## A few words from the Vicar ....

Well, the run up to Christmas was eventful.

During the first week in December, three members of our congregation were called to Glory: Mavis Rimmer, June Hayes and Jim Bowden. Mavis was a long-standing member of our Mother's Union Branch, as was June. June was also a member of our choir and helped with pastoral visiting. As for Jim, in addition to some official roles and being part of the Churchyard Team, he is affectionally remembered for handing out cough sweets every Sunday to the choir and clergy, plus anyone else who wanted one. All three are missed and won't be forgotten.

Each served the Lord in their own individual way and, as I reflect upon what I know about their lives, I am reminded that our Christian faith isn't just about worshipping on Sundays. It is also about living out our faith in how we relate to and care for our families, friends and neighbours; in our work lives (teacher, shop keeper, and Police Sergeant); and in our leisure time. If Jesus is Lord, then he is Lord of all. He has lordship over every aspect of our lives, not just how we spend Sunday mornings.

May they Rest in Peace and Rise in Glory!

Then, it snowed and froze as the temperature plummeted. Although the Church path was cleared and gritted immediately, pavements in the village and further afield remained lethal for several days. Some hardy souls braved the icy conditions (and the lack of heating in Church) to attend worship. Others decided that discretion is the better part of valour and stayed safely at home. There is no right and wrong in this situation. As adults, we weigh up the risks and decide for ourselves.

If you do decide to stay away due to poor weather, remember there are online options available. The Church of England posts an online service on its website every Sunday morning and, at 12 noon our online service (*'Worship at Home with Christ Church'*) is posted to our Facebook Page and YouTube Channel. *'Worship at Home'* is specifically designed for those who, for whatever reason, are unable to attend worship in our Church building. It began as a livestream during the pandemic and has continued ever since.

Sadly, it will not be possible to continue *'Worship at Home'* following my retirement at the end of February. However, other parishes from within our Mission Community record online services, so those unable

to attend 'on site' worship here in Ainsworth could easily access these. Further details will be available in the New Year.

Unfortunately, Jenny, our organist, fell victim to the icy conditions. She slipped and cracked her shoulder, so is out of action and was unable to play over Christmas. We resorted to CDs instead, which worked well enough.

There was a silver lining though. Following Jenny's injury, one thing led to another, and we joined Ainsworth Methodists for a service of Nine Lessons and Carols. Combining congregations for the evening worked. It was a brilliant service. Truly magical. Singing carols in a full Church is a much better worshipping experience than doing so in two half empty ones. Indeed, some of us didn't want the evening to end.

Maybe there's a lesson here for future years. However, I will leave that thought hanging there. I will be long retired by next Christmas and shouldn't interfere.

Anyway, here's praying that Jenny has a speedy recovery. And let's hope and pray that the New Year is not quite so eventful!

## Bible Reading Fellowship - Bible Reading Notes; Why Bother?

It's said that if a ballet dancer doesn't practise for one day, she notices. If she doesn't practise for two days, the class notices. If she doesn't practise for three days, the whole audience notices. It might not be so immediately obvious if Christians don't read the Bible every day, but sooner or later, it will be noticed.

Different Christian traditions give different weight to the habit of daily Bible study, but all are agreed that it's an important discipline: a practise to be fostered, along with prayer, worship, reflection and service, if faith is to grow deep roots.

Our enthusiasm for Bible reading may wax and wane; life becomes busy or difficult; we drift away and don't know how to return; scripture

no longer seems to 'speak' to us; we get bored, distracted or discouraged, until daily Bible study becomes a joyless 'ought', or a guilt-inducing 'should'.

But what if, instead of thinking of it as a duty, we think of it as a gift; a lovely opportunity to sit in God's presence, focus on His word and keep the channels of communication open?

Daily Bible reading notes nourish and inspire on good days, but when they really come into their own is when we're flagging. They provide us with structure, a manageable passage of scripture, and the thoughts of a wise, compassionate and experienced commentator.

The Bible Reading Fellowship offers six different series of Bible reading notes, from the seriously theological, to the quietly contemplative; from notes for women, to reflections for older people. The most popular series is the approachable and illuminating '*New Daylight*', which offers insight into God and into scripture. Whichever series you choose, it will, over time, introduce you to the whole sweep of scripture, from Genesis through to Revelation, allowing you to absorb its wisdom, develop your understanding, and encounter daily inspiration, encouragement and challenge.

