Eco Church Top Tip for July:

Help hedgehogs in hot weather. Hedgehogs particularly need help in a heatwave, as their usual prey of slugs, snails and worms are often unavailable. Leaving out a juicy snack, such as mealworms or canned dog food, can help in sustained warm weather. If you have a garden pond, ensure there's always a way for hedgehogs (and other small mammals) to climb out if they fall in.

Churches Count On Nature:

On a glorious Saturday morning early in June, a small group of intrepid volunteers gathered in the Churchyard to undertake our very first nature count. This exercise was supported by volunteers from the Woodland Trust, and formed part of a national initiative called 'Churches Count On Nature', which aims to determine the biodiversity present in the nation's churchyards; in many urban communities, the Churchyard is the only unchanged green space remaining.

During the course of the morning 93 different species were identified in our Churchyard, although there are undoubtedly more (especially insects)! The breakdown was as follows:

- 15 trees
- 4 shrubs
- 51 flowering plants
- 7 grasses
- 1 fern
- 5 insects
- 10 birds

Among the birds were the expected robins, blackbirds and magpies, and also wrens, nuthatches, great and blue tits.

Insects included speckled wood and common blue butterflies.

Trees included oak, beech, horse chestnut and small leaved lime. Shrubs included honeysuckle, and there were also grasses such as cocksfoot and flowering plants such as wood avens, forget me nots, bluebells and red campion to name but a few.

All identifications have been passed to 'Caring for God's Acre' and people are invited to submit any further churchyard identifications directly to them, preferably through use of the free phone app iNaturalist.

Many thanks to Peter Holden for organising this event for us, and to the volunteers from Woodland Trust for their support.

Porch Boxes - An Update On Our Local Charity

"From Little acorns do mighty oak trees grow."

Little did Revd. Carol Hayden, a curate at Christ Church Ainsworth in the early 2000s, realise when she asked her neighbours to put food tins in her porch to give out to local homeless people, that the charity she founded, would grow to become a local, very large, efficient and much needed social service covering Bury and Rochdale.

Here are some relevant and amazing facts about the charity, taken from their annual report and accounts in March 2022.

- Every Wednesday morning at the warehouse on Bradley Fold Trading Estate, 80 to 100 bags / boxes are packed and delivered by volunteers.
- People do not queue up at the warehouse to receive food; the packs are taken for vulnerable people in crisis, to the referral agencies, who then distribute them as necessary.
 - In 2022 there were 84 agencies requesting help.

There are many reasons why this charity has become so firmly established and why desperate people need such practical help.

- Increased energy bills and the cost of living crisis
- · Difficulties with the benefits system
- Leaving hospital with no outside assistance
- Illness and bereavement
- Rough sleeping
- Unemployment

- Addiction
- Difficult home circumstances.

The list is endless.

From the beginning of January 2022 to the end of March 2022, Porch Boxes delivered 1,117 crisis food packs and 665 Easter eggs to the social agencies to pass on to hungry, vulnerable families.

Christmas deliveries included 132 hampers for families and 168 for individual people.103 schools, churches, supermarkets and other organisations donated food and other goods. Many individual people also gave both goods and money, some sadly leaving no name so they cannot be thanked individually. Generous financial donations help the charity to purchase other much needed goods such as toiletries, cots, prams, beds and bedding.

Parishioners from Christ Church Ainsworth have regularly sent financial aid, and the Treasurer of Porch Boxes would particularly like to thank those people.

Sadly, the demand for support from this and other similar local charities remains at an all-time high, and the work of this very important and much needed charity continues apace.

Our congregation still puts dried and tinned food in the bins situated in the Church porch. The goods are still taken to the warehouse (thanks to Jan B, this was able to continue in spite of the COVID-19 lockdown).

When you come to any of our Church Services, please remember that ... A TIN IN THE BIN ... can make a real difference to a vulnerable adult, child or family in Bury!

Mission Community News - Prayer Walk 2023

Following a few days of unsettled weather, the day of the Mission Community Prayer Walk dawned bright and dry, with just enough of a breeze to keep the flies away and prevent overheating!

The plan for the day was that each congregation would hold a Celtic Morning Prayer Service in their own Church, before setting off to walk to St. Thomas & St. John, Radcliffe, meeting up with members of other Churches along the route.

