

#### **Interregnum Update**

"No one can whistle a symphony. It takes a whole orchestra to play it."

(H.E. Luccock)

There are many quotes about teamwork, but I particularly like this one. In its most direct interpretation, it reminds us that whilst one person may be able to whistle a beautiful tune by themselves, they can never produce a symphony on their own. To play a symphony people must come together, each bringing with them their different instruments, their different experiences, their different talents, their different God-given gifts; and they must choose to play together to create the beautiful harmonies that become a masterpiece.

The wonderful thing about this analogy is that it can be applied to almost any situation that requires teamwork – including our Churches. To create beautiful music the whole Church Community has to come together, has to bring their own unique experiences and gifts, and has to work together.

But it doesn't just stop there, when we come together and work as a team, it has a multiplier effect. The sum of the whole isn't just 1 + 1 = 2, it's more like 1 x 100 in the effect that each person has when they pull together.

In the early days of Christianity there were no buildings set aside for worship and there were no Vicars, but 'The Church' thrived because those early Christians came together filled with the Holy Spirit, they pooled their talents and resources and became 'The Church'. The result was beautiful music which is still being played throughout the world over 2 million years later.

In our world today, 'The Church' isn't just a building which is set aside for weekly worship; 'The Church' isn't just about the Vicar who leads it (although obviously it would be great if we had one!!!); **We** are 'The Church', each and every one of us.

And here's another interesting analogy; an Orchestra without a Conductor can still produce good music, maybe not the best music, as that requires someone to co-ordinate and manage all the individual players and their parts; but a Conductor without an Orchestra is back to trying to whistle that Symphony on his / her own.

We're now 18 months into interregnum; our 'Orchestra' has got used to playing without a Conductor, and I for one, think they are doing a pretty good job!

#### **Wild Worship**

The theme for Wild Worship this year was 'Going On A Prayer Hunt'; if you happened to be walking through our churchyard on a Wednesday evening during the Summer holidays, you may have noticed the children (and parents) busily searching for prayers! Each week our prayers have focused on a different letter; **P** involved People Prayers and eating Pineapple; **R** was Ripple Prayers and munching on Raspberries; **A** saw us creating Paper PrAyeroplanes (which were very reluctant to fly!!) and eating Apricots. For the letter **Y**, we did **Y**oga prayers and ate **Y**ummy Haribos; **E** saw us praying for Everyone on our streets and enjoying Eclairs and Extremely juicy strawberries.

At our final session we had a Round up of all of our favourite types of prayers then Roasted marshmallows.

In readiness for the new school year, the children were asked to bring their school bag, lunch box or pencil case to Church with them for this last session; the bags, boxes and pencil cases were then blessed, and each child was given a tag to attach to their bag to remind them that God is always with them.









#### Family Gardening Group

A small but enthusiastic group of 'gardeners' have had a great time working in our Churchyard over the Summer holidays. As well as creating a vegetable and herb patch, and a bright and colourful pallet garden, designed to attract butterflies, bugs and bees, we've planted seeds in the hope that we'll have an

autumn crop of radishes, land cress and kale, and helped members of the Churchyard Team by sweeping the Church path, raking up fallen leaves and twigs for composting, and scraping moss of headstones.

We've also made bird feeders, bugs, sunflower terrariums and spiders!

At our final session we were joined by Revd Canon Donna Williams, Area Dean of Bury & Rossendale, who helped us rake up the many leaves left behind following the strong winds, then presented our little gardeners with 'special pencils' to remind them that God is always with them and always loves them.

#### **EcoChurch**

We've had lots of fresh air and fun with our Eco Church activities through the Summer months, but EcoChurch isn't just about the great outdoors; we can all help the environment by considering our everyday actions and lifestyles, and how they might impact on nature and the world's resources.

#### **Top Tip for September:**

Tackle climate change and reduce your heating bill by testing how draughty or leaky your home is. Find the gaps that let the cold air in and warm air out (think keyholes, letterboxes, gaps around the edges or bottoms of windows and doors, loft hatches, floorboards etc.) and fix these gaps using the correct materials: (there are lots of handy tutorials on how to do this online). Now is also a good time to prepare for winter by sticking tinfoil or radiator panels between the wall and radiator, as these will help reflect heat back into your room during the colder months.



#### Around The Organisations ...

#### **Transformation - Now!**



The theme from the latest Mothers' Union Newsletter is **HOPE**. Discover the transformative power of the Mothers' Union Literacy Programme in South Sudan.

"Read our brand-new research into how the programme creates leadership opportunities to formerly illiterate women and transforms lives in the process.

For the women who have gone through the Mothers' Union Literacy Programme across Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, and South Sudan, a powerful mantra has emerged: "I used to be blind, but now I can see."

This statement reflects the profound transformation these women have experienced - a journey from the shadows of illiteracy to the light of empowerment and leadership.

The paths taken by these "alumni" showcase the remarkable impact of literacy education. As one participant shared, "To become a learner is to take the first step onto the ladder leading to greater capacity, respect within the family, and esteem in the community." Indeed, the programme serves as a stepping stone, empowering women to read sacred texts, improve hygiene practices, join savings groups, and seek elected positions.

The numbers tell a powerful story.

- A staggering 69.5% of alumni surveyed now hold community leadership roles, acting as resource persons (55%), Mothers' Union leaders (54%), and leaders of savings associations (49%).
- Within churches, they have become lay readers (46%), Sunday school leaders (45%), and even ordained clergy (11%).
- Economically, 36% lead business enterprises.

"I now see that literacy can empower women to take on elective leadership roles and succeed," affirmed one alumna, capturing the sentiments of all 100% of participants surveyed.

Thanks to your support of Mothers' Union, together, we are transforming lives around the corner and around the world".