We meet on the Second Tuesday of each month from 7:30pm in the upstairs room of Ainsworth Church and Community Hall (on the corner of Bury Old Road and Ainsworth Hall Road). The next meeting is Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> January when we will look at mining in and around the village. All are welcome.

### **December Meeting:**

A few members managed to overcome the treacherous conditions underfoot to listen to a presentation about Girlguiding in Ainsworth, based mainly on the information provided by Anne Rule.

There was a unit in the 1930's and 40's and during the war the girls went to camp in Wales using public transport and carrying their bedding in brown paper parcels tied up with string!

That unit closed at some point and a new unit opened in 1957. This unit still exists today, although there have been some temporary



closures over that time. It was very interesting to see how the Guide uniform has changed over time – from the uniform in 1942 to today's blue and red polo shirts and jackets



## **From the Archives – January 1998**

The front cover of the January Parish Magazine sported a 'new and more modern design', comprising a dove, a cross and the flame of the Holy Spirit all artistically interwoven; there is no suggestion as to who created the design, but it is certainly very impressive.

The Parish News page contained a number of acknowledgements and thank yous, along with the news that the Bishop of Manchester, the Right Reverend Christopher Mayfield, would be visiting the Parish as part of a 'Resourcing The Church' initiative; it was hoped that all members of the PCC and as many members of the congregation as possible would attend.

Whilst the various groups and uniformed organisations had been enjoying a few weeks off over the Christmas period, it seems they had all been partying quite hard in the run up to the Christmas break! The Church Women's Fellowship had held an evening of coffee and carols, followed by a trip to the Octagon Theatre, Mothers' Union members had enjoyed a Christmas meal at Smithills Coaching House, Young Families had held a children's Christmas party AND a parents Christmas meal at the Bulls Head in Greenmount, members of the WI had held a line dancing evening, and the Day School reported a successful Christmas Fair – busy times indeed!

In January 1998, the 'Face To Face' interview was with Mrs Doris Windsor "perhaps the oldest, but certainly one of the most vibrant members of our congregation". The Holiday Church featured was All Saints' Church, Mappleton, East Yorkshire, with an interesting article written by Mrs. Joan Arrowsmith.

In January 1998 there were 5 Baptisms and 4 funerals recorded from the previous month, but no weddings. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 375 with the Collections listed as £1716.

## A Brief History Of Hymns

For over 2000 years, Christians have used music and song as a form of worship. For the earliest Christians, this would have involved singing of the Psalms within the Temple.



The word “hymn”, however, comes from the Greek word “hymnos” which means “a song of praise”. Originally these would have been written in honour of the Gods, however hymns and the singing of them has evolved and changed over the centuries and been affected by new thinking and developing religious beliefs: throughout the history of the church, whenever there has been renewal, revival or restoration, new songs of worship have appeared.

During the Middle Ages hymns took the form of Gregorian chant or ‘plainsong’; these were sung in Latin and most often by monastic choirs.

In England the non-conformist minister Isaac Watts (1674-1748) began a transformation of congregational singing. Watts believed strongly that hymns should express the religious feelings of the people and he became a prolific writer, creating hundreds of new hymns. Watts has been described as “the liberator of English hymnody” as his hymns moved people away from simply singing Old Testament psalms, inspiring people to sing from the heart, with great faith and understanding.

In the same period, another significant movement affected the hymns of the church: the Methodist movement, led by John Wesley. Wesley and especially his brother Charles used simple rhythms and sing-able melodies to help congregational singing. They wrote many of our most well-known hymns that are still very popular today.

In the late 19th Century, a new style, known as “gospel” emerged. These songs were usually characterised by a strong lead vocal and exciting harmonies and were a great influence on later contemporary worship worldwide.

The twentieth and twenty first centuries have seen an explosion of new hymn writers and approaches. Old texts have been refreshed by new tunes and lots more contemporary hymns have sprung up. In the non-traditional church movement, there has been a move away from the previous style of congregational singing to worship led by one singer or a worship band. Instrumentation has become more popular and musical styles have become much freer. The church today is

richer than ever in musical resources and continues to bring congregations together through song.

## **The Hymn That's In My Head**

Hymns and music play a large part in Christian worship; you can't beat listening to (or singing along with) a joyful, rousing hymn - whether it's in church, on the radio or listening to a CD. There are literally hundreds of fabulous hymns and worship songs out there.

Often, it's the tune that initially catches our imagination, you might find yourself humming it as you walk the dog, drive to work or go about your daily tasks; sometimes a tune or hymn will just come to mind, seemingly from nowhere ...

