Parish Report From APCM

Despite being in interregnum since March 2023, our Church continues to be active and positive, seeking to nurture and encourage our existing worshipping community on their journey of faith, and also working hard to engage with our local community, with Christ Church Ainsworth Primary School, and with families who connect with our Church for occasional offices such as baptisms, weddings, funerals and interment of ashes.

Throughout 2024 we have worked hard to draw our congregations together, to encourage members of our worshipping communities to take an active role in the life of our Church, and to be an active and proactive part of our wider Mission Community.

Members of our PCC have met regularly to ensure that the business of the Parish is conducted in an appropriate and timely manner in line with the Diocesan guidelines; members of our Standing Committee have met on 3 separate occasions to discuss or work on specific agenda items; whilst Clergy and Churchwardens meet on a regular basis, both formally and informally to plan and also to ensure the smooth day to day running of our Church.

Despite still having no Incumbent in post, we have managed to maintain all of our regular Church Services, including Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals and Interments of Ashes. In addition to our regular pattern of worship, we also now hold a monthly Reflective / Contemplative Prayer Service and have held weekly Prayer Services in Church throughout Lent and Advent. We are hugely grateful for the hard work and support of our own Clergy - Revd Debra Johnstone and Revd Elaine Larkin, and also for the support and input of visiting members of Clergy from our own Mission Community and the wider Diocese, without whom this would not have been possible.

To complement our regular Services, we have been pleased to welcome to our Church, representatives from a number of charities and organisations, to give some insights into their work within our local and wider community; as a follow on from this our Church and members of our congregations have been able to financially support the work of Christian Aid, The Children's Society, Urban Outreach and The Royal British Legion. In addition, a number of members of our congregation have themselves engaged with the different organisations, either to access the services offered or to provide financial support. We have also provided practical support for Porch Boxes and The Bury Homeless Project and engaged with a Mission Community-wide initiative to support various other charities through recycling.

Throughout the course of 2024 we have held a number of 'special services' and community events; we joined together with members of Ainsworth Methodist Church to celebrate Palm Sunday; our Whit Gathering in June was held on 'The Delph' and brought together our worshipping Community, members of our Uniformed Organisations and also our wider community for outdoor worship, supported by members of Farnworth & Walkden Brass Band. We joined with Farnworth & Walkden Brass Band again early in July when we held a very successful 'Summer Prom Concert', and also in December for our annual 'Candlelit Christmas Concert' – both of these events were raising money for Church funds. In addition, in July we held an 'Open Church' event to support Ainsworth Village Day, held a number of Services during the Season Of Remembrance; and joined once again with our friends from Ainsworth Methodist Church in December for a joint Community Carol Service.

In line with the Diocesan 'Growing Younger Strategy', our work with children and families has continued through our weekly MidWeek Praise family service. Throughout the course of 2024 we were also excited to be able to hold a number of additional family friendly initiatives; 'I-Spy Nature', during the May half term break, was followed by a Family Gardening Group and Outdoor Worship – both of which were held weekly throughout the Summer holidays, and an Autumn Leaves Trail and craft event during the October half term break.

In addition, our long-standing links with the staff and children at Christ Church Ainsworth Primary School have been further strengthened following the appointment in September 2024 of Mrs. McGreavy, as the new Head Teacher. In November the School Worship Team, along with members of staff, attended our Armistice Day Service in Church; the children from Nursery & Reception joined us in Church for an afternoon of Christmas Craft activities based on the Christmas Story early in December; we also invited school to partner with us in a '40 Days of Kindness Theme' during Lent. Revd Debra has led a number of assemblies in school throughout the year, and following our long-standing tradition, the whole school has joined us in Church for a Service at the end of each term. We have a number of new shared initiatives on the horizon, including a joint monthly litter-picking group and a trial of Forest Church.

The Quinquennial Inspection carried out at Christ Church Ainsworth in January 2023 identified a number of areas where work was required, or would be required in the near future, to maintain the structure and fabric of our Church. Our Church Architect has produced a schedule of work detailing areas of priority, and we have worked hard to try to secure grant funding to ensure that these projects can be completed in a timely manner. Following a significant reduction to our Parish Share, agreed by the Diocese in August 2024, the fact that we have been able to pay this in full also means that we are now eligible to apply for some of the grants which are available from the Diocese for building repair and maintenance.