Ever since I joined Mothers' Union in 1980, I've been hearing about how MU is changing lives, even being fortunate to see for myself some of the work in Kenya. At first, we as members in the UK and Ireland were funding a lot of the 'overseas' work but now most zones throughout the world manage to self-fund their programmes. One of the remarks that stands out for me is that after enrolling and completing a programme, women receive respect in their own families. This makes such a difference in families where the mother/sister/daughter has often been a bystander with no input into family activities or finances. As a result of various projects, marriages have been revitalised, domestic abuse has been dramatically reduced, finances have been improved, businesses have begun, jobs have been created. Equality and hope exists.

#### Be Proud To Be A Cog In The Mothers' Union Engine!

Our first meeting in September is on Tuesday, 3<sup>rd</sup> September at 2.30pm in the Church Hall. This will be a time of fellowship once again on the 'Happy Hour' theme. Matthew 25 v 40 says, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me". I have just seen on social media about a young boy who stopped, got off his bike and pushed a wheelchair user up a steep hill. That prompted the idea that we could share stories of someone being kind to us or vice versa. Everyone is welcome.

For our 'away date' on the 17<sup>th</sup> September we are 'Going Visiting'. More details to members at our next two meetings.

Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> September at 2.00pm, is the date of our Deanery Summer of Hope Fundraiser. This will take place at Emmanuel Church Centre, Longsight Road, Ramsbottom. BL8 4BD.

The guest speaker is Ruth Spencer, and her topic is 'Almost Bake Off'. Ruth was a 'finalist in waiting' in the wings of the Great British Bake Off.

#### **Praying Through The Seasons – Creationtide**

"Then the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the East, and there he put the man he had formed."

Genesis 2; 8

From September to October each year the Christian Community celebrates the Season of Creation by praying and acting together to protect our common home. It begins on 1st September, the World day of Prayer for Creation. As Christians, we share a common role as caretakers of God's creation.

We often take for granted the world in which we live; it's easy to get used to the green area around our home, the fabulous sunset at the end of the day; it's easy to become complacent and forget to notice and be thankful. It's easy to forget that we are the caretakers of this wonderful world that God has created.

And yet you don't have to look too far to see that God is indeed present in everything; in bright light and dull darkness, in the energy of each day and the rest that comes with night; in the heavens high above our heads, in waters that run deep around the world; in solid land and flowing seas, in vivid flowers and fruit laden-trees; in the rising and setting of the sun, and the cycles of the seasons, in the patterns of the shining stars; in oceans teeming with fish, in skies filled with birds; in this world filled with animal life, and in ourselves as human beings.

"And God looked and saw all that he had made, and indeed it was very good." Genesis 1; 31

#### For All The Saints – September; St. Matthew The Apostle

Name: St. Matthew The Apostle Feast Day: 21st September

Born: AD 4 Died: AD 68

Place of burial: Salerno Cathedral in southern Italy

Patron Saint Of: Accountants, Bankers, Bookkeepers, Security

Guards and Stockbrokers!!

Matthew the Apostle is named in the New Testament as one of the twelve apostles of Jesus. According to Christian traditions, he was also one of the four Evangelists as author of the Gospel of Matthew. If Matthew is indeed the author, or source, of the first Gospel, then this is a small piece of autobiography.

Matthew was born in Nazareth; Mark and Luke, called him 'Levi', which suggests that he came from a family with priestly connections; how then how did he come to be working for the Romans as a collector of taxes? We may never know the answer to that question, but we do know that Matthew answered Jesus's call to follow him.

Matthew, like the rest of the disciples of Jesus, was a Jew. Whilst his Gospel is unlikely to have been written first, it is placed as the first Gospel in the New Testament, as Matthew's words link the New Testament with the Hebrew Scriptures which we know as the Old Testament. Right from the start, this Gospel wants to set the story of Jesus in the context of the history of Israel and the purposes of God in that history. Unlike the other gospel accounts, Matthew traces the family tree of Jesus back to Abraham, the Father of Israel, setting Jesus firmly in the unfolding purpose of God. Matthew is almost nudging us to realise that the events that he records didn't happen by accident; God is at work in history and was at work in the history of the people of Abraham.

Matthew preached the Gospel to the Jewish community in Judea, before going to 'other countries', although there is no clear definition of which other countries these were, almost all sources mention Ethiopia. According to Church tradition, whilst preaching in Ethiopia, Matthew converted and then consecrated to God, Ephigenia of Ethiopia, the virgin daughter of the Aethiopian King Egippus. When King Hirtacus succeeded Egippus, he asked the apostle if he could persuade Ephigenia to marry him. Matthew invited the King to Mass the following Sunday, where he rebuked him for lusting after the girl, as she was a nun and therefore was the bride of Christ. The King was enraged and ordered his bodyguard to kill Matthew as he stood at the altar, making him a martyr. Matthew's tomb is located in the crypt of Salerno Cathedral in southern Italy.

Matthew is recognised as a saint, and his feast day is held on 21st September in the Western world. Matthew's Gospel gives us a wonderful vision of the overarching purpose of God; at the start of the story, we are told that the child that is born is 'Emmanuel', meaning 'God with us', at the very end, we hear the words of that child, now the risen Son of God, promising that He will be with them 'always, even to the end of the age'.



Naaman waited, but Elisha did not come outside. Instead, a servant came outside and told Naaman that Elisha had a message for him, "Elisha said that you should go and wash in the Jordan River seven times. If you do this, then the Lord will take away your leprosy, and you will be well."

Naaman was very angry. Didn't Elisha know that he was an important army commander? How dare Elisha tell him to go and wash in the dirty Jordan River! Gehazi made a different discovery - he discovered that God sees and knows everything that we do, and that lying and cheating are a really bad idea!