Fortunately, as I write this, we are still well within the 12 days of Christmas, so it's fine that the hymn that seems to be stuck in my head at the moment is actually technically a Christmas Carol ...

It came upon the midnight clear,  
That glorious song of old,  
From angels bending near the earth,  
To touch their harps of gold:  
"Peace on the earth, goodwill to men,  
From heaven's all-gracious King."  
The world in solemn stillness lay,  
To hear the angels sing.

Still through the cloven skies they come,  
With peaceful wings unfurled,  
And still their heavenly music floats  
O'er all the weary world;  
Above its sad and lowly plains,  
They bend on hovering wing,  
And ever o'er its babel sounds  
The blessed angels sing.

Yet with the woes of sin and strife  
The world has suffered long;  
Beneath the angel-strain have rolled  
Two thousand years of wrong;

And man, at war with man, hears not  
The love-song which they bring;  
O hush the noise, ye men of strife,  
And hear the angels sing.

And ye, beneath life's crushing load,  
Whose forms are bending low,  
Who toil along the climbing way  
With painful steps and slow,  
Look now! for glad and golden hours  
come swiftly on the wing.  
O rest beside the weary road,  
And hear the angels sing!

For lo!, the days are hastening on,  
By prophet bards foretold,  
When with the ever-circling years  
Comes round the age of gold  
When peace shall over all the earth  
Its ancient splendours fling,  
And the whole world give back the song  
Which now the angels sing.

These words were written by Edmund Sears, a Pastor of the Unitarian Church in Wayland, Massachusetts, in 1849, and, at his request, set to a tune called 'Carol' by Richard Storrs Willis in 1850.

It is believed Sears was affected by the revolutions of Europe and the Mexican–American War, and that it was these events that inspired the melancholic tones of the poem, which accuses the world of being full of 'sin and strife' and ignoring the Christmas message.

In most Commonwealth countries, these words are now song to a tune called 'Noel' which was adapted by Arthur Sullivan, from an English melody. Whilst this is probably the tune that most of us are familiar with, it is actually the hauntingly melancholy 'Carol' that has sneaked into my head this year, having been played a number of times on Classic FM – must try to track a copy down before next Christmas!

## Cheat's Kitchen



### Simple Sausage Slice

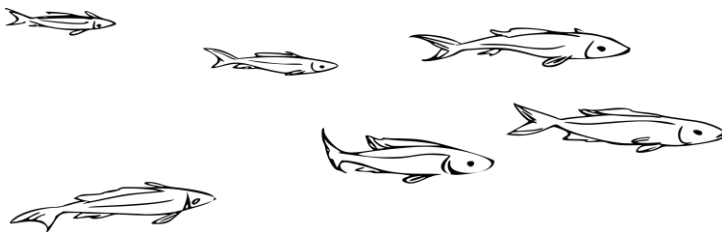

# Little Fishes

Moses - Part 2



## People In The Bible

Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The different parts of the Bible are called 'Books'; each Book was written for a special purpose - some books tell us the story of God's chosen people, the children of Israel, some books are filled with wisdom and advice, some books tell us about things which may be in the future; many of the Books of the Bible include stories about ordinary people who played an extraordinary part in history. Last month, Little Fishes was all about the early life of Moses. We learned that Pharaoh had made all of the Israelite people into slaves and had threatened to kill all of their baby boys, but Moses was adopted by Pharaoh's daughter when he was a baby and grew up in Pharaoh's household.

Many years later, Moses had left Egypt and was working as a Shepherd, when he spotted a bush that seemed to be on fire, but strangely, the bush was not damaged at all by the fire - Moses went to have a closer look, and that's when he heard God speaking to him and telling him that He wanted him to go back to Egypt and ask Pharaoh to let the Israelite people go free. At first Moses was very uncertain - he was just an ordinary person after all; how on earth was he supposed to go and tell Pharaoh that he had to let all of his slaves go free???

But God promised to be with Moses and to help him and guide him, God also reminded Moses that he would have his brother Aaron with him to help him.

### **Moses - Part 2**

And so, Moses went back to Egypt. He spoke to the people of Israel and explained everything that God had told him, and then Moses went to Pharaoh and told him that God had spoken to him; Moses pleaded with Pharaoh asking him to let the Israelite people go free; he



warned Pharaoh that God would be angry if he refused to let the Israelites go, and would do such terrifying things in Egypt that eventually Pharaoh would be glad to let the people of Israel go. Pharaoh was not happy at the thought of losing all his slaves, and so he refused. Moses warned him again that terrible things would happen if Pharaoh didn't listen, but still Pharaoh said "No". And so, God sent 10 plagues on the people of Egypt, in the hope that this would force Pharaoh to let the people go.