In spite of these challenges, the reduction in Parish Share, coupled with a slight increase in giving following our Generosity & Thankfulness Campaign, an increase in the number of fundraising initiatives held throughout the year, and better use of social media to promote these initiatives, has helped us to begin to improve our financial position. Thanks to the hard work and commitment of members of our Social Committee, both the Spring Fair and Christmas Fair were also well supported and successful events.

In other news, our Church took up the A Rocha EcoChurch challenge in the Spring of 2023; this is a national initiative which encourages Churches and their worshipping communities to assess and improve their 'green credentials'. Building on the work previously done to achieve our Bronze Award and the hard work that our Churchyard Team put in to maintaining our grounds throughout the year, the implementation of a number of new initiatives throughout the summer months meant that we were pleased and proud to become the first Church in our Mission Community to be awarded the EcoChurch 'Silver Award' in November 2024.

Our Church continues to engage with the work of the Radcliffe and Whitefield Mission Community; we are active participants within the 'growing, nurturing and serving task groups' and have participated in a number of joint prayer initiatives around Thy Kingdom Come, Advent and Lent. Members of our congregation also took part in the annual Radcliffe & Whitefield Mission Community Ascension Day Prayer Walk and joined in with the two Mission Community-wide Litter Picking events which were held during the summer months. The Churches of our Mission Community also share information about Services and special events, we have a monthly Mission Community Prayer Diary, a weekly 'praying together' theme which all Churches within the Mission Community are encouraged to share with their Clergy teams, PCCs and members of their congregation, and also a number of online Prayer Groups that meet regularly. Throughout the course of the past 12 months, the Mission Community concept has grown and evolved, with the need for sharing and support between Parishes becoming more relevant and necessary during a time of mass interregnums. Going forward, the number of Stipendiary Clergy allocated to our Mission Community will be reduced; ultimately the plan is that there will be 4 full time equivalent Stipendiary posts to service the 8 Churches within our Mission Community.

During the course of 2024, we have been saddened by the loss of a number of long standing and faithful members of our Church Community; Bill White was Churchwarden at Christ Church Ainsworth for a number of years and was also a Sidesman, a Lay Assistant, and an active member of the original Churchyard Team; Bryan Shaw was a valued member of the current Churchyard Team and also our 'Church Calligrapher'; Brian Flowers, another member of the Original Churchyard Team had also been the Sexton at Christ Church Ainsworth for a number of years; whilst Jane Lord led the Pew Polishing Team and was our BRF Ministries co-ordinator. All of these people have contributed massively to the life and workings of our Church and will be very much missed.

As previously mentioned, during this ongoing interregnum, we are hugely grateful to Revd Debra Johnstone and Revd Elaine Larkin, for taking on so many extra duties within the Parish, to ensure that mission and ministry at Christ Church Ainsworth is able to continue. We are also grateful to the many, many people who have come on board and taken on new or additional tasks at this time; we have struggled for a number of years to find people who are willing to take on the 'official PCC roles', but we are truly blessed with the number of people within our Church and wider community who are willing to 'roll up their sleeves' and help out.

We have no way of knowing how much longer our Church will remain in interregnum, or what the future may look like, however, as a team, we will continue to do our best to work together, to reach out to and engage with our local community and our wider Mission Community, and to be a Church that thrives during interregnum.

Ascension Day

You might be forgiven for thinking that Easter finishes after Bank Holiday Monday, or maybe once the schools go back, but in fact Eastertide lasts a lot longer; 40 days in fact!

On that first Easter morning, Jesus's friends were filled with joy that he had come back to them, but Jesus knew that he wouldn't be able to stay with them forever.

Jesus, as a person, could only be with some people, in some places, at some times, but by going to be with his Father in heaven, he would send the Holy Spirit so that God could be with anyone, anywhere, at any time.

During the 40 days after Easter Sunday, Jesus appeared to many different people and did many amazing things; He also spent a lot of time with his friends, teaching them and praying with them. He told them, "Soon, you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit and receive the power of God. You must tell my story to the people in Jerusalem and to people all over the Earth; tell the people to believe in me even if they can't see me."

