EcoChurch



One of the areas which the EcoChurch scheme takes into account, is how much churches engage with global climate campaigns and initiatives; this could include things like raising awareness of climate crises in other countries, taking part in national initiatives such as 'Earth Day', supporting global campaigns to help those affected by climate crisis.

Whilst our Church already supports various charities and campaigns, there is so much more that we could all be doing.



One of the initiatives that we've signed up to through EcoChurch is a scheme called 'Toilet Twinning'. Did you know that over 1.7 billion people don't have somewhere safe to go to the toilet? Without proper toilets and clean water, people are trapped in a vicious cycle:

- They're likely to become sick through sanitation-related diseases.
- Illness means they cannot work or farm their land, so they earn less or grow less food.
- Children often miss school because they are sick or because they're busy collecting water.
- Girls often drop out of school altogether when they start their periods if there are no toilets or changing rooms.
- Parents have to pay for medicines, so they may fall into debt.
- Women and girls risk being attacked as they go to the toilet in the open, especially if the culture dictates that they have to go out at night.

Water and sanitation projects enable families to build a toilet, have access to clean water, and to learn about handwashing and other hygiene principles. Dignity is restored when the whole family can use

a private, hygienic toilet at their home and no longer have to squat in the bush.

Here is Ruth's story:

For two years, Ruth and her family lived in a squalid refugee camp in the Democratic Republic of Congo without any toilets or water. But then they moved to a different camp: one that has brand-new toilets and showers that were installed in a project that Toilet Twinning helped fund!

For years, Ruth wasn't sure she could keep her family alive. 'Now we can protect ourselves and our children from diseases,' she says.

It costs £60 to 'twin' a toilet; this money not only provides a safe and hygienic toilet area for families and communities, it also funds an education process within that community. For many communities, hearing about the link between sanitation and health is a revelation: a light bulb moment. Many have never known why diarrhoea is so common, and why their children have fallen ill or died.

Where possible the whole community will be involved in this process and also the process of constructing the toilet facility, because a community that has built its own latrine is much more likely to use it and look after it.

In some places, of course, this approach isn't possible. So, in conflict areas or places hit by a natural disaster, specialist water and sanitation teams will be drafted in to dig wells and build latrines.

And so, we agreed that our Church should try to raise £60 to twin our church toilet – thanks to an incredibly generous donation from a member of our congregation this has been achieved before we have even finalised the campaign details!! Look out for a 'Toilet Twinned' certificate being displayed in our Church loo in the coming weeks.

But did you know that safe water is just as important?

Here's why it all matters:

Bridget lives in south-west Uganda. She has four sisters. Her father is a banana farmer and Bridget often helps him in the plantation.

Every day Bridget walks to a spring to fetch water. The water is contaminated by animal and human waste from household toilets that have been built in the wrong place.

During assembly at Bridget's school, children are chosen to go and fetch water from a spring quite far away. Often, by the time they get

back to school classes have already started. Children are getting left behind in their education every day.

Thankfully, due to people twinning their taps a tap-stand has now been installed at Bridget's school so that pupils now have clean water on site and don't have to miss their lessons anymore!



And so, our next campaign is to try to raise another \pounds 60 to enable us to 'twin' our church tap and by doing so enable a community in a deprived country to enjoy the benefits of safe, accessible water – something that we take so much

for granted.

Please help us to reach our target by placing your loose change in the collection bucket at the back of church – and remember – every little helps! Thank you.

Eco Church Top Tip for May:

"Say no to the mow. Mowing your lawn less, and letting parts of it grow long, saves you time and helps give nature a home. If you want to make an even bigger impact for wildlife, don't mow your lawn or a section of it all until August to help even more animals."

Thanks to the wonders of modern technology, we are now able to accept online donations to support the work of our church.

Once you've done that, choose the amount you wish to donate – the suggested options are £5, £10, £20 or £50, but there is also an option to click and choose your own amount. Next, simply follow the on screen instructions fill in your personal details, (if you are a tax payer you can choose to add Gift Aid to increase your donation), then enter your card

details. When you're finished, you'll get a 'Thank You' message on screen and you can request a receipt via email for your own records – simple!

