Here's looking forward to a positive and proactive year ahead for our Church and wishing everyone at Christ Church Ainsworth a peaceful and prosperous New Year.



Epiphany

January 6th is the Feast of the Epiphany, sometimes called "Three Kings Day," and starts what some consider to be the Season of or after Epiphany, continuing until Ash Wednesday. In some cultures, January 6th is a large and festive end to the Christmas season; a day of presents, parades, and celebration. Epiphany is an invitation to follow stars, listen to dreams, and step out of what we have always known.

The Gospel of Matthew tells us this is the day the magi ("kings") arrived in Bethlehem, directed by angels and guided by a star,

bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to Jesus. Gold symbolized Jesus as a king. Frankincense and myrrh are sweet-smelling resins that were burned as sacred offerings and during burials. The magi go home by another road. Little else is known about them, although a robust tradition has grown around them over time, including their number (three) and their names (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar). This holy mystery invites us to wonder who the magi are and how their sacred story intersects with our own. Who or what is leading you to God incarnate? Which stars will you follow this year and what road will you take? What gifts will you offer?

Raising Awareness – The Big Garden Bird Watch; 24 – 26th January 2025

Big Garden Birdwatch is co-ordinated by the RSPB and is the world's largest garden wildlife survey. Every year, hundreds of thousands of nature lovers take part, helping to build a picture of how garden birds and small creatures are faring.

How To Take Part ...

Choose an hour between $24-26^{th}$ January; spend that hour watching the birds in your patch and record any birds that land. Record the highest number of each bird species you see at any one time, then send your results back online or by post.

Last Year ... Across the UK, over 600,000 people took part in Big Garden Birdwatch 2024, counting a whopping 9.7 million birds! House Sparrows took the top spot, but counts of these chirpy birds are down by 60% compared to the first Birdwatch in 1979. In fact, we've lost 38

million birds from UK skies in the last 60 years. With birds facing so many challenges, it's more important than ever to get involved in the Birdwatch. Every bird you do – or don't – count will give a valuable insight into how garden birds are faring.

Mission Community News

Christ Church Ainsworth is part of the group of Churches which form the Radcliffe & Whitefield Mission Community. The Mission Community allows our Churches to come together to support one another as we seek to grow, nurture and serve our individual communities.

The Radcliffe & Whitefield Mission Community works on a 'Task Group' basis with separate Task Groups working on 'Growing', 'Nurturing' and 'Serving' projects, plus an additional 'Prayer & Spirituality' task group.

The Growing Group aim to identify and develop ways in which our individual Churches might help our worshipping communities to grow in faith and in numbers; themes have included communication, spreading the word, working with schools, and Baptism preparation.

The Nurturing Group consider ways in which we might support and encourage individuals in their faith journeys; themes have included co-ordinating study groups and training courses.

The Serving Group are tasked with considering how we can best serve our worshipping and wider communities; themes have included pastoral care and EcoChurch.

The Prayer & Spirituality Group works on the basis that prayer must underpin all that we do; this group works to identify prayer needs and opportunities which can be shared throughout our Mission Community, and have brought us such initiatives as the weekly shared prayers, Lent and Advent Zoom prayers, and most recently, the Mission Community Prayer Diary.

Task Groups meet roughly every 6 weeks for around an hour, usually in the evenings; we would love to have a representative from our Church on each task group. If you are interested in getting involved or want to know more, please get in touch via ainsworthparishinfo@gmail.com

My Mothers' Union Journey - Enid Horrocks

In August 1961 my husband and I married and moved to a small new housing estate in Bromley Cross, Bolton. We still continued to travel each week to our home church in Bolton where we had both worshipped for many years, going back to Sunday School, Youth Club, joining the church choir etc.

We settled quickly into our new home and very shortly a message was going around the estate that the Vicar's wife from Christ Church, Walmsley, was wanting to open a Young Wives' group in the small Chapel next to our homes. Many of our neighbours decided to go along to the first meeting and I joined them. Mrs. Burnett (the Vicar's wife) took the meetings and she very often mentioned the Mothers' Union, what they did, how often they met etc. After quite a few months at these very friendly evening meetings we asked why we had to be a Young Wives' group and not Mothers' Union, and to cut a long story short, I along with others joined MU in November 1964.

In 1970 we moved again and I continued to be a member at St. Philip's, Bolton, but because they met in the afternoon and I was now back at work this made going to meetings very difficult. We moved to our first Post Office in 1975 and I still just paid my subs and went to meetings as and when possible. We moved to our second Post Office in Abram, Wigan. On our first day of opening I decided to wear my Mothers' Union badge, as we were quite near the local Church and I thought someone would notice it and I could make contact. It worked and I very quickly made new friends and attended the meetings. The meetings were evening ones and I was able to attend each week. As happens, we moved back again to Bolton, another Post Office, and I continued paying subs to St. Philip's and attending when possible.

