

Interregnum Update

"Disappointment is a temporary detour, not a dead-end street." (Unknown)

What a wonderful quotation!

Having waited over 18 months for the Diocese to advertise the vacancy at Christ Church Ainsworth, it was incredibly disappointing to learn that there had been no applications for the post. Whilst it's been great to see people pulling together, and whilst a huge amount has been achieved since the start of the interregnum, every Church needs an Incumbent in post to provide leadership, guidance and support, and in that, Christ Church Ainsworth is no different.

However, as the opening quotation rightly reminds us, disappointment is not a permanent roadblock; it might sidetrack us momentarily, but it doesn't mean we can't find alternative paths or learn valuable lessons. Disappointments are part of everyday life, but we shouldn't let them define us; sometimes disappointments can end up leading us to greater determination and a renewed motivation or enable us to explore new opportunities.

And here is another wonderful quotation:

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29;11

At this time, Jeremiah was addressing the people of Israel who had been sent into exile in Babylon and were effectively under the enemy's control. During this period, there would have been many emotional and physical stressors affecting God's followers.

God tasked Jeremiah with delivering the message that the people would have to live and prosper in this hostile territory for the next 70 years; it's hardly surprising that the people were hesitant and felt as if they were being asked to do the impossible!

But God spoke through Jeremiah, reassuring the people that their faith in Him would be rewarded. He wasn't saying He'd swoop down and make everything easy for them. He simply told them that even though it's hard right now, they must have faith.

I sincerely hope that our interregnum doesn't last for 70 years!!!, but let's take that thought with us as we continue to work and worship at Christ Church Ainsworth during interregnum - even though it's hard right now, we must have faith.

The Children's Society

In 1881, a Sunday school teacher named Edward Rudolf founded a charity to benefit the poverty-stricken children, which he saw were in desperate need. He was a man who wanted to make a real difference to the lives of the children he saw begging and living on the streets of Victorian London.

All these years later, sadly the needs of impoverished children are still as great as they were then. Today, the charity he founded, The Children's Society, works tirelessly to aid and support children and young people in ways Edward Rudolf could hardly imagine.



Over the last 25 years, the areas in which the Society helps children has diversified from child runaways, to young carers. to abuse victims, to child refugees escaping war torn countries.

The one thing which remains constant however is the Society's link with the Church of England. Through the link with the church the charity has been able to raise awareness of the plight of children and young adults, and ask for help to fund all the vital projects they run. In our local area there are centres in Manchester, Rochdale and Oldham which work with children from all backgrounds to make a practical difference to their lives. Every time someone donates to The Children's Society, all the money goes directly to fund the campaigns and over 100 services around the country. They do not spend money on advertising, preferring to keep costs to a minimum.

Children are at the centre of their focus. People like Katie.....

Katie was 13 years old when one day the police knocked on her door and asked to see her mobile phone. They explained that a group of men had been pretending to be teenagers so they could groom her and two other girls. Although Katie had thought she knew who she was chatting to online, the police were able to link them to Katie's mobile. Katie lost all her confidence and found it hard to speak about her experience to family or teachers. The police referred Katie to The Children's Society and a specialist Counsellor went to visit Katie at home. Over the course of some months, she was able to encourage Katie to attend classes to help young people keep safe online, and also to take part in discussion groups within The Children's Society to share ideas on how to be aware of social media dangers. Katie is now regaining her confidence to use online platforms but within agreed boundaries with her family.

Help like that given to Katie is invaluable, but specialist training for Counsellors costs money. If you could donate the cost of your morning cup of coffee, that would be a welcome gift. If you could donate the cost of your lunchtime meal deal from a supermarket, that could pay for children like Katie to attend a group session. If you could donate the cost of an extra Christmas present, that would cover an hour's training for online safety for one of the Society's project workers. Every pound counts.

With your help, The Children's Society can make a real difference to the lives of the young people they see. Just as Edward Rudolf wanted when it all began.

Make Your own Christingle – A 'How To' Guide

If you are planning to come along to the Christingle Service on Wednesday 4th December at 6.30pm and would like to know how to make a Christingle read on!