On the 40th day after Easter Sunday, Jesus and his friends went to The Mount of Olives to talk and pray. Whilst they were there a bright light shone from the sky and a large cloud came down. The cloud wrapped itself around Jesus and he was taken up to the heavens. This is what we now call the Ascension.

Although Jesus's friends probably didn't really understand what was happening, they remembered what he had told them, and returned to Jerusalem to wait for his promised gift of the Holy Spirit.

Raising Awareness – World Bee Day; 20th May

Bees and other pollinators, such as butterflies, bats and hummingbirds, are increasingly under threat from human activities.



Pollination is, however, a fundamental process for the survival of our ecosystems. Nearly 90% of the world's wild flowering plant species depend, entirely, or at least in part, on animal pollination, along with more than 75% of the world's food crops and 35% of global agricultural land. Not only do pollinators contribute directly to food security, but they are key to conserving biodiversity.

To raise awareness of the importance of pollinators, the threats they face and their contribution to sustainable development, the UN designated 20th May as Worls Bee Day; the goal is to highlight the role bees play in ecosystems, food production, and sustainable development, and also to strengthen measures aimed at protecting bees and other pollinators, which would significantly contribute to solving problems related to the global food supply and eliminate hunger in developing countries.

We all depend on pollinators, and it is, therefore, crucial to monitor their decline and halt the loss of biodiversity.

We need to act now

Bees are under threat. Present species extinction rates are 100 to 1,000 times higher than normal due to human impacts. Close to 35 percent of invertebrate pollinators, particularly bees and butterflies, and about 17 percent of vertebrate pollinators, such as bats, face extinction globally.

If this trend continues, nutritious crops, such as fruits, nuts and many vegetable crops will be substituted increasingly by staple crops like rice, corn and potatoes, eventually resulting in an imbalanced diet. Intensive farming practices, land-use change, mono-cropping, pesticides and higher temperatures associated with climate change all pose problems for bee populations and, by extension, the quality of food we grow.

How can we do more as individuals?

- Plant a diverse set of native plants, which flower at different times of the year.
- Buy raw honey from local farmers.
- Buy products from sustainable agricultural practices.
- Avoid using pesticides, fungicides or herbicides in our gardens.
- Protect wild bee colonies when possible.
- Sponsor a hive.
- Make a bee water fountain by leaving a water bowl outside.
- Help to sustain forest ecosystems.
- Raise awareness around us by sharing this information within our communities and networks; the decline of bees affects us all!

From the Archives – May 2000

The sketch on the inside cover of the May 2000 Parish Magazine depicted a woman in traditional African robes crouched near to a fire & stirring a cooking pot; below the sketch were the dates for Christian Aid Week 2000 plus the caption, "A date doesn't change anything, but you can.".

The Parish Diary for May 2000 included the date for the Church Spring Fair; not surprisingly the reports from many of the organisations included requests for goods to be sold on the various stalls – cakes, home produce, books, bottles, plants; you name it there was stall for it!

Other news from the parish included a reminder that all Sidespeople, Churchwardens & PCC members should attend the forthcoming Archdeacon's Visitation to be sworn into Office; news of a Coffee Evening to be held in aid of Christian Aid, and a Coffee Morning to raise funds to buy books in readiness for the Sunday School Prize Giving.

The Uniformed Organisations had been hard at work making cards and gifts for Mothering Sunday; Beavers had also made chocolate nests for Easter and swords and shields for St. George's Day, whilst 16th Brownies had been constructing Robin Nesting Boxes as part of a nature challenge badge.

In May 2000, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Stuart O'Hara, age 11yrs "one of our recently appointed Servers". In May 2000 there were 3 Baptisms, and 3 Funerals recorded from the previous month, but no Weddings. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 347, collections were listed as £1584.

Popular Traditions – Ascension Day

There are many folk lore type traditions around Ascension Day, but little that is specifically related to Churches and worshipping communities, other than the celebration of a special Ascension Day Eucharist.

Outside of the Church, traditionally, work of any sort was thought to be unlucky on Ascension Day. In particular, the washing of clothes was discouraged – some even said that if you did the laundry on Ascension Day, someone in the family would die!

