Interregnum Update

"For I know the plans I have for you", declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". (Jeremiah 29;11)

If ever a verse from the Bible ought to give us encouragement during the interregnum, it is this one. God has plans for us. Whatever we might think at times, there is nothing haphazard about our lives; events that might seem random, with hindsight, generally have a reason and a purpose.

When Christ Church Ainsworth first moved into vacancy in March 2023, we were advised by the Diocese that the intention was to advertise for a 0.5 post, specifically for Christ Church Ainsworth.

Time passed and the suggestion was made by the Diocese that, in the light of the additional vacant posts in our Mission Community, it might be a better option to consider advertising a full-time post to be shared between 2 Churches. Thus, last Summer, members of the PCC dutifully compiled our Parish Profile, completed all of the required paperwork, 'dotted all the i's and crossed all the t's'. At last things seemed to be moving.

Then came the advice that it would be preferable to wait until Spring 2024 to place the advertisement, as this would coincide with a cohort of newly qualified Curates seeking employment ...

Spring 2024 has rolled on into Summer 2024; a full-time post to be shared between our nearest neighbours, Christ Church Walshaw and St. Andrew's Radcliffe, was advertised some time ago; and the latest update for the Christ Church Ainsworth vacancy ... the Diocese intends to advertise for a 0.5 post, specifically for Christ Church Ainsworth, possibly towards the Autumn ...

Another change of direction and further delays may not be what we wanted to hear, but it at least means that we know where we're at and can begin to plan Services and Clergy cover for the latter part of the year. Amidst our frustration, in the passage from Jeremiah we are reminded that even when events seem puzzling and strange, God has a plan; he knows what he is doing; God's plans are to bless us and not to harm us; God's plans are to give us hope and a future.

We might not have a clear idea yet of where we are going or what the future looks like, but let's remember God's promise; that he knows what he is doing, and his plans will give us hope and a future.

Top Tip for July:

Help hedgehogs in hot weather. Hedgehogs particularly need help in a heatwave, as their usual prey of slugs, snails and worms are often unavailable. Leaving out a juicy snack, such as mealworms or canned dog food, can help in sustained warm weather. If you have a garden pond, ensure there's always a way for hedgehogs (and other small mammals) to climb out if they fall in.

'Ordinary Time'

The following reflection comes from The Revd Luke Maguire, Incumbent of All Saints, Stretford and Mission Community Leader.



Having celebrated the death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus, and rejoiced in the gift of the Holy Spirit, the Church now enters this long season of 'ordinary' time. But what does it mean to speak of this season as ordinary?

It might be tempting to think that this long stretch until Advent is ordinary in the sense that nothing much happens, that the Church simply goes through the motions until things get busy again. But what if the events of Easter and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Church have redefined ordinary? What if 'ordinary' for Christians is supposed to look radically different from what the rest of the world thinks of as ordinary?

The Spirit we have received is God Himself, at work in and through his people. The Holy Spirit is the Lord and giver of life. The Holy Spirit is the one who leads us into truth, and the one by whose power Christ was raised from the dead. The Holy Spirit is the one who is at work renewing creation and transforming God's people into the likeness of Jesus. St Paul reminds us that the Spirit gives gifts and manifests fruit in the lives of God's people, gifts of supernatural grace and the fruits of godliness.

So what should ordinary be for the Church? Throughout this so-called ordinary time, the Church is challenged to live lives shaped and reformed by the realities of Easter and Pentecost, called to be a people of the resurrection, rooted in Christ, empowered by his Spirit, and walking in newness of life.

May God bless us as we seek to let our lives be shaped by his life, and may we find that in our daily walk with Jesus, extraordinary become our new ordinary.



16th Radcliffe Brownies

Since the last update, the Brownies have been very busy working towards different badges including the 'Feel Good Badge' and a 'Bake Off Badge'.

The Feel Good Badge was a 'badge in a night' so the Brownies worked hard to earn this through several activities. We explored how we used our memories through number sequences and learned about the importance of teamwork to improve these skills. They also guessed the daily recommended water intake (a huge 1,500 millilitres), and performed a role play about bedtime routines and the best ways to wind down before sleep. Additionally, they played a variation of the Balloon Pass game to understand the difficulty of using different muscle groups, starting with the traditional method of passing the balloon over their heads and through their knees, and then using other body parts.