Ascension Day

During the 40 days after Easter Sunday, Jesus appeared to many different people and did many good deeds.

Jesus also spent a lot of time with his friends, teaching them and praying with them. He told them, "Soon, you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit and receive the power of God. You must tell my story to the people in Jerusalem and to people all over the Earth; tell the people to believe in me even if they can't see me."

On the 40th day after Easter Sunday, Jesus and his friends went to The Mount of Olives to talk and pray. Whilst they were there a bright

light shone from the sky and a large cloud came down. The cloud wrapped itself around Jesus and he was taken up to the heavens. This is what we call the Ascension.

Jesus's friends remembered what he had told them and returned to Jerusalem to wait for his promised gift of the Holy Spirit.

Thy Kingdom Come 18 – 28th May 2023

Thy Kingdom Come is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world



to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

Since it began in May 2016, God has grown Thy Kingdom Come from a dream of possibility into a movement which unites more than a million Christians in prayer, in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, across 85 different denominations and traditions - so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ.

Every person, household and church are encouraged to pray during the 11 days in their own way.

Praying for five people to come to know the love of Jesus, is at the heart of Thy Kingdom Come. There are lots of ways to do this. You could write down the names of the 5 people you're praying for on your phone, on your mirror or on a little card as a reminder to pray for them throughout the day. You could use a band and tie 5 knots, each one representing your 5 or maybe each time you drink a cup of tea or coffee, you could remember to pray for them. Or perhaps you could pray during your daily exercise such as running or walking – holding one person each day in prayer then praying for them all collectively on the last day.

As part of the 'Praying For 5' initiative, we've produced some simple bookmarks with spaces to write down the names of the 5 people that you will pray for throughout this period. Make sure you pick up your 'Praying For 5' bookmark next time you're in Church.

Christian Aid Week 14 – 20th May 2023

The breaking-ground work of 'Christian Aid' began in 1945, when the charity was founded by British and Irish churches to help refugees following the Second World War.

For more than 75 years, Christian Aid has provided humanitarian relief and long-term development support for poor communities worldwide, while highlighting suffering, tackling injustice and championing people's rights.

During the 1940's, Christian Aid raised more than £80,000 (£3 million plus in today's money) for emergency supplies to support refugees in mainland Europe. Alongside practical assistance, the charity also supported, equipped and enabled partner churches in affected areas to meet the needs of their people.

Christian Aid week was launched in the 1950's to raise extra funds as support from the Charity was in ever greater demand.

Since its inception, Christian Aid has supported refugees in many different parts of the world; those who are displaced through conflict, political tension, or climate change. Christian Aid supported the establishment of the Voluntary Service Overseas, to enable young people to 'make a difference'. Christian Aid works to educate communities that are in need of support to encourage them to become self-sufficient over time; they also educate supporters around the world regarding the root cause of poverty, and work with partners overseas to eradicate it.

Christian Aid is currently heavily involved in supporting those in Malawi who have been adversely affected by Cyclone Freddy; the impact of the recent cyclone has been devastating - floods have washed away crops, over 500,000 people have been displaced and hundreds have lost their lives.

Christian Aid has partnered with various other aid agencies to respond to the immediate recovery needs of communities. This includes:

- Providing corn soya blend for porridge for breastfeeding mothers and children under 5 years
- Providing mosquito nets for families to provide protection against malaria.

- Providing temporary toilets and bathrooms, water containers and water treatment to help prevent the risk of cholera.
- Setting up and running mobile clinics to help people process the emotional trauma of the cyclone.
- Distribution of cash to 1,000 households so that families can purchase goods to meet their immediate needs.

People often make the mistake of thinking that the charity only supports people in third world countries, but the reality is that wherever in our world there is injustice or deprivation, you can be pretty certain that Christian Aid will be on the case. Their aim is to ensure that **everyone** has the chance to live a full life, free from poverty.

So, what can we do to help?

This year Christian Aid Week is 14th - 20th of May; during this week we're encouraged to Give, Act and Pray to support the work of Christian Aid.

Our Church has supported Christian Aid for a number of years, both through Christian Aid week giving and also through supporting specific crisis appeals.