**Plague number 1** - The first plague to hit Egypt was the water of the river Nile turning to blood!! The river Nile was really

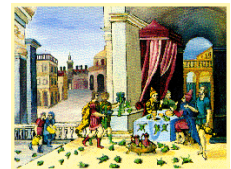


important for Egypt, and so this plague caused absolute disaster across the land. God sent Moses and his brother Aaron to the edge of the river and told Aaron to raise his staff and strike the

water; as soon as he did this, the water turned into blood. This plague caused all of the fish in the river to die and a stream of blood to flow throughout Egypt, so the people had no water to drink or to wash in. This plague lasted for one whole week.

Despite the horror, the Pharaoh refused to let the Israelites go.

**Plague number 2** - Frogs!! God told Aaron to stretch out his hand over the waters of Egypt ... and suddenly there were frogs swarming all over the place! Pharaoh couldn't believe what he was seeing! He pleaded with Moses to make the frogs go away. He even promised that, if the plague was gone, he would let the Israelites go. So, God removed the frogs, but Pharaoh changed his mind ...



**Plague number 3** - So God said to Moses, 'Say to Aaron, "Stretch out your staff, and strike the dust of the land, so that it may become lice throughout all the land of Egypt."' And when Aaron



struck the dust with his staff, lice swarmed all over Egypt. The people of Egypt were tormented by them; wherever they went the lice were already



there! But still, the Pharaoh refused to let the Israelites go. And so ...

**Plague number 4** - God sent a plague of flies throughout Egypt. The whole of Egypt was overrun by these pesky winged insects - there were flies in the people's houses, on their food, everywhere you could imagine - there were flies there; except for the part of Egypt where the Israelite people lived. Pharaoh hated the flies, but he still refused to let the Israelites go.



God spoke to Pharaoh and said, "Let My people go. If you refuse to let them go, and still hold them, the hand of the Lord will be on your cattle in the field, on the horses, on the donkeys, on the camels, on the oxen, and on the sheep—a very severe pestilence. And the Lord will make a difference between the livestock of Israel and the livestock of Egypt."

But guess what ... even though he heard God's warning, Pharaoh still wouldn't let the Israelites go!

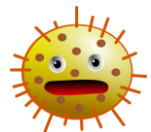
**Plague number 5** - Disease ... and so God sent a great disease that killed every animal that the Egyptian people owned; cows,



horses, donkeys, camels, sheep, goats ... But the animals which were owned by the Israelites were all still fit and healthy; imagine how the Egyptian

people felt when they saw all their animals dying - they would have no meat, no milk, no cheese, nothing to pull the ploughs or carts ... But still Pharaoh refused to let the Israelite people go!

**Plague number 6** - Boils (a boil is a nasty, painful sore)!! God told Aaron and Moses to take handfuls of ashes from a furnace and throw them up into the air and let them float down over the land of Egypt; as the ashes fell, wherever they landed - on man or beast - they caused a horrible, painful boil. Even though he saw all of the Egyptian people and animals suffering, Pharaoh still would not let the Israelite people go.



### **Plague number 7 - Hail ...** A few hail stones doesn't sound too



bad, but the hail involved in this plague was not like any that we have seen today. The hail that pelted down on Egypt was HUGE!!, Great big balls of ice that left no living thing unharmed. Anyone

who didn't manage to get inside fast enough to avoid the hail stones was killed on the spot. Again, the land of Goshen, where the Israelites lived, was completely untouched.

After this, pharaoh sent for Moses, and promised that if Moses persuaded God to stop the hail stones, he would allow the Israelite people to go free. And so, the plague of hail ended, but Pharaoh changed his mind ... Moses went to Pharaoh and pleaded with him to see sense and release the Israelites; he told him that things would get much, much worse for the Egyptian people if he didn't allow them to go free. But Pharaoh refused.