The Bake Off Badge has been running over three weeks and à la **The** Great British Bake Off, we've had three tasks with judges Prue, Paul and Mary Berry making an appearance (a cleverly disguised Little Owl, Eagle Owl, and Barn Owl). The judges assessed not only design

but also teamwork and tidying up (although sadly not taste!) Similar to the show, the Brownies started by making themed cupcakes. The next week involved cookie baking and the final was the showstopper. The Brownies designed their showstoppers as a team the week before and, while these were very ambitious designs, I'm sure you will agree that the final results were pretty outstanding in the form of a gravity-defying ice cream cake, very cute animal cupcakes, energetic sports-themed cupcakes, and a sweet treat Hansel and Gretel cottage.



In addition to our weekly meetings, we have also had the Church Spring Fair where the Brownies ran the café, Butterfly Bistro. A massive thank you to all the Brownies for all the cake donations and to the superstars Sofia, Amarah, Pippa, Isla, Maddy and Lily who came to help at the café, we made a huge £430 for the church!

We also attended the Whit service on the Delph. A very blustery and cold day, it was still lovely to see lots of Brownies and parents attend and enjoy the service and brass band. We hope everyone had fun at the stalls afterwards and liked their raffle prizes and cake!

Transformation - Now!



We were saddened to learn of the death of Jean Clifford on 10th June. Jean has been a loyal member for many years and will be sadly missed. I'll miss her friendly greeting and hug at each meeting. We send our deepest condolences to her family and friends and promise to uphold you all in our prayers.

Earlier in June, another of our members, Moira Gilmore, was admitted to hospital following a fall. We are praying for your recovery, Moira, and hope that we can see you soon.

The Summer of Hope Appeal was launched in early June. This is our opportunity to build on years of wonderful work that is transforming the lives of women and girls in sub-Saharan Africa. In the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), lack of literacy and

numeracy are two of the key drivers that trap women in a neverending cycle of poverty. Mothers' Union is already making a difference in four Dioceses; now we need to expand to four more where women are most in need of support, including one of Manchester's link Dioceses - Kisangani.

Grace describes what this change has meant for her and how she feels much more empowered.

"I didn't know how to count. If I went to market, they would steal my money because I couldn't count and didn't know the weights. I joined the programme. Now I can spend my money wisely because of what I've learned.

Today, I would have the cabbage in my garden (as well as the root vegetables and bananas) because of what I was taught. The cabbage I use for my family consumption. My family is healthy and I'm able to send my children to school. I go to buy fish in the market and sell the fish or trade it with cocoa growers. I was doing business before, but it wasn't working because I didn't know the money. I used to keep spending and didn't know about profit. Now I make sure that I have enough for savings and things that I need to buy for the business."

With our, combined efforts for this Summer of Hope, we can roll out new programmes enabling more transformations like Grace's. Over the next two years, we aim to support a further 4,800 households and that will help lift 19,200 more people out of poverty, including children and other dependents.

If anyone would like to contribute towards this important work, then please hand your donations to Jean Eddleston, Enid Horrocks, or me, or place in an envelope marked for Mothers' Union attention and hand it to one of the sidesmen or clergy.

A small, but enthusiastic group of us were made very welcome at 'Cosalea' on Walshaw Road for our 'away date' in mid May. Thank you to the staff for their hospitality. We are now getting to be known at several local venues!

Please note that there will be no Mothers' Union meeting on Tuesday 2nd July.

Our summer lunch will be held on Tuesday 16th July, when we will be at the Rose and Crown at 1.00pm.

From the Archives - July 1999

The Parish Diary for July 1999 was definitely a little quieter than in previous months, but still boasted 3 Services each Sunday, plus Holy Communion on a Wednesday morning and various Sunday School activities.

A report following the Archdeacon's Visitation Service gave information about the 'Archdeacon's Charge' – a list of specific issues likely to be of major significance to the diocese, and in which all Parishes were required to engage. The list for 1999 included the following areas for action: 1) Pastoral Reorganisation, 2) Parish Share – 92% had been received the previous year, the aim for 1999 was a full 100% payment!! 3) Disability audit to be carried out by each Church, 4) Each Church to implement a First Aid Policy which should then be reviewed annually, 5) Millenium Preparations.