This year our main Christian Aid Week 'bucket collection' will be held in church on Sunday 21st of May; we'll also be joined at that Service by Mr. Les Johnson, who has kindly agreed to come along and talk to us about the work of Christian Aid; please do your best to join us at this Service if you can, but please also hold the work and workers of Christian Aid in your prayers.

King's Coronation Online

For those who may not be able to join us for our Coronation Services, an online service for the Coronation of King Charles III will be streamed from the Church of England's website, and Facebook and YouTube channels, on Sunday 7th May 2023, and made available on-demand immediately after its conclusion.

From the Archives – May 1998

In May 1998 there were a number of additional Services listed in the Parish Diary; an Ascension Day Communion Service; a School Service; and the Archdeacon's Visitation (to be held at Bury Parish Church).

The 'Parish News' page included a note of thanks to Ainsworth Community Association for the planting of hundreds of daffodil bulbs which 'are likely to bring pleasure to the community for many years to come'. Also, a short article about a scheme called 'Work Aid', which collected and repaired unwanted tools to pass onto people in countries affected by flood, fire and famine, thus enabling individuals to work again and 'help themselves'. In other news, the PCC had elected 8 members to serve on PCC for a 3 year term but noted the loss of 7 longstanding members over the previous 12 month period.,

Elsewhere, a working party planned to repaint the church railings; a Christian Aid collection was to be held on 'Christian Aid Day' (16/05/98); Mothers' Union members had enjoyed an evening of rest, relaxation and reflexology with Marilyn Wildin; The Church Women's Fellowship had enjoyed an 'Evening of Music and Song'; Young Families were about to do a Sponsored Sing Song; Brownies had been on an epic visit to 'Cadbury's World', and Cubs had reported on a successful 'Job Week'.

There was also a request for anyone who had an unused and unwanted Bible to please get in touch, as a small contingent was heading out to various parts of the world to supply aid and bibles.

In May 1998, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mrs. Doris Isabel Foster, 'a tireless worker for the Church in so many areas of Parish life, that to list them all would require a special magazine supplement'. whilst the Holiday Church article, provided by Mr. John Maudesley, gave an interesting account of the Church of St. Aiden, Bamburgh.

In May 1998 there were 5 Baptisms and 1 Funeral recorded from the previous month, but no weddings. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 303, with the Collections listed as $\pounds1464$.

David J. Evans was born in Dartford, Kent, in 1957. As a child he lived in Winchester; he was educated at the University of Southampton and is a music teacher who has been involved in leading contemporary worship in a number of 'new' churches. Although he has written many worship songs; by far the best known is 'Be still, for the Presence of the Lord'.

David Evans was only in his twenties when he wrote both the words and music of this comparatively modern hymn; a hymn that immediately gained widespread popularity. Published in 1986, it made it into the Church of Ireland's book Irish Church Praise by 1990—just four years in a church that took two hundred years to officially allow some of Wesley's hymns to be sung!

Those who are up bright and early on Easter Sunday morning will know that we sing this hymn at our Easter Dawn Service. The hymn is both profound and very simple and is filled with Biblical references and allusions, which start in Genesis and run right through to the book of Revelation. The words express a strong sense of God's glory, but also remind us that it isn't just about being overawed by God, it is also about making space for God in our lives; often it is by being still that we know that God is there.

As we sing these words in the grey light of dawn, standing around the brazier in our churchyard, accompanied only by bird song, these

words are incredibly poignant and beautiful. It never ceases to send a shiver up my spine.



People In The Bible

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose - some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history.

Many years had passed since Moses had led the people of Israel out of Egypt. As time passed, the people forgot how God had saved them and how they had promised to obey the 10 Commandments that God gave to Moses. They began to argue amongst themselves, they said and did things that were wrong, and they forgot that there is only 1 true God and began to make other 'Gods' up and worship them.

Obviously, God wasn't too impressed with this behaviour, and so as a punishment, He allowed their enemies, the Philistines, to take charge and rule over the people of Israel. The Philistines took all of the best food so the Israelites went hungry; they took all of the best land so the Israelites had nowhere to live or grow crops; and they also took all of the Israelite's weapons so the Israelites couldn't fight them.