Clouds were said to form images of lambs, or even Biblical scenes on Ascension Day. Eggs laid on this day were said to never rot or go bad, and good fortune could be brought to a house by placing an Ascension Day egg upon the roof.

Finally, the eating of fowl or poultry was a widespread custom in many parts of Europe during the Middle Ages, because Christ "flew" to Heaven. Pigeons, pheasants, partridges, and even crows, graced the dinner tables in acknowledgement of this special day.

Things To Look Out For In May – Swifts

A screeching Swift overhead marks the beginning of summer for many. These short-stayed visitors arrive on our shores in May after making one of the longest migration journeys of any of our species. Swifts migrate roughly 3,400 miles each way, after spending the rest of the year in skies over sub-Saharan Africa. Despite the long journey, their time here is brief, and they leave the UK by the end of July.

Swifts and swallows can be distinguished by their wing shape, tail structure, and flight patterns. Swifts have long, pointed wings that sweep smoothly back like a boomerang, while swallows have shorter, more triangular wings with a deeply forked tail. Swifts are generally dark brown all over, while swallows are dark above but have a pale belly.



Even though their stay is short, their breeding territories are the only place that Swifts touchdown. Once a Swift leaves its nest, the next time it's thought to land again is when it lays its own clutch of eggs at either age two or three.

Along with eating on the wing, it's thought that Swifts even sleep in the sky. Studies have shown that some bird species can press snooze on one half of their brain at a time while in flight!

Despite all the adaptations which make Swifts successful, their populations are in steep decline. Insect numbers are plummeting, meaning a lack of feeding opportunities for this special species. Their nesting sites are also at risk, due to a lack of nooks and crevices in modern buildings.

Red Campion

The red campion is an attractive, medium to tall perennial or biennial plant with a downy stem. It has hairy leaves that grow in opposite pairs; it's flowers are a distinctive



pink-red in colour with five petals that are fused at their base to form a tube surrounded by a purple-brown calyx (protective sheath). Red campion is dioecious, meaning the male and female flowers grow on separate plants.

Look for red campions in lightly shaded areas in woodland, along hedgerows, in fields and ditches and on roadside verges. This species is an ancient woodland indicator, so may give a clue to the age of a wood. The flowers of red campion are important for various pollinating insects, including bees, butterflies and hoverflies.

Folklore tells that red campion flowers guard bees' honey stores, as well as protecting fairies from being discovered. In the Anglican Church, red campion is associated with Saint James as it flowers around his feast day.

Just a final fascination fact ... Traditional medicines used red campion seeds to treat snakebites!



Stories Of Jesus

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The first part of the Bible is called the Old Testament; this part of the Bible was written before Jesus was born.

Mary knew that it would look really bad for the Groom and his family if people realised that they had run out of wine, so she found Jesus and asked him to help.

"They have no wine", she told Jesus.

Jesus replied "... What concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." When He said this, He was reminding Mary that it wasn't yet time for Him to start performing miracles; He wasn't quite ready for everyone to know that He was the Son of God.



Mary listened, but she knew that Jesus would do something to help, so she spoke to the servants at the wedding and said to them, "Do whatever He tells you."

In every Jewish home there were large vessels, called water-pots, which the people kept filled with water to use for washing their hands and their feet. The Jews were very careful to keep themselves clean from dust and dirt, and because they walked about everywhere with only sandals on their feet they needed to wash often. In this home where the wedding-feast was being held, six large water-pots of stone were kept for this purpose.

Jesus told the servants to take the six large stone pots and fill them with water; once all the pots were full, He told them to fill a glass from one of the pots and take it to the man who was in charge of the wedding feast. The servants did exactly as Jesus had told them; they filled the six stone pots with water and then filled a glass from one of the pots and took it to the man who was in charge of the feast.

The man took a taste, and he couldn't believe how delicious it was;

it was the best wine he had ever tasted! Usually at a wedding feast the best wine is served first, but this time the best wine - the wine that Jesus had made from the water was served last.

Turning water into wine at the wedding at Cana was the first miracle that Jesus performed, and when His friends saw what He had done they began to realise how truly special Jesus was and put their faith in Him. However, Jesus was not yet ready to show

everyone that He was the Son of God, so he told His friends to keep what he had done a secret.





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