You Will Need:

- 1 piece of roundish fruit
- Red tape or ribbon
- 1 candle we'll be giving these out at MidWeek Praise on 29th November.
- Small piece of tin foil or foil milk bottle top
- 4 x cocktail sticks
- Dried fruit eg raisins, or soft sweets eg Haribos

Here's What To Do:

- 1. Choose your fruit, usually an orange. You might want to cut the bottom off your orange, so it doesn't wobble around.
- 2. Use red tape (electrical tape or coloured sellotape) to stick around the centre of the orange. If you don't have any tape, you can pin a red ribbon around the centre of the orange or colour a strip of paper in red and then sellotape it in place around the middle.



- 3. Push a pencil into the top of the orange to make a hole for the candle.
- 4. Use a foil milk bottle top or cut a square of foil approx 4cm in size then make a slit in it so that it fits over the candle. Position at the base of the candle.
- 5. Place your choice of fruit (grapes, raisins, sultanas, satsuma segments or your own favourite), and sweets (jelly type sweets work best as they need to be pushed onto the sticks) on the table and carefully thread them onto the 4 cocktail sticks.
- 6. Push the 4 cocktail sticks into the orange above the red tape. Make sure they point upwards at an angle and do not touch the candle (like this \setminus /).

Your Christingle is now ready to bring along to the Service. Please remember there will be a collection for the Children's Society during the Service.

Stir Up Sunday

Stir-up Sunday is the informal term for the last Sunday before the season of Advent, and this year falls on

24th November. The day doesn't actually get its name from 'stirring the pudding', but from the Book of Common Prayer (1662), as the Collect set for this day begins with the words,

"Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people; that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works, may of thee be plenteously rewarded; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen".

It was supposed to reinforce the significance of this day as forming part of the preparation for the season of Advent. However, in Victorian times it became associated with the lovely custom of families preparing for Christmas together by making the Christmas pudding. Most recipes for Christmas pudding require it to be cooked well in advance of Christmas and then re-heated on Christmas Day, so the Collect of the day served as a useful reminder.

The Christmas pudding is thought to have been introduced to Britain by Prince Albert, husband of Queen Victoria. However, it is thought that a version of the pudding was actually introduced from Germany by George I in 1714.

In recent years, Church of England Churches now observe this Sunday as 'Christ the King'.

Once you've done that, choose the amount you wish to donate – the suggested options are £5, £10, £20 or £50, but there is also an option to click and choose your own amount. Next, simply follow the on screen instructions fill in your personal details, (if you are a tax payer you can choose to add Gift Aid to increase your donation), then enter your card

details. When you're finished, you'll get a 'Thank You' message on screen and you can request a receipt via email for your own records – simple!

National Tree Week; 23/11-01/12/2024

This initiative has its roots (pardon the pun!) in a campaign that was launched over 50 years ago.



"Plant A Tree In 1973", became a national phenomenon, and has grown in popularity year on year; now being co-ordinated by The Tree Council. The Tree Council brings everyone together with a shared mission to care for trees and our planet's future. They inspire and empower organisations, government, communities and individuals with the knowledge and tools to create positive, lasting change at a national and local level.

The Tree Council run seasonal initiatives throughout the year, including 'Spring In Your Step', 'Trees Love Care', 'Seed Gathering Season' and 'National Tree Week' which this year runs from 23rd November to 1st December.

What Is It? National Tree Week brings together the conservation sector, volunteers and tree-lovers to mark the start of the annual tree planting season.

Who Can Take Part? Anyone can participate – whether you're an individual, business, organisation, community group, school, university or local authority.

How Can I Get Involved? There are many National Tree Week events happening throughout the country; visit <u>National Tree Week -</u> join the UK's largest tree celebration and use the interactive National Tree Week map to find tree activities in your area. 

From the Archives – November 1999

The sketch on the inside front cover of the November 1999 Parish Magazine showed a group of people gathered around a war memorial, their heads bowed in prayer; what a talented artist Mr. Roly Moss was.

The Parish Diary for November 1999 gave details of the Remembrance Sunday Service, and also the date for the Deanery Advent Service, and a note encouraging folk to attend. Also listed was the date of the Church Christmas Fair.

Many of the groups and Organisations touched on the Christmas Fair within their articles that month; request were made for donations of produce to sell on the various stalls, help to set up in preparation for the event, and help to run the stalls on the day. There was also a mention that the Mayor and Mayoress of Bury were expected to open this event.

