little tearyeyed afterwards! I should also like to thank Gwen for her very kind donation of the Smartie tubes, as these raised a wonderful £137.63. Thanks to all of the children for remembering to fill them with 20p or £1.00 coins, as your donations will help other children in real need. A further £149.08 was collected from Christingle envelopes and from cash placed on the collection plate at the Service. Thank you for your generosity.

I also must thank the 16th Radcliffe Brownies for taking part in the Christingle Challenge and raising £29.90 for the Christingle appeal.

This means that a grand total of £316.61 was collected for The Children's Society and their work with young people!!

The impact of your donations cannot be overstated. It is estimated that right now as many as 1.5million children are struggling with fears and anxiety or abuse. The Children's Society believes that every child should be protected and have the resources they need to thrive. Candlemas



Originally known as 'The Feast Of The Purification Of The Blessed Virgin Mary', this ancient Christian festival is celebrated on 2nd of February, and commemorates the ritual purification of Mary, 40 days after the birth of her son, Jesus. On this day, Christians also commemorate the presentation of Christ in the Temple – 40 days after the birth of a Jewish boy it was customary to take him to the Temple to be presented to God by his thankful parents.

This ancient festival also marks the midway point between the shortest day and the Spring equinox, and became known as the 'Festival of Lights' as people celebrated the lengthening of daylight with the approach of Spring.

In more recent times, the term Candlemas has slipped into our dialogue; on this day, traditionally, the candles that would be used to light the Church, and within worship, throughout the coming year, would be brought into Church and blessed.

Candles were important, not only as a source of light, but as a reminder that Jesus is the light of the world;

"When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

Church Electoral Roll 2025

In accordance with Church Representations Rules, a new Electoral Roll must be prepared every six years. As this process was last carried out in 2019 a new Roll must therefore be prepared this year, 2025.

The date which governs preparation of the new Roll is that of the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM), the date for which is Sunday 27th April.

Those wishing to have their name entered on the Roll should apply by completing and returning the electoral roll application form to the Electoral Roll Officer.

The Church of England has published guidance regarding GDPR and the Electoral Roll. A Privacy Notice will therefore be issued with all Electoral Roll Application forms.

The forms will be available in church as from Sunday 23rd February and must be returned by Sunday 23rd March. Eligible forms received after this date will be entered on the Roll after the APCM.

Eligibility to be entered on the Electoral Roll is set out in the Church Representative Rules and is as follows:

- 1. Are baptized and aged 16 or over:
- 2. Have signed a form of application for enrolment: and either
- 3. Are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or not being resident in the parish, having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment:

4. Are members in good standing of a Church not in communion with the Church of England which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves to be also members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

All members of the Parochial Church Council, Sidesmen, anyone who wishes to speak at the Annual Parochial Council Meeting or hold any office in Church, must be on the Electoral Roll of the Church.

Raising Awareness; Dead Slow Campaign

Our Village may be comparatively rural, but a huge volume of traffic passes through on a daily basis; not just on the main routes through, but also on the side roads and estates. Because our village is semi-rural, there are also a large number of 'vulnerable road users',

such as cyclists, horse riders and carriage drivers using these routes. As the number of vehicles continues to increase resulting in busier roads, these routes (even the quieter roads) are becoming much more dangerous for vulnerable road users.

The British Horse Society collates statistics each year to understand the rate of incidents involving horses and riders on UK roads. The following statistics were recorded between 01.01.2023 – 31.12.2023:

- * 3,383 road incidents involving horses were reported to The British Horse Society.
- * 66 horses are known to have died and 86 have been injured
- * 3 people have died and 94 are known to have been injured because of road incidents
- * 85% of incidents occurred because a vehicle passed by too closely or too quickly.

What's more according to www.gov.uk in 2023:

- * 14,999 road incidents involving cyclists were reported
- * 87 cyclists are known to have been killed on the roads
- * 3,942 cyclists are known to have suffered serious injuries because of road incidents
- * 10,970 cyclists are known to have suffered minor injuries because of road incidents

And these are only the incidents that are actually reported, either by those involved, or by the emergency services who attend the incident. Many, many more 'minor skirmishes' and 'near misses' go unreported each year.

Much work has been done in recent years to ensure that vulnerable road users are represented in new traffic legislation; equestrians and cyclists have the same right to be on the road as motorists or any other user group. Understanding, respect and consideration by all road users is required to ensure road safety for everyone.

Did you know that the Highway Code was updated in January 2022? Section 163 now states:

"Give motorcyclists, cyclists and horse riders and horse drawn vehicles at least as much room as you would when overtaking a car. As a guide:

Leave at least **1.5 metres** when overtaking cyclists at speeds of up to 30mph and give them more space when overtaking at higher speeds.