After a really lovely morning prayer service, (followed by tea, coffee and cakes), 4 intrepid walkers set off from Ainsworth. The original plan was for Ainsworth 'walkers' to head up the main road to meet up with walkers from Christ Church Walshaw, at the Rose & Crown, however, having received a 'tip off' that there would be no-one walking the whole route from Walshaw, we decided that we would head off down Ainsworth Hall Road and Radcliffe Moor Road, to allow us to walk through the Bury New Road and Bradley Fold part of our Parish. This also meant that we walked along footpaths and tracks between the fields for the first part of our route – an absolute joy on such a glorious morning.

As well as praying for our village and local community, plus the various communities that we passed through, we were reminded at first hand of how wonderful the world around us is; sightings en route included a Moorhen Chick on the pond at Ainsworth Hall, various birds, butterflies and bees, plus a real treat as we watched a Roe Deer cross the field next to Radcliffe Moor Road and disappear into the greenery near the Masonic Hall.

Moving steadily on towards Radcliffe, we were all beginning to feel a bit warm and weary as the breeze dropped and the temperature crept up, but arrived safely at St. Thomas & St. John, Radcliffe in good time for the Service of Holy Communion led by Bishop Mark.

It was lovely to be able to come together and share this Service with others from our Mission Community, and so nice that, through the various joint initiatives that have been held, we are all beginning to get to know one another.

A huge thank you to all who took part in this shared venture - those who joined us for Morning Prayer, those who walked, and those who we met up with at St. Thomas & St. John. Thanks, must also go to Revd. Donna Williams, our Mission Community Leader, for organising this event and chivvying us all along to 'make it happen'.

From the Archives - July 1998

A fabulous sketch on the inside cover of the July 1998 Parish Magazine depicted the story of the Good Samaritan, complete with a donkey waiting patiently in the background. There were also a few small line sketches attached to other articles in the July 1998 Parish Magazine; it's incredible how something so simple can contain so much detail!

'News From The Parish', began with a report from the PCC regarding the trees in the churchyard; it seems that 1 of the trees backing on to Rosebank Close, had shed a branch some months previously, which had damaged a nearby lock up. This had led to a request for the trees to be assessed, prior to applying for permission from the local authority and also the diocese, to carry out the recommended work. Finally, the permissions had been granted and the work had been carried out. Although we tend to think that 'red tape' is a modern phenomenon, clearly that's not the case!

Directly following this report, was a lengthy obituary, transcribed from the funeral of Mr. Richard Moorhouse, who had clearly played a big part in the life of our Church and the wider community.

In other news, members of the Mithers' Union had enjoyed an evening being pampered by the beauty department at Bury College; Young Families had held a coffee morning and sponsored sing; 12th Brownies had been on Pack Holiday; Beavers had taken part in the District Fun Day; and Cubs had thoroughly enjoyed their Father and Son camp.

School reported on a successful Jumble Sale, which had brought the new playground fund up to a grand total of £7926!! A family fun day had been planned for the end of term, at which the Mayor of Bury would officially open the new playground.

In July 1998, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mrs. Anne Rule, "A lady whose bubbling personality brightens our church".

In July 1998 there were 4 Baptisms, 1 Wedding and 4 Funerals recorded from the previous month. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 302, with the Collections listed as £1227.

The Hymn That's In My Head

"Here I Am, Lord", also known by its first line, "I, the Lord of sea and sky", was written by the American composer, Dan Schutte in 1981; when *The United Methodist Hymnal* was published in 1989, it was immediately one of the most popular hymns. It also reached number 5 in the BBC Songs of Praise 'Top 100 Hymns', and features on 'The Nation's Favourite Hymns' CD – which is how it has got itself into my head!!

The words of this hymn were written when a friend asked Mr. Schutte to write a piece for an ordination Mass; his friend wanted the piece to include the images of the word of God, the light of Christ and the bread and wine - images that would eventually appear at the ends of the verses: "Who will bear my light to them?" "Who will speak my word to them?"

Whilst the stirring refrain is perhaps the first part of the hymn to capture the singer's imagination, the words to the main verses are based on Isaiah 6:8; "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!"

Each verse reflects a paradox; the powerful God, creator of "sea and sky," "snow and rain" and "wind and flame" is also the God who hears the "people cry," bears the "people's pain" and "tends the poor and lame."