In 1992, we decided to retire as we had heard changes were coming in the Post Office and didn't want to retrain. We made a big move and went to live at Rhos-on-Sea, North Wales. We quickly joined the local Church in Wales church (similar to the Church of England) and they had a Mothers' Union branch. I joined within a few weeks: they had an afternoon group and evening group with around 110 members in all.

Around 6 months after joining, the Vicar's wife rang to say that they needed a Treasurer and as she knew that we were ex-Post Office she thought that I would be able to take it on. I took it on which led to becoming Enrolling Member (the former name for Branch Leaders). I did this until coming back to Lancashire in 2002 to be near to family in Tottington. We tried two other churches before settling here at Ainsworth.

Here in Ainsworth I have been Treasurer, Branch Leader and Deanery Leader, but now just enjoy attending meetings and helping out when needed. Things have changed over the years and numbers here and nationwide have dropped significantly, but we are continuing here as best we can. We have had to make changes in order to pay our way but we are still enjoying each other's company.

New members are always welcome. Come along, have a cup of tea and see what we are about.

From the Archives – January 2000

Not surprisingly at the dawn of a new millennium, the sketch on the inside front cover of the Parish Magazine depicted a calendar just turning on to 'January 2000!', amidst a display of fireworks; what an exciting time that was. In his letter to the Parish, Father Alan

cautioned his Parishioners not to lose sight of the significance of the Christmas Season amidst all the hype of the millennium and reminded folk that had it not been for the birth of Jesus, we would not have a 'year 2000AD' to celebrate.

In addition to the regular Services, the Parish Diary for January 2000 included details of a Special Millenium Celebration Service to be held on Saturday 1st January at 12 noon, and also a special Evensong Service to which members of Ainsworth Methodist Church were invited. A separate notice from the Social Committee gave details of a Parish Millennium Party which was to be held at the end of January – 'tickets available soon'.

In other news, many of the groups and Organisations reported on their Christmas activities and celebrations – meals out, parties and pantos; many also included messages of thanks for goods donated for the Christmas Fair, and also for help given on the day; the Christmas Fair had raised an impressive £2028,00 – a huge amount of money even now!

16th Radcliffe Brownies were asking for helpers for the coming term; Scouts had the great news that they had finally got an additional helper on board. The Scouting sections also reported a great result at the District Swimming Gala, with Cubs and Scouts both winning their sections, leading to them being awarded the Group Trophy.

In January 2000, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Gwen White, "joint Secretary of the Social Committee and a great worker for our Church". In January 2000 there were 5 Baptisms recorded from the previous month, but no weddings or funerals. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 287, collections were listed as £1666.

Church Seasons & Traditions – January; Epiphany

"Chalking the Door" is an ancient tradition associated with Epiphany. This practice consists of marking a blessing in chalk in a specific pattern of letters and numbers, to invite God's blessing on a home,

church, or other entryway, and on all who enter its doors during the year. All you need is chalk and a doorway. The markings are usually made above the front door or main entrance, in this pattern:

$$20 + C + M + B + 25$$

The numbers change each year to reflect the new calendar year. The letters C, M, and B are given two meanings: the initials of the traditional names of the three magi, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar, or the initials of the Latin phrase *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, which means, "Christ bless this dwelling." The + signs are for the Cross of Christ. Before, during, or after the chalking of the door, the following prayer might be offered:

O God of Stars and Journeys, we ask your blessing on this threshold. May all whose journeys lead them through these doors be blessed with health, generosity of spirit, a joyful heart, and deep peace. O God of Welcome, may all who enter this doorway rejoice to find Christ living among us, and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is the incarnate Word, now and forever. Amen.

Seeing the symbols over our door during the year remind us, even as life goes back to a regular routine after Christmas, that our homes and all those who dwell there belong to Christ. They are also reminders of the welcome the magi gave to Jesus. Who might we welcome into our hearts this coming year?

Things To Look Out For In January - Redwings

Redwings migrate from Iceland, the Faroes and Scandinavia to the UK, often travelling by night. They spend the winter here, usually from October to April.



The UK's smallest thrush, the redwing, is around 21cm in length. It has a creamy-white chest covered in dark brown streaks, a distinctive red-orange underwing and a creamy-white stripe above its eye.

Redwings feed on worms and berries, particularly hawthorn and rowan. When food is scarce, they will venture into gardens and orchards in search of a bite to eat – apples are a particular favourite of theirs.

Redwings were the first bird species which were proven to detect fruit using ultraviolet vision. This is because the waxy coatings of berries reflect UV light, making them more appealing to birds!

These social birds can often be seen in flocks with fieldfares, foraging for food. Having a hawthorn or rowan bush in your garden is a great way of increasing your chances of sighting one, as is leaving apples and mealworms out for them on bird feeders.