### **Plague number 8 -** As Moses left the Pharaoh's palace, he lifted his arms to heaven and a wind from the East brought a swarm of locusts into Egypt. There were so many locusts that the sun was



completely blocked out and the whole of Egypt was in darkness! The locusts destroyed everything across the land of Egypt, and once again, Pharaoh begged Moses and Aaron to pray for an end to the plague. Moses agreed, and God sent a wind from the west to drive the locusts away. But guess what - once the locusts were gone, Pharaoh was back to his old tricks; he changed his mind again and refused to let the Israelites go.

God was getting pretty fed up with Pharaoh by now, and so He sent ...

### **Plague number 9 - Darkness!** A thick, heavy darkness covered the whole land of Egypt; there wasn't even a teeny glimmer of light; no sun, no stars, no moon (and remember in those days there was no such thing as electric lights or torches either!). The Egyptian people were



terrified, and once again Pharaoh pleaded with Moses to ask God to remove the darkness; but yet again, when God did as he asked, Pharaoh changed his mind and refused to let the Israelites go.

Then came the worst plague of all ...

**Plague number 10** - Plague of the firstborn. "Then Moses said, 'Thus says the Lord: "About midnight I will go out into the midst of Egypt; and all the firstborn in the land of Egypt shall die, from the firstborn of Pharaoh who sits on his throne, even to the firstborn of the female servant who is behind the hand mill, and all the firstborn of the animals. Then there shall be a great cry throughout all the land of Egypt, such as was not like it before, nor shall be like it again. But against none of the children of Israel shall a dog move its tongue, against man or beast, that you may know that the Lord does make a difference between the Egyptians and Israel"



Moses told all of the Israelite people to put a mark above their doors so that the angel of death would pass by without harming them, and it happened exactly as God had said. The firstborn of every person and creature in the land of Egypt was killed and the Egyptian people wept and wailed in their grief. This time became known as 'Passover' as the angel of death passed over the Israelite people and left them and their children unharmed.

Finally, even Pharaoh had had enough. He called Moses and Aaron to him and told them that they may lead the Israelite people out of the land of Egypt, in order to take God's anger away from the Egyptian people.

The Israelite people had been waiting for this for a long time, so they quickly got ready to leave Egypt and begin their journey to the land that God had promised them - this journey was called 'The Exodus'.

Moses and Aaron gathered the Israelite people together and they set off at once, travelling through the night, wanting to get as far

away from Egypt as possible. It was a good thing that they didn't wait because guess what ... When Pharaoh thought about all the work that the Israelite slaves had been doing and realised that none of this work would get done without those slaves - he changed his mind again and sent his armies after Moses and the people of Israel to force them to return to Egypt!!



Moses led the Israelites on, they could see the Egyptians in the distance, coming after them. Ahead of them was the Red Sea - behind them was Pharaoh's army - it looked like they were trapped. But God said to Moses "Raise your staff", and when



Moses did this, the waves of the sea parted, and a path appeared in front of the Israelites. The Israelites knew this strange path was their only hope of escape and so they ran forwards along the

path. The Egyptian army were close behind them, but as they began to follow the Israelites, the waves closed up behind them and the path disappeared. Moses and the people of Israel ran along the path to safety, but every one of the Egyptians were drowned.

Finally, it seemed that the people of Israel were free!

This isn't quite the end of the story of Moses, but it's where we're going to leave Moses and Aaron and the people of Israel - resting before the next stage of their adventure begins.

### **So Why Exactly Did God Send Those Plagues?**

God wanted Pharaoh to release the Israelite people; to let them go free, and He knew that Pharaoh was really NOT going to want to do that. The 10 plagues or disasters God sent were intended to prove to the people of Israel that God was on their side - after being slaves for so long they had almost given up believing that. By sending these plagues, God was also proving to the people of Israel that He had chosen Moses to be their leader and to protect them.

But those plagues were also chosen carefully by God, to prove to Pharaoh and the Egyptian people that there is only 1 true and all-powerful God.

At that time, the people of Egypt worshipped lots of different 'Gods'; they had a Sun God, a God of the rivers and water, a God of the crops and fields, a God of the animals and creatures, a God of babies and children - they literally had a different 'God' for everything. When God sent His plagues, He wanted to show the Egyptian people that they were wrong; these so called 'Gods' could not stop the plagues or protect the Egyptian people from them - but look over there - the people of Israel who believed in the 1 true God, were not being harmed by those plagues at all!

By the time the Israelites left Egypt, they had a clear picture of God's power, God's protection, and God's plan for them.

The result for the Egyptians was very different; Pharaoh had lost all his armies, and his land and his people had been devastated by the plagues. I wonder if Pharaoh had finally learned his lesson ...