Elsewhere, there were a huge number of end of term trips being planned or reported on: Mothers' Union members were heading off for a day in Chester, Young Families were off to Camelot, Church Women's Fellowship had had an enjoyable day at Mount Pleasant Farm, and Members of the WI had visited Harrogate Flower Show, whilst Beavers had been to Gulliver's World, 12th Radcliffe Brownies had had an amazing time on Pack Holiday, and 16th Radcliffe Brownies had taken part in the County 'Dabble Day' – busy times for all concerned!

In July 1999, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Hazel M. Wood, 'A valued member of the Church Choir, now also playing a key role as the Electoral Roll Secretary". In July 1999 there was 1 Wedding recorded from the previous month, plus 3 Baptisms but no Funerals. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 387, collections were listed as £2752.

For All The Saints - July; St. Benedict

Name: St. Benedict Feast Day: 11th July

Born: 480AD Died: 547AD

Place of burial: Beneath the Monastery he founded at Monte Cassino.

Patron Saint Of: Students.

St. Benedict is believed to have been born around 480, as the son to a Roman noble of Norcia and the twin to his sister, Scholastica.

In the fifth century, the young Benedict was sent to Rome to finish his education; however, Benedict was appalled by the way in which many of his fellow students lived and spent their time. They had everything - education, wealth, youth -- and they spent all of it in the pursuit of pleasure, not truth. Benedict watched in horror as vice unravelled the lives and ethics of his companions.

Afraid for his soul, Benedict left Rome, gave up his inheritance and made his home in a small village. When God called him beyond this quiet life to an even deeper solitude, he went to the mountains of Subiaco, where he lived as a hermit under the direction of another hermit, Romanus.

One day, during his time living in a cave above a lake as a hermit, the Devil presented Benedict's imagination with a beautiful, tempting woman. Benedict resisted by rolling his body into a thorn bush until it was covered in scrapes. It is said through these body wounds, he cured the wounds of his soul.

After years of prayer, word of his holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict for them, but they insisted -- then tried to poison him when his warning proved true. The story goes, the monks attempted to poison Benedict's drink, but when he prayed a blessing over the cup - it shattered.

So, Benedict was on his own again -- but not for long. The next set of followers were more sincere, and Benedict worked with them to set up twelve monasteries in Subiaco where monks lived in separate communities of twelve.

But it was in Monte Cassino that he founded the monastery that became the roots of the Church's monastic system. Instead of founding small separate communities he gathered his disciples into one whole community. His own sister, Saint Scholastica, settled nearby to live a religious life.

Benedict was an innovator. No one had ever set up communities like his before or directed them with a rule. What is part of history to us now was a bold, risky step into the future.

Benedict had the holiness and the ability to take this step. His beliefs and instructions on religious life were collected in what is now known as the Rule of Saint Benedict, and are still directing religious life after 15 centuries!

Benedict died of a fever at Monte Cassino not long after his sister, Scholastica, and was buried in the same tomb. According to tradition, this occurred on 21 March 547.



People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose – some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

Deborah

Time and time again throughout the Old Testament, God set the people of Israel on the right path; he sent leaders to help them and to solve their problems. Every time this happened, the people were very grateful and promised to follow the one true God and live and behave as God wanted them to. But after a while, the people forgot about the promises they had made, and they started to behave badly once again; until eventually God would lose patience with them and some great disaster would befall them - at which point, guess what! The people once again promised to follow the one true God and live and behave as God wanted them to ... So, then God would forgive them and appoint another leader to help them to get back onto the right path. And so, it continued!

Before Israel had a king, it had a series of tribal leaders called Judges. The Judges were chosen by God, who used these men and women to save the Israelites from their enemies and to lead them back to him. You can read about all of Israel's Judges in the part of the Bible which is called 'The Book of Judges'.

A Prophetess, is a girl or a woman who is a kind of spokesperson for God; a prophetess can receive messages or instructions from God which she is then able to pass on to other people, to help them or to guide them.