Pass horse riders and horse-drawn vehicles at speeds under 10 mph and allow at least 2 metres of space

Allow at least **2 metres of space and keep to a low speed** when passing a pedestrian who is walking in the road (for example, where there is no pavement).

Take extra care and give more space when overtaking motorcyclists, cyclists, horse riders, horse drawn vehicles and pedestrians in bad weather (including high winds) and at night.

You should wait behind the motorcyclist, cyclist, horse rider, horse drawn vehicle or pedestrian and not overtake if it is unsafe or not possible to meet these clearances."

Most horse riders and many cyclists would not choose to be on the roads; the reality is that there are fewer and fewer safe 'off road' routes for these vulnerable road users, and often, ironically, they will need to use the roads to access the off-road routes.

Whilst out and about around the village with my own horses, I come across many excellent drivers who are careful, sensible and do their best to give us the time and space that we need to be safe, and we are always massively grateful to these people. However, there have been a number of 'vulnerable road user' accidents recorded in our village over the years, and several 'near-misses' recorded in recent months; so here's some advice from the British Horse Society:

When you see a horse being led, ridden or driven on the road:

- Slow down to a maximum of 10mph
- Be patient, don't sound your horn or rev your engine
- Pass the horse wide and slow at least two metres
- Drive slowly away
- Be prepared to stop if necessary.
- Look out for hand signals stop or slow down if asked this is for your own safety as well as that of others.
- Be alert if a rider or carriage driver is signalling to turn, wait patiently for them to complete their manoeuvre before continuing your journey.
- If you think the horse looks nervous, please stop, if necessary, turn off your engine and allow the horse to pass you. Please don't start your engine or move off again until the horse is well clear of the rear end of your vehicle.

- If passing a horse from behind heed the rider, handler or carriage driver's signal. Only pass if safe to do so. If the horse looks nervous or the person in control of the horse is having difficulty - leave plenty of space between you and the horse and wait patiently for the horse to be under control, or for them to pull over to a safe place to pass.
- If a road is narrow and there is not enough room to pass safely, please approach slowly, or stop, and allow the equestrian to find a safe place off the road where you can pass safely.
- Please be patient. Most equestrians will do their best to reassure their horses and will allow you to pass as soon as safe to do so.
- Look out for equestrian road signs these signs indicate you are likely to encounter a horse on your journey.

The British Horse Society has launched a virtual reality film, to show drivers what it's like to be riding a horse when a car passes too fast or too close. Viewing the film gives the alarming first-hand experience of being on a horse as a vehicle passes too close. 

From the Archives – February 2000

The sketch on the inside cover of the February 200 Parish Magazine was a fabulous depiction of the animals going two by two into Noah's Ark; in spite of a thorough search through, there is no indication in the content of the magazine as to why this picture was chosen – maybe one of our readers would know?

In addition to the regular Services, the Parish Diary for February 2000 included details of a Confirmation Service to be held at Christ Church Ainsworth, led by Bishop David, the then Bishop of Bolton. Other news from the parish included the acknowledgement of donations to

church received in memory of Harold Foster, and a thankyou for cards and good wishes received on the occasion of a 90th birthday.

The various groups and Uniformed Organisations were not long back from the Christmas break, however 16th Radcliffe Brownies were already well on the way with their badge work, whilst 12th Radcliffe Guides were busy planning their Thinking Day activities.

The Day School reported that their Christmas Fair had raised an impressive £2800,00 – a huge amount of money even now! They also announced a Quiz night 'coming soon, by popular request'.

In February 2000, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Phil Hood, "the other half of the Social Committee dynamic duo". In February 2000 there were 5 Baptisms and 4 Funerals recorded from the previous month, but no weddings. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 356, collections were listed as £1573.

Church Seasons & Traditions – February; Candlemas

Candles are often used as part of our worship, both for ambience and also as a symbol of Jesus Christ, the light of the world; in John 8:12, Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of my life."

There are many things that we can learn about our own faith from the humble candle:

- 1. A candle cannot light itself. It needs to receive light from another.
- 2. A candle when lit can give away its light without losing the light it has.
- 3. A candle burns as brightly when it is new, as it does when there is only a small amount of the original candle left.
- 4. A candle's light is sensitive, reacting to the slightest movement of the air around it.
- 5. A candle's light is the same whatever the size, shape or colour of the candle.
- 6. A candle's light is designed to be seen and is best placed high up so that it can give light to all; it is not for hiding away.
- 7. A candle's flame burns upward while it sheds its light outward.
- 8. Unless a candle's light is passed on, that light dies when the candle itself comes to an end.

- 9. At the heart of the candle's light there is a death happening, as the wick is burnt up and the wax around it melts and evaporates; in the same way, the light of Christ came only from the death of Jesus on the cross.
- 10. When eventually a candle is snuffed out, it's presence remains in the smell that lingers within the room; in the same way, the presence of Jesus remains with us everywhere, even when we cannot see a candle burning to remind us that He is there.