In other news, there was a note of appreciation to Margaret Turner, who had continued to play the organ each Sunday 'despite having her leg and foot in plaster'!! plus a request for 'knitters' to create warm winter garments for shipment to Romania; around 20 parcels had been sent from Ainsworth throughout the course of the year, but an additional plea was sent out ahead of the colder winter months.

In November 1999, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mark Haworth, "our youngest sidesman". In November 1999 there were 5 Baptisms, 1 Wedding and 1 Funeral recorded from the previous month. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 305, collections were listed as £1703.

Praying Through The Seasons – Remembrance

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted." Matthew 5; 4

The month of November is in many ways a month of remembrance, a month of remembering. These last few weeks at the end of the Church's year are a period to look back, to reassess, to consider how the past affects our lives now.

November begins with All Saints' Day when we remember with thanksgiving the life and witness of the great multitude of saints, of faithful men and women down the ages. We celebrate their example and are reminded that we too are called to be saints, God's holy people.

Then on the 2nd of November we mark All Souls' Day, when we remember with affection our departed loved ones, ordinary people, those who have influenced our lives, those who have given us love.

Finally on 11th November we mark Armistice Day, with Remembrance Sunday on the nearest Sunday, this year the 10th. We remember with gratitude those who gave their lives for the cause of freedom, in the two World Wars but also in other conflicts since. It is an occasion as well to pray for peace, for an end to war and conflict.

The prophet Isaiah foretold of a time when people would willingly give up their weapons of war and allow the Prince of Peace to reign in their hearts.

He was speaking of the coming of Jesus. It is wonderful that his vision of hope and peace should inspire peacemakers today. Before he died, Jesus knew that he did not have long left on earth and wanted to offer his disciples words of comfort.

So, he told them, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" (John 14; 27).

Today, fear and conflict and loss are as prevalent in the world as they have ever been, but the peace Jesus offered his disciples is timeless and still there for those who love him today, tomorrow, and for all eternity.

Loving God, lead us from death to life; from falsehood to truth; from despair to hope; from fear to trust; from hate to love; from war to peace. Let peace fill our hearts, our world, and our universe. In Jesus' name we pray - Amen

For All The Saints – November; St. Catherine of Alexandria

Name: St. Catherine of Alexandria Feast Day: 25th November Born: 287AD Died: 305AD Place of burial: St. Catherine's Monastery, Egypt. Patron Saint Of: Philosophers, students, unmarried girls and apologists, and believed to help protect against sudden death

If you've ever had a small firework display in your garden, you have probably nailed a Catherine wheel to a post in the hope that once lit it will rotate and emit starry sparks from a wonderful spiral of light. The firework is named after St. Catherine of Alexandria, from the 4th century whose feast day is celebrated by most churches on 25th November and who was condemned to death on a wheel. Catherine was of noble birth and was well educated. Around the age of 14 she converted to Christianity after seeing a vision of the Virgin Mary and infant Jesus; she described her decision as "becoming the bride of Christ". Interestingly this term is still used by Christian nuns to denote their status and by the wearing of a wedding ring. Persecutions of Christians began under the Emperor Maxentius and Catherine went to him and rebuked him for his cruelty. He summoned 50 of his cleverest philosophers to argue with her but in the end it was the philosophers who converted. Needless to say, the Emperor immediately had them all executed! He then ordered Catherine to be thrown into prison and tortured, however, during her time in prison, many people came to visit her and were converted to Christianity. Emperor Maxentius then tried to win her over by proposing marriage, which she refused, declaring her spouse was Jesus Christ. He was furious and condemned her to an agonising death on a spiked breaking wheel, but before the torture could begin the wheel shattered when she touched it. This was generally interpreted as God's intervention. Emperor Maxentius finally ordered for her to be beheaded.

St. Catherine was deemed to be the most important of the virgin martyrs; her relics were supposedly found at the foot of Mount Sinai in the year 800 and this later became the site of St Catherine's Monastery, a popular medieval pilgrimage site.

Much of Catherine's story is legendary as the earliest surviving account of her life comes 600 years after her martyrdom, her symbol

being the spiked wheel.

Catherine is considered to be the patron saint of students, unmarried girls and apologists amongst others. Many places have been named after her, including Colleges in Oxford and Cambridge, (the latter was founded on St Catherine's Day for a small community of scholars who would exclusively study theology and philosophy). In England 62 churches have been dedicated to her, and 170 medieval bells still bear her name. She features in many works of art as well as being remembered during November by the firework named after her.