This is a hymn of transformation. God transforms the darkness into light in stanza one, melts "hearts of stone" with love in stanza two and nourishes the "poor and lame" with the "finest bread"—a clear Eucharistic reference. Each stanza ends with the question, "Whom shall I send?" Whilst rhetorical questions are often found in hymns, this is not one of them - the refrain immediately offers the response, "Here I am, Lord."

Cheat's Kitchen

Cheat's Chocolate Whirlies



You Will Need:

- 1 pack of ready rolled puff pastry
- · Chocolate spread
- 25g butter (melted)
- 25g soft brown sugar

Here's What To Do:

- 1 Unroll the sheet of puff pastry but leave it on the baking paper.
- 2 Spread a thin layer of chocolate spread all over the upper side of the pastry sheet.
- 3 Use the baking paper to begin to carefully roll the pastry up; roll from the longest side towards you. The roll needs to be quite tight otherwise it will separate out as you bake it.
- 4 Once fully rolled, use a sharp knife to cut the roll into approx 15 slices. Use the baking paper to line a baking tray, then lay the slices flat and well spaced out on the baking sheet.
- 5 Brush the top of each slice with the melted butter, then sprinkle with a little brown sugar.
- 6 Bake at 200C for approx 15 minutes, or until golden. Enjoy!



People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose – some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

Ruth's Story

Ruth's story began in Bethlehem, where Elimelech lived with his wife, Naomi and their 2 sons. Elimelech was a good man and worked hard to keep his family, but one year there was a great drought in Bethlehem, the crops didn't grow, and everyone in Bethlehem went hungry.

For a while everything went well. Elimelech's sons grew up and got married; their wives were called Ruth and Orpah. But then things started to go wrong - first of all, Elimelech died; Naomi was very sad, but at least she still had her 2 sons and their wives to keep her company.

Not long afterwards, disaster struck again, and Naomi's 2 sons both died also! Naomi felt as though her heart was broken, but still she had Ruth and Orpah to keep her company.

Naomi felt very sad being so far away from the rest of her family who still lived in Bethlehem, so one day she said to Ruth and Orpah, "I have decided to travel back to Bethlehem to be with my own people, and I would like you both to go back to live with your families."

The 3 women were sad to be parted after such a long time, but Orpah gathered her things together and set off to return to her family. But God had a special plan for Ruth. she had to make a difficult



choice. Should she stay in her homeland of Moab, like Orpah, or should she travel with Naomi, to Bethlehem?

Naomi knew the journey would be hard and long, and she didn't expect her daughters-in-law to come with her. But Ruth simply could not let Naomi go alone. She told Naomi, "Where you go, I will go, and where you stay, I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God." Ruth chose to stay with Naomi and stay with God.

And so, Naomi and Ruth, set out for the land of Bethlehem, and although they didn't know it, God, was taking care of them. God knew that their hearts were sad with the death of their husbands, and God knew that life was going to be hard for them, and so He prepared a way

for them.

In Bethlehem, Ruth needed to collect food for herself and Naomi.

She went to a field and joined the workers as they picked up the grain that had fallen to the ground. The owner of the field asked his workers, "Who is this woman?"



The workers explained that she had travelled with Naomi, all the way from the land of Moab. Ruth didn't know it, but the owner of the field was a relative of Naomi. The owner's name was, Boaz. Boaz, saw that Ruth was a good worker, and he saw that she cared for Naomi.

Eventually Boaz married Ruth; he loved her and cared for her, and he welcomed Naomi into his home also. In time Boaz and Ruth had a son who they called Obed; Obed made Boaz and Ruth and Naomi very, very happy.

So, What Can We Learn From Ruth's Story?

Being a good friend isn't always easy. A good friend is loyal, which means that you keep your promises and stand by someone, even when sometimes you maybe don't feel like doing that. Sometimes our friends aren't perfect, sometimes they make mistakes, but sometimes we make mistakes too, and we wouldn't want our friends to leave us when that happens.

Ruth was a good friend to Naomi, and through her service and her words, she showed Naomi that God still loved her. She didn't tell everyone what a good friend she was, she simply did what she thought was the right thing to do, and God rewarded her for her loyalty, by bringing her and Boaz together, so that after all the sadness Ruth and Naomi had shared, they could be happy once more.

Please help me to remember that You are also my friend - Amen.

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
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