Things To Look Out For In February – Siskins

Siskins are part of the finch family; they are comparatively small – slightly larger than a blue tit and are native to much of the UK. Much of the UK's siskin population stay here all year round, but winter will also see the arrival of migrants from northern Europe, which will leave again at the onset of spring.

Male siskins have a bright yellow breast and cheeks, and a black cap, while females are predominantly pale with dark streaks and traces of dull yellow. Both males and females have yellow-and-black-striped wings.

Siskins feed mainly on tree seeds, often hanging upside down whilst feeding, but supplement their diet with insects during the winter months. During the winter months when food is less readily available, they often frequent garden bird feeders.

Catkins

Catkins are long slim clusters of tiny flowers that grow on some trees. They have small petals, or none at all. Many catkins appear over winter and are easy to spot on the leafless branches. They tend to flower during spring, but it depends on the weather.

Catkins enable female flowers to be pollinated when pollen from male flowers is blown by the wind. Male catkins drop off after releasing pollen, whereas female catkins collect pollen and then release the seeds. Once the seeds have developed, they are dispersed by the wind to avoid growing right below the parent tree.





Jesus In The Temple



Stories Of Jesus

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The first part of the Bible is called the Old Testament; this part of the Bible was written before Jesus was born.

The second part of the Bible is called the New Testament; this part of the Bible tells us all about the life and death of Jesus, about the things that He did, and about the people that knew Him.

Jesus of Nazareth - The Early Years

As a child, Jesus lived in a small village called Nazareth; he lived with his parents Mary and Joseph. Joseph was a Carpenter.



Jesus was probably just like all of the other young children in Nazareth at that time; I imagine he played out with his friends; learned to help out at home, and went to the synagogue to worship God, and to learn the laws of Moses.

Each year the people would travel from all of the small villages to Jerusalem, to attend the Feast of the Passover. Each year Mary and Joseph would have made this journey with their family and friends; when Jesus was 12 years old he was allowed to go with them

It was almost 70 miles from Nazareth to Jerusalem; the people would travel together, many of them walking, some of them might



have a donkey to ride on or perhaps a small cart for their belongings. As the group from Nazareth travelled along, many other families joined them

and travelled with them. By the time they arrived at Jerusalem there was a huge group of people from the towns and villages they had passed through on their journey.

The children must have been very excited to arrive in Jerusalem; to see the huge temple; to see and hear so many people from all

parts of the country. After their long journey they were probably also looking forward to the great feast that they would all enjoy.

Jesus and his friends thoroughly enjoyed exploring the city and seeing the sights of Jerusalem, but even though he was still just a

child, Jesus was beginning to realise that God was his Father, and that he must work for God. So instead of running off to play and explore with his friends, Jesus listened to the readings of the law, and to the words of the chief priests and scribes, who taught the Jews every day.



After the Feast had ended, the people gathered up their belongings, and set off on the road heading back towards their own villages and towns. Mary did not see Jesus when they were setting off; but she wasn't worried - she presumed he must be playing or exploring with some of his friends. But when it came to their evening meal and Jesus was still nowhere to be seen, Mary and Joseph began to search for him. All through the company they went, asking about Jesus; but no one had seen him that day.

Mary and Joseph were very worried by this time, and so they left the company and began to retrace their steps - heading back towards Jerusalem to try to find Jesus.

For three days they searched for their missing child. On the third day they found him, not playing with other boys in the streets, but sitting in the temple among the wise teachers, and asking them questions, which they could hardly answer!



Mary was surprised when she found her son in the temple among the wise men. To her, Jesus was just a boy, just like all of his friends, and she was surprised to find him so deeply interested in the teachings of God.

Mary came to Jesus and said, "Son, why did you stay here when we were starting home? Your father and I have been looking for you everywhere."

Jesus answered, "Why did you look for me? Did you not know that I must be about my Father's business?"

Jesus wasn't talking about Joseph when he said this, he meant, "Why did you not know where to find me at once? For I must be about my heavenly Father's business."

The wise men in the temple had been very surprised when Jesus



came and sat with them and began to ask them questions; they were even more surprised at how much he seemed to know about God and about the laws of Moses. They had gathered round him to ask questions that only wise people could

answer - and Jesus answered every one correctly!

Mary and Joseph couldn't understand how Jesus came to know all of these things; Mary thought back to the time before Jesus was born, when the angel had come to her and told her that she was going to have a baby, and that baby would be the Son of God. She held all of these things in her heart.

And then Mary and Joseph and Jesus left the teachers in the Temple at Jerusalem and returned to Nazareth. Jesus was an obedient child, and as the years passed by, he grew into a kind and sensible young man; he continued to study the Bible, but he also helped Joseph with his work and eventually became a Carpenter himself.

Jesus lived quietly in Nazareth until he was about 30 years old.