The people of Israel were very unhappy, and so they pleaded with God to forgive them and to get rid of the Philistines. Because God always forgives us if we are truly sorry, God heard their pleas and forgave them.

One of the Israelites was a man called Manoah; one night an Angel came to Manoah's wife and told her, "You will give birth to a son, who will grow up and save Israel from the Philistines. For this to happen, you



must do as I say; your son must never drink any wine, he must let his hair grow long and not cut it, and he must become a Nazarite Priest."

Soon after that, Manoah's wife gave birth to a baby boy; they called him Samson; you can read Samson's full story in the book of Judges, chapter 16 – 19.

Samson

Samson was incredibly strong! He was so strong that he could lift



things that grown men couldn't move! He was so strong that He could uproot trees! He was so strong that he could kill a lion with his bare hands!

When Samson grew up, he fell in love with a Philistine woman and married her; his parents were very unhappy about Samson marrying a Philistine, they didn't realise that this was all part of God's plan to rescue the people of Israel.

After a while Samson and his wife began to argue, and Samson left. But when he heard that his wife had fallen in love with 1 of the Philistine men, Samson flew into a great rage and set all of the Philistine's crops on fire! Obviously,

the Philistines weren't very pleased about that, and so they came up with a cunning plan to capture Samson and punish him.

They caught Samson and tied him up, but suddenly the power of God came upon him, and he stretched out his arms and snapped



the thick ropes as if they were only made of string, and then he attacked the Philistines – just Samson against a whole army of Philistine soldiers, but Samson was so angry and so strong that he easily beat them all and

escaped!

The Philistines were furious; they plotted how to get back at Samson and came up with another cunning plan ...

Samson had fallen in love with a woman named Delilah; the Philistines went to Delilah secretly and told her that they would give her lots of money if she could find out where Samson got his strength from and how he could be defeated.

And so, Delilah made Samson his favourite meal and then she pretended to be curious and asked him what made him so strong. Delilah asked Samson 3 times, and each time Samson lied to her. The first time he told her, "If you bind me with 7 fresh cords, all my strength will leave me".

The second time he told her, "If you tie me up with ropes that have never been used, my strength will leave me".

The third time he told her, "If you weave all the braids in my hair together, my strength will leave me".

But none of these answers were true.

Eventually, Samson got fed up with Delilah asking him the same thing over and over again, and so he told her the truth, "If you cut my hair, all my strength will leave me".

When Samson was asleep, Delilah carefully cut his hair off, then



she sent word to the Philistines. When the Philistines came to capture him, Samson tried to fight them off, but all his strength was gone, and the soldiers guickly tied him up and threw him into prison.

It seemed to the people of Israel that God's plan had gone wrong - Samson was supposed to be going to save them, but instead the Philistines starved him and put him to work turning a great stone wheel. Day after day, Samson turned the heavy wheel.

But then his hair began to grow back!

One day, the Philistine leaders were having a great victory celebration and they decided to bring Samson in so that they could have some fun laughing at him. They made Samson stand by the huge columns of the temple where they were celebrating. No one noticed that Samson's hair had grown back. As they were laughing and making fun of him, Samson was guietly praying, "Lord, remember me. Please, God, strengthen me just once more, and let me with one blow get revenge on the Philistines".

Samson said, "Let me die with the Philistines!" Then he pushed



with all his might and down came the temple and killed the rulers and all the people in it.

God gave Samson the strength to kill more enemies when he died than while he lived, so many of the Philistines were killed when the Temple came crashing down, that the people of Israel were once more able to be free from them.

So, What Can We Learn From Samson's Story?

Samson might seem like an unlikely person for God to use. He was prideful, had a bad temper, and disobeyed God. But God still used him and ultimately Samson brought God glory. Samson gave his life so that he could defeat the Philistines and the Israelites could be freed. Remember that God made each of us for a reason and that we are all very special to him. God does hear us when we pray, and all our strength comes from him.

Prayer Time ...

Loving God, help us to remember that the Bible is there to teach us about You. Even though Samson wasn't always doing the right thing, he was part of your plan. Help us to remember that You are there for everyone, and will give us Your strength and guide us if we trust You - Amen.