Curious, he took the box to his wife, who smiled awkwardly and said "I guessed you'd find that some day." She explained, "When I collect a dozen eggs, I sell them for £2.00 and put the money in the box."

The new young vicar finished his round of visits and parked his bicycle outside a local bar, even though he knew it was a crime-ridden area. When he emerged he found his bike had been stolen. He went back into the bar and challenged a group of shady characters about which one had moved his bike. "Come on", he said sternly, "one of you rogues knows something about this and if my bike isn't returned by the time I leave this bar, I'm going to do something I once did in Manchester." He hung around for a while and when he left the bar he saw his bike had been returned. He was about to ride off when one of the group came out and said "Before you go vicar, what exactly did you do in Manchester?" The vicar turned and said "I had to walk home!"



The Season Of Remembrance

November is a very busy and emotional month in the life of the



Church. It all begins on the 1st November which is 'All Saints Day'; this is the day on which we particularly remember to thank God for all the Saints who have

gone before us, and for all of the incredible things that they achieved.

The next day (2nd November) is 'All Souls Day'; this is a day of celebration to remember those who have died, particularly members of our own families, friends or people that we were close to, and to give



A few days later, on the 11th November, is Remembrance Day, a



day when the whole country comes together to remember and give thanks to God for all those who sacrificed their lives while serving their country in the

armed forces.

Remembrance Day

thanks to God for their lives.

Many of the special dates and seasons that we celebrate in Church date back thousands of years, right back to the days when Jesus was alive; however, Remembrance Day was first celebrated just over 100 years ago, at the end of the first world war.

There are many different reasons and answers to the question "Why did World War 1 start?"; it was a complicated time; a lot of things happened; some people said and did things that maybe they shouldn't have done, and tension built up until the eventual start of World War 1, which began on July 28, 1914. The conflict lasted four years, three months and 14 days, ending on November 11, 1918. During that time many thousands of people lost their lives.

An armistice is a situation in a war where the warring parties agree to stop fighting; the first Armistice Day was observed at

11am on 11 November 1919, throughout the British Commonwealth, to commemorate the armistice agreement that had ended the First World War a year earlier. This agreement had happened at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918.





This first official Armistice Day commemoration was held in the grounds of Buckingham Palace and King George V asked the public to observe a 2 minute silence at 11am, "So the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead".

During the Second World War it was agreed that the name 'Armistice Day' should be changed to 'Remembrance Day' so that

those who had lost their lives in that war could also be included. In more recent times, servicemen and women killed and injured in other conflicts since the Second World War have also been included, and

services are held at parish churches and local memorials across the country on the closest Sunday to Remembrance Day.

So Why Do Some People Wear A Poppy On Remembrance Day?

In many parts of France, after the war was over, fields of bright,



red poppies began to grow on the land where many of the major battles had been fought; these poppies were seen as a symbol of hope for the

future, but also as reminder of those who had lost their lives during the fighting in those very fields.

Wearing a red poppy shows respect for the many people who died fighting for their country in the First World War and in the conflicts that have followed it.



Remembrance prayer

Dear Heavenly Father, Forgive the tension, frustration, jealousy and anger that we sometimes feel.

Help us to love our enemies, forgive those who harm us, and try to understand each other's problems,

Through Jesus Christ our Lord - Amen

Remembrance Day Craft Idea - paper poppy wreath You will need:

1 paper plate

10 or 12 red cup cake cases (or you could use white cases and colour them red)

Black tissue paper scrunched up into 10 or 12 balls

Green card (or you could use white card and colour it green) Scissors

Green felt tip or crayon

Glue

Here's what to do:

Use a felt tip to write your remembrance message on the middle part of the paper plate.

To make the poppies, place a small blob of glue on the inside of each red cup cake case, then stick a ball of scrunched up black tissue paper into the middle of each cup cake case.

Use the green felt tip to colour all around the outside edge of the paper plate.

Get a grown up to help you to cut some leaf shapes from the green card.

Use the glue to stick the poppies all around the outside edge of the paper plate (the part that you've coloured green)

Finally, tuck the leaf shapes in between the poppies and use more glue to stick them down

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
