Interregnum Update

"Patience is not simply the ability to wait, it's the way we behave while we're waiting."

I'm not sure who wrote these words of wisdom, but they seem incredibly appropriate for our Church and our worshiping community, particularly during this time of interregnum.

As we continue to wait for the advertising / recruitment process for a new Incumbent to begin, there are many things over which we have little or no control; but that doesn't mean that we have to simply sit down passively and wait.

The Church of England has seen a gradual reduction in numbers attending Churches over a number of years, the Covid-19 pandemic didn't help things, but if we're totally honest, the decline in numbers had begun long before that. Whilst there are many things that we could 'blame', and whilst it would be very easy for us to think 'well at least it's not just us...', sometimes we need to be the ones to think outside of the box and be the change that we want to see.

That may well be difficult in the short term; it may well be easier and less stressful just to drift along in the 'slow lane', but will that get us where we want to be?

Will that encourage more people to become a part of God's Church? Will that encourage more children, families and young people to want to be a part of our Church? Will that encourage those who already have a faith to grow deeper in their faith?

Yes we can wait patiently for the process of recruitment and advertising to begin, but if we want our congregation to grow in faith and in numbers, we need to think about how we behave whilst we are waiting; we need to continue to look for new ways and opportunities to connect with children, families and young people; we need to continue to reach out to and connect with our wider community; we need to consider new opportunities that may help our existing worshipping community to grow and develop in their own faith; and we need to continue to engage and work with our wider Mission Community.

It certainly would be easier to wait for someone else or some other time, to take these things forwards; but change and progress rarely happen if we sit down and wait passively for someone else or some other time; the future is ours to shape, and the time is now.

Trinity Sunday- 26th May 2024

Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost, this year it fell on Sunday 26th May. Trinity Sunday is a day we set aside every year to celebrate our wonderful 3 in 1 God.

It's very difficult to explain the Trinity, because nobody totally understands it! Trinity means 1 thing being made up of 3 things, just as a triangle is made up of 3 sides and 3 corners. But how can God, be the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit all at the same time?

We don't need to understand everything about God to be able to love Him and to serve Him, but here's a good way to try to understand the Trinity; think about the last time you ate an apple ...

An apple has three parts: the seeds, the flesh, and the skin. If you cut an apple in half, you can see that each of these three parts are different and has a different purpose. The skin of the apple is like God the Father, because He protects us; the flesh of the apple is like God the Son, because Jesus took on human form; and the seeds of the apple are like God the Holy Spirit, because the Holy Spirit helps us to grow.

Each of the parts of an apple is different, but they are all still apple.

Raising Awareness – HMRC Volunteer Drivers Service

The HMR Circle Volunteer Drivers Service (VDS) is an affordable transport service operating across Rochdale, Heywood, Middleton and the Pennine Villages. It is a service for adults (aged 50+ / or vulnerable adults) who are unable, or find it difficult, to use public transport.

Rochdale

Volunteer Drivers use their own vehicles to provide a door-to-door, flexible, transport service. The passenger is picked up from their home and taken to their destination. Return journeys are also available. If requested, and where possible, a driver can wait with the passenger until they are ready to return home.

For each journey, a contribution is calculated at just 45p per mile payable to the driver on the day, to reimburse the cost of petrol and to support the costs of insuring and maintaining their vehicles.

All Volunteer Drivers are DBS checked and have all the necessary vehicle safety requirements and insurance in place - so you can rest assured that you're in safe hands!

From the Archives – June 1999

In the 'Vicar's Letter' article in the June 1999 Parish Magazine, Father Alan wrote about the gifts of the Holy Spirit, delivered on the Day of Pentecost; these being love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. He asked folk to remember that they also had received these gifts through Baptism and Confirmation, and suggested Trinity would be a good time to consider how each person shows the gifts of the Spirit in their daily lives. A powerful message, and one that is just as relevant to us all a quarter of a century later.

Additional Services in June 1999 included the Annual Whitsuntide Walk of Witness – meet at 2.45pm for a prompt start at 3pm; also a Deanery Eucharist Service to be held at St. Mary's Church, Prestwich.

In News From The Parish, the Churchwardens reported that a recent inspection had highlighted a number of gutters and downspouts needing remedial work. It was also anticipated that a 'Millenium Plaque' would be arriving imminently, this to be displayed above the Lychgate.

Elsewhere, the Day School reported a successful May Fair which raised an incredible £1509 for school funds; the Social Committee reported the American Breakfast had been postponed - watch this space for replacement date; the Choir had held a successful 'Candle Party' which had raised £60 for funds; Mothers' Union members had held a successful Coffee Morning; the ladies of the Church Women's Fellowship were eagerly anticipating a talk from members of Bolton Mountain Rescue Team; and both Brownie packs were planning for Pack Holiday – 12th Radcliffe had 'The Wombles' as their theme, whilst 16th Radcliffe were focusing on 'The Little Mermaid'. Beavers had enjoyed a clown themed district funday, whilst Cubs had been ice skating, pond dipping, canoeing, tracking and first aiding; and Scouts reported the great achievement of Jonathan Stanton, who had achieved his Chief Scout Award.

In June 1999, the 'Face To Face' interview was with David John Teale, 'A man of many parts – all of them excellent'. In June 1999 there was 1 Wedding recorded from the previous month, plus 5 Baptisms and 4 Funerals. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 375, collections were listed as £1709.

For All The Saints - June; St. Peter

Name: St. Peter

Born: Unknown Died: 64AD

Place of burial: St. Peter's Basilica, Vatican City

Patron Saint Of: Net-makers, shipbuilders & Fishermen; also of

St Peter, originally named Simon, but also known as Simon Peter, was one of the first followers of Jesus, and became one of the Twelve Apostles and subsequently one of the first leaders of the early Church.

As a Jewish boy growing up in Galilee, Peter would have received religious instruction up to the age of about 13; he was then apprenticed as a Fisherman. Fishing was a major industry at that time, and Peter and his brother Andrew were very successful.

Simon's life changed when he met Jesus, ultimately he and Andrew left their lives as fishermen to follow Jesus. Peter may have made mistakes along the way, but Jesus recognised in him the ability to be a strong and fair leader. Peter was one of the first to see Jesus after the resurrection, it was Peter that brought the Disciples together following the Ascension, and it was Peter who stood up and spoke to the crowds on the Day of Pentecost.

Peter travelled through many regions, sharing the Gospel message and converting people to Christianity. The last city he visited was Rome, where he was martyred under the Emperor Nero's persecution of Christianity.

Peter was to martyred through crucifixion, but stated that he was unworthy to die in the same way as the Lord, and so was crucified upside down



People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose – some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

Jonah

Jonah was a very ordinary sort of a person, who was just quietly getting on with his life, until one night he had a strange dream; he dreamt that God was asking him to go to a place called Ninevah and tell the people living there to stop being bad. The Captain went to find Jonah who was still sound asleep in the lower part of the boat. He said to Jonah, "How can you sleep? Get up and help us!'



Jonah went up onto the deck and started to help the Sailors to throw things overboard. But the waves grew higher, and the boat began to creak and groan as if it would break in two! The Captain shouted "Everyone pray to your god, maybe he can

help us!" And so the Sailors all began to cry out, praying to their gods for help.

Jonah told them, "I believe in the Lord, the God of heaven, who made the sea and the land, and I am running away from something God asked me to do. It is my fault this is happening. If you throw me into the sea the storm will stop."