Deborah was both a prophetess and Judge. Her name means "honey bee," and she was also the wife of a man named Lappidoth. Deborah was the only female Judge.

Before Deborah became a Judge, the people of Israel had been behaving particularly badly, and so God had handed them over to Jabin, king of Canaan. With his commander, General Sisera, King Jabin had oppressed the Israelites for twenty years, until they finally cried to the Lord for help.

Deborah was leading the Israelites at that time, she was a well respected and fair Judge; she used to sit under a Palm Tree and



the people would come to her for advice and to ask for help to resolve their arguments. Deborah was so wise and good, that people came from all parts of the land with their difficulties and the questions that arose

between them. She ruled over the land, not by the force of any army, but because everyone could see that God's Spirit was upon her.

Deborah heard of the troubles of the people in the north under the hard rule of King Jabin. God told her that a brave man was living in the land of Naphtali, a man named Barak, God told her to send Barak this message:

"Barak, call out the tribes of Israel who live near you; raise an army, and lead the men who gather about you to Mount Tabor. The Lord has told me that he will give Sisera and all of his armies into your hands."

When Barak received this message, he felt afraid; he couldn't believe that he would really be able to set the people free. And so he sent his answer back to Deborah:

"If you will go with me, I will go; but if you will not go with me, I will not go."

Deborah replied, "I will go with you, but because you did not trust God, and did not go when God called you, the honour of this war will not be yours, for God will deliver Sisera into the hands of a woman."

Deborah left her seat under the palm-tree and went to the village where Barak lived, then together Deborah and Barak sent out a call for the men of the north to gather and form an army. Ten thousand men met together, bringing with them whatever weapons they could find. This little army, with a woman for its chief, set up their camp on the top of Mount Tabor, where they could look down

on the great armies of King Jabin, with their many tents, their horses and their chariots, and their General. Sisera.

But Deborah was not afraid. She said to Barak,

"March down the mountain with all your men and fight King Jabin's army. The Lord will go before you, and he will give General Sisera and his host into your hand."

Then Barak blew a trumpet and called out to his men, and they all ran down the side of Mount Tabor and rushed upon their enemies. King Jabin's army was taken by surprise and had no time to draw out their weapons. They had no idea who the people were that were attacking them; they were frightened and many of them ran away, trampling each other underfoot, chariots and horses and men all panicking and crashing into each other in the muddle.

Near to King Jabin's camp was a river, many of his men fell into the river and drowned when they were trying to escape. When General Sisera, saw that the battle had gone against him and that all was lost. He leaped from his chariot and ran away. A little way off, he found a tent standing alone, and he ran to it intending to hide.

The tent belonged to a man named Heber, and Heber's wife, Jael, was standing outside of the tent. She recognised General Sisera, and said to him, "Come in, my lord; come into the tent; do not be afraid."

General Sisera entered the tent, and Jael covered him with a rug, so that he was hidden. General Sisera said to her, "I am very thirsty; can you give me a little water to drink?"

Instead of water, Jael brought milk and gave him some: and then

General Sisera lay down to sleep, because he was very tired from the battle and from running. While he was in a deep sleep, Jael crept back into the tent quietly with a tent-peg and a hammer in

her hand, she struck General Sisera hard on the head and killed him.

A little while later, Jael saw Barak, the chief of the Israelite army, coming toward the tent. She went out

to meet him, and said, "Come with me, and I will show you the man whom you are seeking."

She lifted the curtain of the tent and led Barak inside; and there he saw lying dead upon the ground the mighty General Sisera.

And so, both of Deborah's prophesies came true; Barak was the man who led the people of Israel to victory, but because he did not trust God completely, God delivered General Sisera into the hands of a woman.

So, What Can We Learn From Deborah's Story?

God often helps ordinary people to do extraordinary things. Deborah's courage is legendary, but her confidence did not come from her abilities or Israel's army. General Sisera trusted in the might of his army, but Deborah trusted in God's power and provision. Knowing that God was 'on her side' was all the strength she needed to take action, get the job done, and inspire others to step out in faith as well.

God might not be asking us to gather an army and lead an attack, but maybe there are other things that He is asking us to do. Will you be brave and confident like Deborah, and trust that if God has asked you to do it, God will get you through it?
